WHITEHALL, Nov. 7, 1806.

The King has been graciously pleased, by warrant under his Royal Signet and Sign Manuel, bearing date the 21st of October last, to give and grant unto the Right Hon. and Rev. William Nelson, D.D. Baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Hilborough, in the county of Norfolk, Viscount Merton, and Earl Nelson of Trafalgar and of Merton, in the county of Surrey, and his heirs, his Royal Licence and permission to succeed to the title of Duke of Bronté, in the kingdom of Farther Sicily, with the Fief of the Duchy annexed thereto, in compliance with the desire of his Sicilian Majesty, Ferdinand the Fourth, who had granted the same to his late brother Horatio Viscount and Baron Nelson, Duke of Bronté, &c. deceased: And also to order, that this his Majesty's concession and declaration, together with the relative documents, be registered in his College of Arms.
