“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 11th day of June 1920, to sanction, *inter alia*, the grant of a Machinery Allowance of 1s. per diem to the rating in charge of engines at Your Majesty's Wireless Telegraph Stations abroad:

“And whereas we are of opinion that a similar allowance should be paid to ratings in charge of machinery at Wireless Telegraph Stations at home:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant

to such ratings of an allowance of one shilling per diem, with effect from 26th November 1923.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force, to a person being or having been an officer, seaman, or marine therein,

shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

And whereas we are of opinion that the rates of extra duty pay at present authorised for non-commissioned officers and men employed in appointments at the several Royal Marine Divisions, and the Depot, R.M., Deal, and at Rifle Ranges abroad require revision; also that extra pay for casual services, as prescribed for seamen and Royal Marines afloat,

should be payable to Royal Marines on shore strength:

" We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction payment of the rates specified in the annexed Schedules to such members, from such dates, and subject to such conditions, as have been already prescribed by us, with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury where necessary, or may in future be so prescribed.

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Wilfrid Westoe, a coal hewer employed by the South Garesfield Colliery Company Limited in the following circumstances:—

On October 27th, 1923, while some men were working in a seam on the South Garesfield Colliery, Co. Durham, one of them named Mason was completely buried by a heavy fall of earth and stones about five tons in weight and received severe injuries to his head. The only means of reaching the man was through a small opening and Westoe alone of the men present felt equal to attempting a rescue. He squeezed his way through the opening to the injured man and succeeded after an hour and a half's work in bringing him to safety. Westoe had to work under a continuous hail of stones, while there was great danger of another large fall, and if this had occurred there would have been no possible means of escape. Westoe ran a very grave risk in effecting the rescue and had it not been for his initiative and courage it is probable that Mason would have lost his life.

Lieut.-Colonel Lane-Fox, M.P., Secretary for Mines, has appointed Mr. T. H. Bull to be an Acting Junior Inspector of Mines under the Coal Mines Acts, 1887 and 1919, and has instructed him to act also as an Inspector for the purposes of the Metalliferous Mines Regulations Acts, 1872 and 1875, and the Quarries Act, 1894.

Under the provisions of the Mining Industry Act, 1920, Lieut.-Colonel Lane-Fox has further appointed Mr. Bull to be an Acting Inspector of Factories and Workshops for the purposes of the Factories and Workshops Act, 1901, so far as it applies to Quarries and Pitbanks as defined in Part II. of the Sixth Schedule to the Act.
