GERMAN REPARATION (RECOVERY).

THE GERMAN REPARATION (RECOVERY) No. 5 ORDER, 1924, DATED NOVEMBER 11, 1924, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER THE GERMAN REPARATION (RECOVERY) ACT, 1921 (11 & 12 GEO. 5. c. 5).

The Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Section 5 of the German Reparation (Recovery) Act, 1921, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, upon the recommendation of a Committee constituted under Section 5 of the said Act hereby make the following Order:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The German Reparation (Recovery) No. 5 Order, 1924."

2. Any article of the following description shall be exempt from the provisions of the said Act, that is to say, any article in respect of which it is proved to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise:—

(a) That such article is used as a container for goods consigned from Germany to

the United Kingdom to be returned to Germany when empty;

- (b) That the property in such article does not pass to any person in the United Kingdom, and that no financial or other consideration in respect thereof passes to the consignor except a charge for the use thereof:

Provided that security has been given to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners for the return of such article to Germany within a period to be determined by the said Commissioners in each case.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

FLAX AND HEMP TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS IN TENTING AND DRESSING.

This Notice takes the place of the Notice F.H. (10) issued by the Trade Board and dated 23rd February 1922.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in the Schedule below are effective as from the following dates:—

(a) The General Minimum Time-Rates (and the Overtime Rates based thereon) set out in Part II. are effective as from 27th February 1922.

(b) The General Minimum Rates (and the Overtime Rates based thereon) set out in Part I. are effective

(i.) as respects male apprentices indentured prior to 24th November 1924, whose indentures are in the form set out in Part VI. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice F.H. (10) as from 27th February 1922.

(ii.) as respects male apprentices whose indentures are in the form set out in Part VI. of the Schedule to this Notice or in any other form approved by the Trade Board as from 24th November 1924.*

* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 30th November 1924.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR MALE APPRENTICES (AS DEFINED IN PART V. OF THIS SCHEDULE) WHO ARE APPRENTICED TO TENTING OR DRESSING.

Male Apprentices who are Apprenticed to Tenting shall receive:

During the 1st year of their apprenticeship, 14s. per week.

During the 2nd year of their apprenticeship, 17s. 6d. per week.

During the 3rd year of their apprenticeship, 21s. per week.

During the 4th year of their apprenticeship, 32s. per week.

Male Apprentices who are Apprenticed to Dressing shall receive:

During the 1st year of their apprenticeship, 14s. per week.

During the 2nd year of their apprenticeship, 17s. 6d. per week.

During the 3rd year of their apprenticeship, 21s. per week.

PART II.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR MALE IMPROVERS (AS HEREIN DEFINED) IN TENTING OR DRESSING.

A Male Improver in Tenting, that is to say, a male worker who has completed a term of four years' apprenticeship in accordance with the provisions of this Schedule with regard to Male Apprentice Tenters, shall receive during the first year of his employment as a Tenter, subsequent to the completion of his apprenticeship, 40s. per week.

A Male Improver in Dressing, that is to say, a male worker who has completed a term of three years' apprenticeship in accordance with the provisions of this Schedule with regard to Male Apprentice Dressers, shall receive during the first year of his employment as a Dresser, subsequent to the completion of his apprenticeship, 32s. per week.

PART III.

DEFINITION OF "WEEK."

SECTION I.—(a) In the case of classes of whole-time workers employed by the week or longer period, whose customary working week consists of a number of hours less than 48 but not less than 44, "a week" means a week of the number of hours customarily worked by the class in question.

(b) In all other cases "a week" means a week of 48 hours.

SECTION II.—For the purpose of calculating the hourly rate applicable in respect of each hour of employment the rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule must be divided:—

(a) In the case of the workers referred to in Section I. (a) of this Part by the number of hours per week customarily worked by the class in question.

(b) In all other cases by 48.

SECTION III.—Payment at not less than the hourly rate calculated as described in Section II. of this Part must be made for all hours of employment whether in excess of the customary working week or not, except for those hours in respect of which a higher rate is payable under the overtime provisions referred to in Part IV. below.

PART IV.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS IN TENTING AND DRESSING.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the General Minimum Time-Rates specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in the manner set out in

the Schedule to the Notice F.H. (15) issued by the Trade Board and dated 25th July 1922, shall apply in substitution for the rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, in respect of all time worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule to the Notice F.H. (15) dated 25th July 1922, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART V.

DEFINITION OF MALE APPRENTICE.

For the purpose of the application of the Minimum Rates set out in Parts I., II., and IV. of this Schedule, an Apprentice is defined as being a male worker of 16 years of age or over who:—

(a) Is employed during the whole of his time in accordance with the provisions of this Schedule under an Indenture (duly stamped) for a period of four years in the case of apprentice tenters or for a period of three years in the case of apprentice dressers, in the form prescribed by the Trade Board as set out in Part VI. of this Schedule, or in any other form approved by the Trade Board; and

(b) Has been registered with the Trade Board in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such registration which has been duly acknowledged, and is still under consideration.

Provided that:—

(i.) The registration may be cancelled if the other conditions of apprenticeship are not complied with.

(ii.) An employer may employ a worker at the minimum rates and under the special conditions for apprentices without registration for a probation period not exceeding twelve weeks; but in the event of such worker being continued thereafter at his employment as an Apprentice, the probation period shall be included in his period of apprenticeship.

PART VI.

FORM OF INDENTURE OF APPRENTICESHIP PRESCRIBED BY THE ABOVE TRADE BOARD.

This Indenture made the _____ day of _____ between _____ of _____, a minor of the age of _____ years (hereinafter called the "Apprentice") of the first part, _____ of _____, the parent or guardian of the Apprentice (hereinafter called the "Guardian") of the second part, and _____ of _____ (hereinafter called the "Employer") of the third part;

Witnesseth as follows, that is to say:—

1. The Apprentice of his own free will and with the consent of the Guardian hereby binds himself to serve the Employer as his apprentice in his trade of _____ for the term of _____ years from the date of these presents.

2. In consideration of the covenants and agreements entered into by the Guardian and the Apprentice, the Employer hereby covenants

with the Guardian and the Apprentice and with each of them severally as follows:—

(a) That he will keep the Apprentice as his Apprentice during the said term and to the best of his power, skill and knowledge instruct the Apprentice or cause him to be instructed in the section of the Flax and Hemp Trade known as _____

(b) That he will keep the Apprentice under his own supervision or place him under a fully qualified Journeyman (or Journeymen).

(c) That he will pay to the apprentices every week during the said term wages in accordance with the appropriate scale of wages as fixed or as varied from time to time for male apprentices by the Trade Board, provided that he shall not be bound to pay wages to the Apprentice for such time as the Apprentice is absent from his duties through ill-health and is in receipt of sickness benefit under the National Insurance Act.

(d) That if the Employer shall die or become permanently incapacitated through illness or injury (to be certified by a fully qualified Medical Practitioner) or cease to carry on the said trade of _____ before the expiration of the said term of apprenticeship, then and in any such case, the Employer or his Executors or his Administrators, as the case may be, shall, after obtaining the consent and approval of the Guardian and of the said Apprentice, which consent and approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, use all reasonable efforts to find another suitable employer for the Apprentice to take over this Indenture.

(e) That in the event of the death, incapacity, or removal of the Guardian from the district in which the Apprentice resides, it shall be open to the Apprentice to propose to the Employer in writing that the Indenture be cancelled, and the Employer shall not unreasonably withhold his consent to the cancellation of the Indenture on these grounds.

(f) That he will not hold the Apprentice liable to make good the value of any work which he may spoil whilst learning his trade, except in the case of wilful or malicious damage.

(g) That he will cause the Apprentice to attend during the terms of this Indenture such approved technical classes as may be agreed by the parties concerned in the Indenture, the Apprentice to suffer no loss of wages by reason of such attendance or by reason of his attendance at school in accordance with the Education Act, 1918, and the time so spent to be reckoned as an equivalent part of the usual working hours and not extra thereto.

(h) That he will supply the Apprentice forthwith, upon its execution, with a true copy of this Indenture.

3. In consideration of the premises, the Guardian and the Apprentice jointly and severally covenant with the Employer as follows:—

(a) That the Apprentice shall truly and faithfully during the said term serve the Employer as his apprentice, and his secrets keep, and shall diligently attend to the said trade, and at all times willingly obey the

lawful and reasonable commands of the Employer, and shall not absent himself from the Employer's service without leave.

(b) That the Apprentice shall not do any damage or knowingly suffer any damage to be done to the goods, moneys, or other property of the Employer.

(c) That the Apprentice shall willingly perform all such shop duties as are usually done by Apprentices.

(d) That the Apprentice shall attend such continuation classes between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m., as the employer desires, provided that the Apprentice suffer no loss of wages by reason of such attendance.

(e) That in case the Apprentice shall at any time during the said term be wilfully disobedient to lawful orders or commands of the said Employer, or be slothful or negligent or shall otherwise grossly misbehave himself towards the Employer, then it shall be lawful to cancel this Indenture and discharge the said Apprentice.

4. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the Employer shall not be bound to provide instruction or work for or pay wages to the Apprentice, and the Apprentice shall not be bound to serve the Employer for such time as the Employer is unable to provide the Apprentice with work owing to causes beyond his control:

Provided that should a period of short time last for four continuous months or longer, the parties may agree to cancel the Indenture.

5. Any matter in dispute between the parties arising out of the interpretation or application of the terms of the clauses of this Indenture shall be submitted to the Chairman of the Trade Board for the time being with a view to a settlement.

*NOTE:—

(a) In England and Wales the indenture must be signed, sealed and delivered by each party in the presence of one witness, who should add his name, address and occupation.

(b) In Scotland the indenture must be signed by each party in the presence of two witnesses, and the witnesses must add their names, addresses and occupations in their own handwriting. No seal is required.

PART VII.

GENERAL.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all male apprentices and improvers of the class specified in this Notice

in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Flax and Hemp) Order, 1919, namely:—

The preparing, spinning and weaving (a) of scutched flax, (b) of hemp, (c) of a mixture of scutched flax and any other fibre, or (d) of a mixture of hemp and any other fibre.

Including:—

(1) The preparing and spinning of waste reclaimed at any stage; and

(2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned work;

But excluding:—

(1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials; and

(2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine, (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles when such spinning or preparing is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or re-making; and

(3) The making or repair of sacks or bags; and also

(4) The weaving of carpets, rugs and mats.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of Orders of the Minister of Labour confirming the Minimum Rates as fixed or as varied by the Trade Board and set out above, and specifying the dates provided in this Notice as the dates from which they should become effective.

PART I.

A. — GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE WORKERS OF 16 YEARS OF AGE AND OVER EMPLOYED IN LEARNING CANVAS WEAVING DURING THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF SUCH EMPLOYMENT.

General Minimum Time-Rates (Per Week).

SECTION I.—

Workers of 21 years of age and upwards, 25s. during the first 3 months and 30s. during the second 3 months of employment.

Workers of 18 years and under 21 years of age, 20s during the first 3 months and 25s. during the second 3 months of employment.

Workers of 16 years and under 18 years of age, 15s. during the first 3 months and 16s. during the second 3 months of employment.

SECTION II.—For the purpose of calculating the hourly rate applicable in respect of each hour of employment the rates set out in Section I. of Part I. (A) of this Schedule must be divided:—

(a) In the case of the workers referred to in Section I. (a) of Part I. (B) by the number of hours per week customarily worked by the class in question;

(b) In all other cases by 48.

SECTION III.—Payment at not less than the hourly rate calculated as described in Section II. of Part I. (B) must be made for all hours of employment whether in excess of the customary working week or not, except for those hours in respect of which a higher rate is payable under the overtime provisions referred to in Part IV. of this Schedule.

PART III.

VARIATION OF MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WINDERS.

For the purpose of the minimum rates of wages for Female Workers other than Learners set out in the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice F.H. (15) dated 25th July 1922, the following definition shall apply as respects Female Winders:—

A winder is a worker, other than a bit or beating winder, who is wholly or mainly employed on winding from the reel, hank or bobbin.

PART IV.

OVERTIME RATES.

Overtime Rates calculated on the minimum rates of wages as varied in accordance with the provisions of Parts I., II., and III. of this Schedule, in the manner specified in Part VII. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice F.H. (15) dated 25th July 1922, apply in substitution for the said minimum rates of wages as varied in respect of all time worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the before-mentioned Notice F.H. (15) to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of an Order of the Minister of Labour confirming the variation of Minimum Rates of Wages made by the Trade Board and set out above, and specifying the twenty-fourth day of November 1924 as the date from which such variation should become effective.
