1. The Lord Chamberlain announces that ladies already presented at Court who wish to be summoned to attend or to make presentations during the coming year, are requested to make written application to the Controller, Ceremonial Department, St. James's Palace, S.W. 1, on the 1st January next, but not before that date.

2. A lady attending may present one lady, for whom she must be responsible, in addition to her daughter or daughter-in-law. The names of ladies to be presented should be forwarded by the lady who wishes to make the presentation when she sends in her own name.

3. A lady presented for the first time can only present her daughter or daughter-in-law on the occasion when she is presented.

4. No applications can be received from ladies who wish to be presented. Their names must be forwarded by the ladies who wish to make the presentations.

5. Ladies may be accompanied to Court by their husbands if the latter have been presented. Ladies who wish to be accompanied by their husbands should state the fact in their applications, and they should also state if the ladies they desire to present wish to be accompanied by their husbands. Once the summons has been issued, the amending of a summons card in order to include a lady's husband can only be permitted under the most exceptional circumstances.

6. Summonses are issued to ladies about three weeks before the date on which their attendance is required, and should it not be convenient for a lady to attend on the date indicated, it will be open to her to make her excuses to the Lord Chamberlain in writing, when her name can, if desired, and if possible, be transferred to another list.

7. Details with regard to dress for both ladies and gentlemen will be issued with the summons cards.

It is urgently requested that all applications will be made strictly in accordance with the above Regulations.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday the 2nd January 1925, at 1 o'clock, for:—

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, The National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £4 per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April 1933.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £40,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds

issued will not exceed £4,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 5th January 1925 to Saturday the 10th January 1925 inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny), which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

4 PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1933.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1000, and £5000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will, as indicated in the Notice of 30th September 1924, rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 23rd March 1923. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 5th January 1925 to Saturday the 10th January 1925 inclusive; the first dividend payable on the 15th April 1925, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House, or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms, which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

12. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

NATIONAL DEBT.

GOVERNMENT STOCK (REDEMPTION). REGULATIONS.

The Treasury, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Third Schedule to the Finance Act, 1921, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, hereby make the following Regulations:—

1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Government Stock (Redemption) Regulations, 1924.

(2) In these Regulations the expression "person of unsound mind" includes a person who through mental infirmity arising from disease or age is incapable of managing his affairs, and the expression "committee" includes a quasi-committee.

(3) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies for the purpose of the interpretation of these Regulations as it applies for the purpose of the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

2.—(1) Where any principal moneys become payable on the redemption of any Government stock standing in the name of a stockholder who is a person of unsound mind, or an infant, or a person otherwise under disability, the committee, the guardian, or the person having power in law to administer the property of the stockholder may by notice in writing give to the Bank on behalf of the stockholder directions for the reinvestment of those moneys in such Government stock as may be specified in the directions.

(2) Where any directions for reinvestment are given under this Regulation, the Bank shall cause any Government stock purchased in pursuance of the directions to be transferred into the name or names in which the redeemed stock was standing in the books of the Bank at the date of redemption.

3. Any order or decree of any court in Great Britain or Northern Ireland whereby the right to receive any principal moneys which become payable on the redemption of any Government stock standing in the name of any stockholder (whether as sole stockholder or jointly with any other person) who is a person of unsound mind, or an infant, or a person otherwise under disability, is vested in any person as committee or guardian of the stockholder or otherwise, shall be sufficient authority to the Bank to pay the principal moneys to that person in accordance with the order or decree.

4. Nothing in these Regulations shall be taken to prejudice the right of the Bank to require evidence to be given to their satisfaction to prove that any person purporting to give directions under these Regulations is a person having power thereunder to give such directions, or that a person claiming to be paid any moneys under these Regulations is a person to whom the payment may properly be made thereunder, and with respect to matters incidental to such proof.

5.—(1) An official extract of any such appointment as is mentioned in Section 13 of the Judicial Factors (Scotland) Act, 1889, shall, in any case where any Government stock

is specified in the extract, or in a certificate under seal by the accountant of court produced together with the extract, as belonging to or forming part of the estate under the charge of the person named in the extract, be deemed for the purpose of these Regulations to be a decree whereby the right to receive the principal moneys becoming payable on the redemption of that stock is vested in the person so named.

(2) In the application of these Regulations to Scotland the expression "infant" includes pupil or minor and the expression "guardian" includes tutor or curator.

COLORADO BEETLE ORDER OF 1924.

(DATED 23RD DECEMBER 1924.)

(D.I.P. 541.)

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, orders as follows:—

Prohibition of Importation of Potatoes.

1. For the prevention of the introduction of the Colorado Beetle, the landing in England or Wales of any potatoes grown in the United States of America is hereby prohibited.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall take immediate effect, provided that this Order shall not be deemed to prevent the landing of potatoes shipped from the United States of America before the date of this Order.

Short Title.

This Order may be cited as the COLORADO BEETLE ORDER OF 1924.

DUNBARTONSHIRE ELECTRICITY.

NOTICE is hereby given that application has been made to the Electricity Commissioners by the County Council of the County of Dunbarton (hereinafter referred to as "the Undertakers"), whose address is County Buildings, Dumbarton, for a special order (hereinafter referred to as "the Order") under the Electricity (Supply) Acts, 1882 to 1922, for the following among other purposes (that is to say):—

1. To authorise the Undertakers to generate, store, distribute, sell, and supply electrical energy for all public and private purposes as defined by the Electricity (Supply) Acts, 1882 to 1922, within the areas in the County of Dunbarton hereinafter described, namely:—

(1) The Parish of Bonhill and so much of the parishes of Row, Cardross, Dunbarton, Old Kilpatrick, New Kilpatrick and Kirkintilloch in the County of Dunbarton as is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the northerly point of the parish of Row at Craigan Sithe, thence proceeding generally in a south-easterly, southerly, south-easterly and southerly direction along the north-western boundary of the parish of Row following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary between the parishes of Row and Cardross meets the northern boundary of the parish of Cardross, thence south-easterly along the northern boundary of the parish of Cardross following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary between the parishes of Bonhill and Cardross meets the western boundary of the parish of Bonhill, thence in a northerly, north-easterly, south-easterly, easterly, southerly, south-easterly direction along the northern boundary of the parish of Bonhill following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary between the parishes of Bonhill and Dunbarton meets the northern boundary of the parish of Dunbarton, thence generally in an easterly, north-easterly, easterly and south-easterly direction along the northern boundary of the parish of Dunbarton following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary between the parishes of Dunbarton and Old Kilpatrick meets the northern boundary of the parish of Old Kilpatrick, thence generally in a south-easterly and easterly direction along the northern boundary of the parish of Old Kilpatrick following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary between the parishes of Old Kilpatrick and New Kilpatrick meets the northern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick, thence generally in an easterly, north-easterly, south-easterly, easterly and southerly and easterly direction along the north-eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick following the bends thereof to the point where that boundary crosses the Glasgow and Balfron highway at Craigmaddie Reservoir, thence in a south-westerly direction along the said highway for a distance of 340 yards or thereabouts, thence in a north-westerly direction following the bends for a distance of 2120 yards or thereabouts to a point 107 yards or thereabouts to the north of Clober House, thence in a southerly direction along an imaginary straight line for

a distance of 2443 yards or thereabouts to a point 700 yards or thereabouts north-west of Kilmardinny House, thence in a westerly direction along an imaginary straight line for a distance of 6700 yards or thereabouts to a point on the Loch Humphrey Burn near Coch-nohill 880 yards or thereabouts north of Duntiglennan, thence in a southerly direction to a point on the southern boundary of the parish of Old Kilpatrick where the Duntocher Burn falls into the River Clyde, thence generally in a north-westerly and westerly direction along the southern boundary of the parish of Old Kilpatrick following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary of the parish of Old Kilpatrick meets the eastern boundary of the burgh of Dunbarton, thence in a north-easterly, north-westerly, westerly and southerly direction along the boundary of the burgh of Dunbarton following the bends thereof to the point where the said boundary meets the southern boundary of the parish of Cardross, thence generally in a westerly, northerly, north-westerly, easterly and north-westerly direction along the southern and western boundaries of the parish of Cardross following the bends thereof to the point where the boundary between the parish of Cardross and the burgh of Helensburgh meets the south-western boundary of the parish of Cardross, thence generally in a north-easterly, north-westerly, south-westerly and southerly direction along the boundary of the burgh of Helensburgh following the bends thereof to the point on Gareloch where the boundary between the parish of Row and the burgh of Helensburgh meets the southern boundary of the parish of Row, thence generally in a north-westerly and north-easterly direction along the western boundary of the parish of Row following the bends thereof to the point of commencement.

(2) So much of the parish of New Kilpatrick as is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the north-eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick 500 feet or thereabouts south of the eighth milestone on the highway leading from Glasgow to Balfron, thence proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 4890 feet to a point on the eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick 1190 feet south-east of Douglaston House, thence generally in a north-easterly, northerly and north-westerly direction along the eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick following the bends thereof to the point of commencement.

(3) So much of the parish of New Kilpatrick as is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick on the Allander Water 1550 feet or thereabouts north-east of Bocclair Farm Steading, thence proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 400 feet or thereabouts to a point 720 feet or thereabouts north-east of Bench Mark 168.0 on the highway leading to Bocclair Farm Steading, thence in an easterly direction along an imaginary straight line for a distance of 2160 feet or thereabouts to the point at the eastern end of Temple of Bocclair Farm Steading, thence in a south-westerly direction along an imaginary straight line for a distance of 9200 feet to a point on the south-eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick at Garscube Bridge, thence in an

easterly, north-easterly, northerly and westerly direction along the eastern boundary of the parish of New Kilpatrick following the bends thereof to the point of commencement.

(4) So much of the parish of Kirkintilloch as is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the northerly point of the said parish at a point 550 feet or thereby south of Wellshot Hospital, thence proceeding generally in a south-westerly direction along the north-western boundary of the parish of Kirkintilloch following the bends thereof to a point where the said parish boundary crosses the River Kelvin 950 feet west of Inchbelly Bridge, thence in an easterly direction following the south bank of the River Kelvin to a point on the bridge where the highway to Kilsyth crosses the River Kelvin at Inchbelly Bridge, thence in a south-easterly direction following an imaginary straight line for a distance of 7800 feet to a point on the London and North Eastern Railway, Glasgow to Edinburgh main line, 550 feet south-east of Woodilee Lunatic Asylum at Bench Mark 235.2, thence in a south-westerly direction following an imaginary straight line for a distance of 2000 feet or thereabouts to a point on the boundary of the parish of Kirkintilloch 600 feet north-west of Craigenbay, thence in an easterly direction along the southern and eastern boundary of the parish of Kirkintilloch following the bends thereof to the point of commencement.

(5) So much of the parish of Kirkintilloch as is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary of the said parish where the south bank of the River Kelvin meets the said boundary 950 feet or thereabouts south of Inchbreck Farm Steading, thence generally in a northerly, southerly, south-westerly, westerly and southerly direction along the northern boundary of the parish of Kirkintilloch following the bends thereof to the point where the southern bank of the River Kelvin meets the boundary of the said parish 300 feet east of Bench Mark 125.5 on the bridge carrying the highway from Kirkintilloch to Kilsyth over the River Kelvin, thence following the south bank of the River Kelvin to the point of commencement.

(6) So much of the parish of Kirkintilloch as is bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary of the burgh of Kirkintilloch meets the western boundary of the parish of Kirkintilloch on the Park Burn 400 feet or thereabouts west of Scottsblair Farm Steading, thence proceeding in a south-westerly direction along the western boundary of the parish of Kirkintilloch following the bends thereof to a point on the highway leading from Lenzie to Glasgow 500 feet or thereabouts east of Bench Mark 221.5, thence in a north and north-easterly direction along the west side of the highway leading from Glasgow to Kirkintilloch following the bends thereof to a point where the boundary of the burgh of Kirkintilloch crosses the said highway at a point 750 feet or thereabouts north-east of West Gallowhill Farm Steading, thence in a north-westerly direction along the western boundary of the burgh of Kirkintilloch following the bends thereof to the point of commencement.

Which areas are hereinafter referred to as "the area of supply."

2. To confer upon the Undertakers such of the powers contained in the Electricity (Supply) Acts, 1882 to 1922, and in the enactments incorporated therewith as are usually conferred upon distributors of electrical energy and to incorporate with the Order and make applicable to the Undertakers and the proposed undertaking with such variations as are or may be contained in the Order all or some of the provisions contained in the Schedule to the Electric Lighting (Clauses) Act, 1899.

3. To authorise the Undertakers as an alternative to the methods of charging mentioned in Section 31 of the Schedule to the Electric Lighting (Clauses) Act, 1899, to charge for energy supplied by them for private house lighting or other domestic purposes by way of a service rental charge according to the number of apartments in the house supplied with an additional charge for each unit of energy actually supplied or by any other method selected by them and approved by the Minister of Transport.

4. To empower the Undertakers to transfer or lease to any company, body, or person all or some of the rights, powers, authorities, obligations and liabilities of the Undertakers under the Order for such period and upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed.
