His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Mr. Matthew James Campbell for his bravery in the following circumstances:—

On 27th October 1924, while Campbell, together with two other men named George Lawton and William Lambking, was working in a shaft of the Northern Suburbs Ocean Outfall Sewer at Sydney, New South Wales, a hammer used in pile driving gave way and carried away the greater part of the staging about 200 feet from the bottom of the shaft on which the men were working. Both Lawton and Lambking were injured, but Campbell, who was unhurt, managed to hold them one in each arm until his strength was exhausted and he had to loose his hold of Lawton, who fell to the bottom and was killed. Campbell managed to retain his hold of Lambking: he succeeded in placing him in a bucket and getting him drawn to the surface. He then went down to the bottom of the shaft alone to render any help he could to Lawton but, finding him dead, placed the body in the bucket and it was brought to the surface. By this time Campbell was absolutely exhausted

and he collapsed, but was extricated from the shaft by other workmen who came on the scene.

There is no doubt that in holding on to the two injured men while standing on a very narrow plank Campbell incurred a grave risk of falling to the bottom and of losing his life. He displayed courage of a very high order in retaining his hold of Lambking, and undoubtedly saved his life.

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal in recognition of the gallantry of the late Mr. Hugh Frederick Moodie and the late Mr. John Borland Brown, who gave their lives on the occasion of a serious fire at the Bellbird Colliery, New South Wales, in September 1923, in a gallant attempt to save the lives of their comrades:—

The fire started just after the afternoon shift had commenced work. Moodie, a deputy on the afternoon shift, entered the mine about 1 p.m., and was proceeding to his work when he met the day-shift deputies returning, who reported that all was in order. He continued on his way but soon encountered dense smoke. He went back to the day-shift deputies, told them what he had found, and then went forward alone to try to rescue his men. He was an experienced deputy, and must have been fully aware of the risk he was taking. He was not seen alive again, but when the mine was re-opened his body was found in a position which showed that he must have travelled over a thousand yards in his efforts to save the men.

At about 2.30 p.m. on the same day Brown and other volunteers from neighbouring collieries entered the mine on rescue work. They found two men, one of whom it was thought might be alive, but the air was so bad that the rescuers were forced to retreat. After two further attempts Brown was successful in reaching the bodies, and spent twenty minutes in a vain attempt at resuscitation. He then, accompanied by another man, pushed on, but was driven back by foul air, and returned to the surface to organise rescue parties. He descended with one party, recovered four bodies, and took them safely to the surface. He then descended for the third time, and penetrated to the most forward point then reached, when an explosion occurred. Brown was seriously affected by the fumes, and urged his companions to leave him and go on. His companions tried to help him, but in response to his urgent entreaties finally left him lying in the tunnel, where his body was, afterwards discovered.

THE MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

CITY AND ROYAL BURGH OF DUNDEE.

So much of Broughty Ferry Road, Blackscroft and Seagate as extends from the east side of Lilybank Road to the west side of St. Andrews Street;

So much of Nethergate and Perth Road as extends from the west side of South Tay Street to the west side of Shepherds Loan; and

High Street, Lochee.
