SAFEGUARDING OF INDUSTRIES ACT, 1921, AS AMENDED BY SECTION 10 OF
THE FINANCE ACT, 1926.

LISTS OF ARTICLES CHARGEABLE WITH DUTY UNDER PART I.

(Safeguarding of Key Industries.)

The Board of Trade make the following announcement:—

1. Section 1 (5) of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, provides that for the purpose of preventing disputes arising as to whether any goods are or are not chargeable with duty under Part I. of the Act, the Board of Trade may from time to time issue lists defining the articles which are to be taken as falling under any of the general descriptions set out in the Schedule to the Act, and where any list is so issued defining the articles which are to be taken as falling under such general description, the said Schedule shall have effect as if the articles comprised in the list were therein substituted for that general description.

2. In pursuance of the foregoing provisions, lists prepared by the Board of Trade were published in the Edinburgh Gazette on 23rd September 1921, defining certain of the general descriptions set out in the Schedule.

3. The Board of Trade have prepared the accompanying additional lists which to the extent to which they add to the lists previously issued, are to be regarded as further defining the articles which are to be taken as falling under the following general descriptions in the Schedule to the Act, viz. :—

- Optical glass and optical elements, whether finished or not (See List A (ii.)).
- Optical instruments. (See List B (ii.)).
- Scientific glassware. (See List C (ii.)).
- Laboratory porcelain. (See List D (ii.)).
- Scientific instruments. (See List E (ii.)).
- Synthetic organic chemicals (other than synthetic organic dyestuffs, colours, and colouring matters imported for use as such, and organic intermediate products imported for their manufacture) analytical re-agents, all other fine chemicals (except sulphate of quinine of vegetable

origin) and chemicals manufactured by fermentation processes. (See List H (ii.).

4. Articles included in any of the accompanying lists will, subject to the provisions of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, be

chargeable with duty under Part I. of the Act, as amended, on and after the 15th January 1927.

Synthetic organic dyestuffs, colours, and colouring matters and organic intermediate products used in the manufacture thereof are, however, liable to duty under Part I. of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, when not exempted in the circumstances indicated above.

When any organic chemical in this list includes a simple or compound radical which is not qualified by mono, di, tri, tetra, &c., the

list is to be read as including all forms of the chemical covered by the introduction of such qualifications of that radical.

When any organic chemical in this list includes a simple or compound radical which is not qualified by ortho, meta, para, alpha, beta, iso, &c., the list is to be read as including all forms of the chemical covered by the introduction of such qualifications of that radical.

This list is to be read as also including the salts of any amino and other basic organic compounds named therein.

Headings or items in this list are not to be deemed for the purposes of this list to include within their scope any compounds specified in any previous list issued by the Board of Trade.

LEAD PAINT (PROTECTION AGAINST POISONING) ACT, 1926.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice, in pursuance of Section 80 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, that he proposes to make Regulations under Section 1 of the Lead Paint (Protection against Poisoning) Act, 1926, for preventing danger from lead paint to persons employed in or in connection with the painting of buildings.

Copies of the Regulations proposed to be made may be obtained on application to the Chief Inspector of Factories, Home Office, London, S.W.1.

Any objections to the draft Regulations by or on behalf of any persons affected must be sent to the Secretary of State, Home Office, London, S.W.1. within 40 days from the date of this Notice. Every objection must be in writing and must state (a) the draft Regula-

tions or portions of draft Regulations objected to; (b) the specific grounds of objection; and (c) the omissions, additions, or modifications asked for.

LEAD PAINT (PROTECTION AGAINST POISONING) ACT, 1926.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that on the 24th December 1926 the following were made:—

(1) An Order under Section 3 of the Act, further modifying the application of the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, mentioned in the said Section, in any case where persons are employed in painting buildings.

(2) A Rule under Section 7 of the Act, as to the method of treatment to be applied for the purpose of ascertaining whether any paint or other material used in painting is "lead paint" within the meaning of the Act.
