"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the proposals set forth in the annexed Schedule.

"SCHEDULE.

"1. All Retired Officers, Royal Marines, including Warrant Officers, Temporary Officers and Acting Warrant Officers retired with retired pay or gratuities, shall be liable to recall for service in time of war or emergency under the general regulations and conditions applicable to Retired Officers, Royal Navy.

"2. The Reserve of Officers, Royal Marines, established by Order in Council of the 12th March 1903, to be abolished from the date of this Order.

"3. The Officers referred to at (b) and (c) of Rule 2 of the Schedule to the Order in Council dated the 15th August 1918, to cease to be eligible for commissions in the Special Reserve of Officers, Royal Marines, established by that Order.

"4. An Emergency List to be established for Officers, Royal Marines, who have been or may be allowed to resign their commissions, but who volunteer to serve in time of war or emergency, under the general regulations and conditions applicable to the Emergency List for Officers, Royal Navy, established by Order in Council of the 13th May 1901.

"5. Retired Officers, Royal Marines, voluntarily re-employed in time of peace, or who may be appointed to attend courses of instruction, to be dealt with as regards emoluments in the same manner as Retired Officers, Royal Navy, similarly re-employed or undergoing instruction."

WHEREAS it is enacted by section twelve of the Coinage Act, 1870, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time by Order to make regulations respecting the trial of the pyx and all matters incidental thereto, and in particular respecting certain matters specified in the said section :

And whereas regulations respecting the trial of the pyx were made by the Trial of the Pyx Order in Council, 1871 (in this Order referred to as “the Order of 1871”) :

And whereas the Order of 1871 was amended by the Trial of the Pyx Order in Council, 1901 (in this Order referred to as “the Order of 1901”) :

And whereas it is expedient to amend the Orders of 1871 and 1901 :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Trial of the Pyx Order, 1927.

2. Reference in the Order of 1901 to the Order of 1871 shall be construed as reference to that Order as amended by this Order, and Article 4 of the Order of 1901 shall be revoked.

3. The following provisions of this Order shall have effect in substitution for the provisions in the Order of 1871, beginning with the words “That with a view to the trial of the pyx,” and ending with the words “weighed and assayed as aforesaid” :

4. (1) The Master or Deputy Master of the Mint shall with a view to the trial of the pyx cause to be set aside one gold coin out of every two thousand pieces ready for issue, and one silver coin from each journey weight consisting of sixty pounds troy weight of silver coins.

(2) The gold coins so set apart, and the silver coins so set apart, shall be kept together in such number of packets as may be convenient, and the said packets shall be sealed up at the Mint before being taken to the trial.

5. The jury shall ascertain the number of coins in each packet produced to them, and whether that number corresponds with the number which the officers of the Mint represent the packet to contain.

6. The jury shall take out from each packet of gold coins as many coins as they think necessary for the purpose of the trial of the gold coins, and—

(a) shall weigh separately each of the coins taken out so as to ascertain whether it is within the remedy as to weight ;

(b) after weighing the coins separately, shall melt all the coins weighed into an ingot and assay the ingot, comparing it with the standard trial plate of gold, so as to ascertain whether the metal of the ingot is within the remedy as to fineness ;

(c) shall weigh in bulk the residue of the coins remaining in the packets of gold coins so as to ascertain whether they are on the whole within the remedy as to weight ;

(d) after weighing the residue of the coins, shall take out of the residue as many pieces as they think fit and weigh and assay them separately.

7. The jury shall take from each packet of silver coins as many coins as they think necessary, not weighing less in all than one pound troy, for the purpose of the trial of the silver coins, and—

(a) shall weigh each one pound troy weight of the coins taken out so as to ascertain whether the coins so bulked are within the prescribed remedy as to weight ;

(b) shall assay separately such number of coins as they think fit, not weighing less in all than one pound troy, comparing them with the trial plate of silver so as to ascertain whether the metal of the coins is on the whole within the remedy as to fineness ;

(c) shall weigh in bulk the residue of the

coins remaining in the packets of silver coins so as to ascertain whether they are on the whole within the remedy as to weight.

S. The jury shall by their verdict—

(a) find whether the ingot consisting of the melted gold coins is or is not within the variation from the standard fineness allowed under the Coinage Acts, 1870 to 1920;

(b) declare the weight and millesimal fineness of each of the gold coins separately weighed and assayed;

(c) find whether each pound troy of silver coins weighed and assayed as aforesaid is on the whole within the variation from fineness and standard weight allowed under the Coinage Acts, 1870 to 1920;

(d) find as respects both gold coins and silver coins whether the coins weighed in bulk are, on the whole, within the variation from the standard weight allowed under the Coinage Acts, 1870 to 1920.

If the jury find that in any case there is any variation from the standard weight or fineness, they shall specify in their verdict the amount of the variation.

And whereas by Section 1 of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is (among other things) provided that references in Part XI. of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, to the Mercantile Marine Fund shall be construed as references to the General Lighthouse Fund by the now reciting Act constituted:

And whereas under an Order in Council made on the 14th day of December 1922, in pursuance of the above recited powers, the engineering establishment of the Corporation of the Trinity House of Deptford Strond (hereinafter referred to as "the Corporation") being one of the General Lighthouse Authorities referred to in the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, includes the post of Surveyor of Shipping and Marine Engineer hereinafter referred to:

And whereas it is expedient that the engineering establishment of the Corporation should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Board of Trade have consented to such variation:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and of any other powers Him thereunto enabling, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Trinity House (Variation of Establishment) (No. 2) Order, 1927.

2. The salary for the post of Surveyor of Shipping and Marine Engineer mentioned in the Second Schedule to the Order in Council dated the 14th December 1922 shall, as from the 3rd day of February 1928 be £550 per annum rising by annual increments of £20 to a maximum of £650 per annum instead of a fixed annual Salary of £500 per annum as stated in that Schedule.

3. The salary payable under the provisions of this Order shall be paid out of the General Lighthouse Fund.

"(5) Where it is made to appear to His Majesty that the legislature of any British possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs or trade marks patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order in Council, to apply the provisions of this Section to that Possession, with such variations or additions, if any, as may be stated in the Order":

And whereas it is made to appear to His Majesty that the legislature of the Irish Free State has made satisfactory provision for the protection of Inventions, Designs and Trade Marks, patented or registered in the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by virtue and in pursuance of the provisions of the above recited Sub-section, and of every other power Him thereunto enabling, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 and 1919, shall apply to the Irish Free State.

2. This Order shall take effect from the 1st October 1927.

"(10) A person to whom a licence to drive any motor car has been issued under Article 2 of the Motor Car (International Circulation) (Amendment) Order, 1921, shall, for such time as that licence continues in force, be deemed to be the holder of a licence under Sub-Section (1) of this Section; and any person driving a motor car who, when his licence is demanded by a police officer or constable, produces a licence to drive the car issued under the said Article shall be deemed to have complied with the requirements of Sub-section (4) of this Section";

(c) to Section 4 thereof there shall be added the following Sub-section:—

"(8) in Sub-section (1), except in paragraph (b) thereof, and in Sub-sections (2), (4) and (5), of this Section the expressions 'licence under this Part of this Act' and 'licence' shall include a licence issued under Article 2 of the Motor Car (International Circulation) (Amendment) Order 1921, so, however, that as respects any such licence paragraph (c) of the said Sub-section (1) shall have effect as if a reference to the London County Council were substituted for the reference to 'the council by whom any licence so endorsed has been granted.'"

PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the authority conferred on Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, and having regard to the provisions of the revised Berne Copyright Convention of 1908, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the 24th day of June 1912 (hereinafter called the Principal Order), extending the protection of the said Act to certain classes of works to which protection is guaranteed by the said Convention.

And whereas Estonia has acceded to the said Convention subject to the reservations mentioned in the Schedule to this Order:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Principal Order shall extend to Estonia as if that country were amongst the Foreign Countries of the Copyright Union therein named, subject to the following modifications:—

(a) The provisions of Article 2, proviso (iii.) (a), and Article 2, proviso (iii.) (c) of the

Principal Order shall apply as if Estonia were included amongst the Foreign Countries named in those provisions.

(b) In the application of the provisions of Article 3 of the Principal Order to works of which the country of origin is Estonia the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act and for the commencement of the Principal Order.

(c) In the application to such works of Sections 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act in Sections 19 (7) and 19 (8) wherever that expression occurs, and the 9th June 1927, for the passing of the Act.

(d) In the application to such works of Section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs in Subsection 1 (a) and for the 26th July 1910, in Subsection 1 (b).

2. This Order may be cited as the Berne Copyright Convention (Estonia) Order, 1927.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

**ROADS ACT, 1920.
 COUNTY OF STIRLING.**

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 7TH NOVEMBER 1927.)

EXPORTATION AND TRANSIT OF HORSES, ASSES AND MULES (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1927.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1927, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Amendment of Article 5 of the Exportation and Transit of Horses, Asses and Mules Order of 1921.

1. Article 5 of the Exportation and Transit of Horses, Asses and Mules Order of 1921, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," shall be read and have effect as if the following additional provisions were inserted therein, namely:—

"Unfavourable Weather.

"(27). Horses, asses or mules shall not be carried on any voyage of a vessel if, in the judgment of the master of such vessel, there are reasonable grounds for anticipating that owing to adverse weather conditions the voyage would be attended by serious injury or suffering to, or loss of life among, the animals."

"Plans to be furnished in certain cases.

"(28). In the case of vessels fitted or refitted for the carriage of horses after the date of this Order, the owners of the vessel shall cause the Ministry to be furnished in duplicate with plans showing the

"general arrangement of the fittings and a longitudinal section showing in detail the proposed fittings."

Amendment of Chapter III. of the Principal Order as to Cleansing and Disinfection.

2. The provisions of Chapter III. of the Principal Order are hereby modified as follows:—

(1). Sub-sections (i) and (ii) of paragraph (1) of Article 20 are hereby revoked and the following sub-sections substituted therefor:—

"(i) All parts of the vessel with which any such animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept and then be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water and then disinfected by being thoroughly coated or washed or saturated with an approved disinfectant;

(ii) All fittings, pens, hurdles or utensils used for or about the animals shall be scraped and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water and then disinfected by being thoroughly coated or washed or saturated with an approved disinfectant."

(2). Sub-sections (i) and (ii) of paragraph (1) of Article 23 are hereby revoked and the following sub-sections substituted therefor:—

"(i) The floor of the truck and all other parts thereof with which any such animal or its droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept and the scrapings and sweepings and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom;

(ii) The same parts of the truck shall then be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water and then disinfected by being thoroughly coated or washed or saturated with an approved disinfectant."

(3) (a) In sub-section (i) of paragraph (1) of Article 24 the words "disinfected in the manner hereinafter prescribed. The floor and other parts shall thereafter be" shall be deleted.

(b) In sub-section (iii) of Article 24, the words "an approved disinfectant" shall be substituted for the words "one of the disinfectants hereinafter described."

(4) Article 25 of the principal Order is hereby revoked.

3. In the principal Order, as amended by this Order, the expression "an approved disinfectant" means a disinfectant approved for the purposes of the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1926, if used at the dilution at which such disinfectant is so approved.

Amendment of Specification for Fittings.

4.—(1) Article 4 of the Exportation and Transit of Horses, Asses and Mules (Amendment) Order of 1923, is hereby revoked.

(2) In the principal Order, the Schedule (*Specification for certain fittings on vessels carrying horses, asses or mules*) shall be read and have effect as if, in the section headed "Dimensions of Stalls," the following paragraph were substituted for the paragraph re-

lating to the space from foot platform to the deck above horse's head, namely:—

“The height from foot platform to the deck above shall be not less than 7 feet in the clear; from foot platform to underside of beam above not less than 6 feet 6 inches in the clear; Provided that no beam or projection from the deck above or any other obstruction the underside of which is less than 7 feet in the clear from the foot platform is in the stall area or corresponding area in the passage way within 3 feet of the front of the stall. These requirements shall also apply in the case of portable boxes carried under deck cover.”

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-first day of November nineteen hundred and twenty-seven.

Short Title, &c.
