WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 27th day of April 1928 (N. 1170 28), in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas we consider it expedient that a Naval rating should be employed as a Draughtsman on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief, Mediterranean Station, for the purpose of analysing the results of Fleet exercises and of preparing scale drawings:

“And whereas we consider that this duty warrants the payment of an allowance to the rating selected to act as Draughtsman:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to authorise the payment of an allowance of 9d. a day to the

Naval rating employed as Draughtsman in the Fleet Flagship of the Mediterranean Fleet.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 24th day of April 1928 (C.W. 1275 28), in the words following, viz.:—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein

shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“ And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 26th day of May 1925, to approve of the payment of an allowance of 6s. a day, in addition to the normal emoluments of their rank, to Commissioned Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines while attached to Your Majesty's Royal Air Force for service with the Fleet Air Arm, and borne on the books of one or other of Your Majesty's Ships in Commission:

“ And whereas it is the intention that qualified Naval and Marine Pilots should cease temporarily to be employed as Pilots during certain periods, when they will be employed on General Naval Service:

“ And whereas we are of opinion that, during such periods, Officers qualified as Pilots, whom it is the intention to re-employ later as Pilots, should be given flying practice, and should receive an allowance on each day on which they are required to carry out practice flights:

“ We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the payment to qualified Naval and Marine Pilots of an allowance of 6s. a day on days on which they carry out flights as Pilots during their periods of General Naval Service. Payment of the allowance to be limited to a maximum of 12 days annually in the case of any one officer, payable only on actual days of ascent, except that, in the event of an officer in these circumstances contracting, while flying, a disability directly attributable to conditions peculiar to flying, payment of the allowance during sickness so arising may be continued under such conditions as we may from time to time determine.

“ The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, and having regard to the provisions of the revised Berne Copyright Convention of 1908, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the 24th day of June 1912 (hereinafter called the Principal Order), extending the protection of the said Act to

certain classes of works to which protection is guaranteed by the said Convention:

And whereas Finland has acceded to the said Convention subject to the reservation mentioned in the Schedule to this Order:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Principal Order shall extend to Finland as if that country were amongst the Foreign Countries of the Copyright Union therein named, subject to the following modifications:—

(a) The provisions of Article 2 Proviso (iii.) (b) of the Principal Order shall apply as if Finland were included amongst the foreign countries named in those provisions.

(b) In the application of the provisions of Article 3 of the Principal Order to works of which the country of origin is Finland the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act and for the commencement of the Principal Order.

(c) In the application to such works of Sections 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act, in Sections 19 (7) and 19 (8) wherever that expression occurs, and the 1st April 1928 for the passing of the Act.

(d) In the application to such works of Section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs in Subsection 1 (a), and for the 26th July 1910 in Subsection 1 (b).

2. This Order may be cited as the Berne Copyright Convention (Finland) Order, 1928.

And the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

EXTRADITION TREATY OF MAY 18, 1926,
BETWEEN THE UNITED KINGDOM
AND LITHUANIA.

Whereas by the "Lithuania (Extradition) Order in Council 1927," it was provided that from and after the 11th day of June 1927 the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, should apply in the case of the Republic of Lithuania under and in accordance with the Treaty concluded on the 18th day of May 1926 between His Majesty and the President of the Republic of Lithuania:

And whereas it was further provided by the said Order in Council that the operation of the said Acts should be and remain suspended within the self-governing Dominions hereinafter named, that is to say, the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua and Norfolk Island), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State and Newfoundland, and India, until notification should have been made in the London Gazette that the Treaty had been made applicable thereto, and that on such notification being made in respect of any such Dominion or India the said Acts should apply in such Dominion or India in the case of the Republic of Lithuania under and in accordance with the said Treaty as from the date of the said notification:

Now, therefore, it is hereby notified that the said Treaty has been made applicable to the Commonwealth of Australia (including for this purpose Papua and Norfolk Islands), the Dominion of New Zealand, the Union of South Africa, the Irish Free State and Newfoundland, and India, as and from the present date, viz.:—the 4th day of May 1928.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926.

IMPORTED ROSE TREES.

It is announced that an application for an Order in Council under the above-mentioned Act, to require the marking with an indication of origin of imported rose trees, has been referred for inquiry to the Standing Committee set up under the Act by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, the Secretary of State for the Home Department, and the Secretary of State for Scotland, acting jointly.

Attention is called to the fact that, under the provisions of the Act, while the Committee in every case referred to them must consider

whether the goods should bear the indication of origin at the time of sale or exposure for sale, they may also, at their discretion, consider and report upon the question whether such goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of importation.

The date of the Inquiry in this case will be announced later. Any communication with regard to the matter should, however, be addressed, as early as possible, to Mr. H. J. Johns, the Secretary of the Standing Committee, 10 Whitehall Place, London, S.W.1.

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Bertie Frederick Crosby, in recognition of his gallantry in the following circumstances:—

About 10.40 a.m. on the 9th of September 1927, a serious fire broke out at the premises of the Film Waste Products Limited, Redmill Street, Regent's Park. A quantity of cinematograph film which was being manipulated in a drying machine ignited without any warning, and the fire immediately spread to other film on adjacent benches and in other containers.

Crosby, who was then only 16 years of age, was passing through the drying room when the fire broke out. He at once ran to a door leading out into a yard, but on hearing a scream from near the drying machine he turned back into the room and made his way towards the machine, the contents of which were burning fiercely. He was unable to see anyone and he returned to the door leading into the yard. Here Crosby met the foreman, and together, Crosby leading, they re-entered the room. As they made their way in, Crosby saw a girl fall up against one of the work tables, and he ran to her and half pulled and half carried her towards the door. Outside the door they both fell. Crosby was stupefied by the heat and the fumes, and did not recover full consciousness until he found himself out in the yard with his clothes alight. He extinguished his clothes by the canal which ran at the bottom of the yard, and was subsequently removed to St. Pancras Hospital.

The fire, which spread to another factory and two workshops, was particularly violent, and resulted unfortunately in the death of five persons. Crosby could easily have escaped from the building without injury, but on two separate occasions he re-entered the room where the fire originated, in an endeavour to save life. The girl whom he helped out of the

building afterwards died, and the burns sustained by Crosby were such that at one time it was not thought that he would recover.
