WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1925.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that on the 18th March 1929 he made a special Scheme under Section 47 of the above Act, providing for the payment of compensation in respect of the disease known as Silicosis, for workmen employed in the Sandstone Industry. The Scheme, which may be cited as The Sandstone Industry (Silicosis) Scheme, 1929, will come into force on the 1st April 1929, and applies to all workers employed in the Sandstone Industry on or after that date. It incorporates the principles included in Section 47 of the Act and provides (1) for the establishment of a General Trade Compensation Fund to which all employers in the Industry will be required to contribute, and out of which all compensation and other expenses under the Scheme will be paid; (2) for the appointment of a Medical Board for the purpose of conducting the medical examinations including the prescribed periodic examinations of workmen in the Industry and giving certificates under the Scheme; and (3) for the determination of awards of compensation by Joint Committees, representative of both employers and workmen in the Industry, presided over by independent chairmen.

The Various Industries (Silicosis) Scheme, 1928, so far as it applies to workmen employed in the Sandstone Industry, will be revoked as from 1st April 1929, except as regards cases to which the Scheme applies and in which the workman has not been employed in the Sandstone Industry on or after that date.

SURVEYING OPERATIONS.

Notice is given that H.M. Surveying Ships will be engaged in surveying operations, commencing on 15th April 1929 and continuing until about 15th November, in the under-mentioned localities:—

(1) England, East Coast:

- (a) Approaches to Lowestoft, between the parallels $52^{\circ} 26' N.$ and $52^{\circ} 34' N.$, extending seaward to a distance of about two miles.
- (b) Bridlington bay, extending seaward to a distance of one mile eastward of Smithic shoals.
- (c) Seaham harbour, extending seaward to a distance of about one mile; Alnmouth bay, extending seaward to a distance of three miles from the coast, and northward to the parallel of $55^{\circ} 25' N.$
- (d) Farn islands, to a distance of about two miles eastward of Longstone light-house.
- (e) River Thames estuary:
 - (i) West side of Goodwin sands, in the vicinity of West Goodwin light-buoys.
 - (ii) West swin, Middle deep, and south-west portion of Black deep, from Mouse light-vessel to Barrow deep light-vessel.
 - (iii) Westward of Margate, Gore and Horse channels.
 - (iv) Sheerness bar.

(2) North Sea:

In the vicinity of Dogger bank.

(3) England, South Coast:

- (a) Dover harbour.
- (b) Western portion of the Solent from Hurst fort to one and a half miles eastward of Solent banks light-buoy.
- (c) Area in Weymouth bay, about two miles square, between the following latitudes and longitudes: $50^{\circ} 30' 20'' N.$, $50^{\circ} 36' 20'' N.$ and $1^{\circ} 18' 00'' W.$, $1^{\circ} 21' 20'' W.$
- (d) Area to the southward of the Lizard, to seaward to a distance of three miles and between the meridians $5^{\circ} 14' W.$ and $4^{\circ} 53' W.$
- (e) Approaches to Helford river.

(4) England, West Coast:

- (a) An area off Hartland point, to seaward to a distance of two and a half miles.
- (b) An area between Puffin island and Great Ormes head, to seaward to a distance of three and a half miles.

(5) Scotland, West Coast:

- (a) Loch Inver and Loch Roe.
- (b) Eddrachilles bay and approaches between the parallels $58^{\circ} 21\frac{1}{4}' N.$ and $58^{\circ} 07\frac{1}{4}' N.$, and extending westward to the meridian of $5^{\circ} 32' W.$

- (c) Island of Gigha, between Gigha and the Mull of Cantyre and between parallels 55° 36' N. and 55° 45' N.

The Surveying Ships whilst conforming to the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, may, when at anchor within the areas specified, as an additional means for mutual safety, make use of the day, night and fog-signals prescribed in Articles 4 (b) and (c) and 15 (e) of the above-mentioned regulations, as authorised for a vessel laying or picking up a telegraph cable.

In connection with the above operations, floating beacons or buoys surmounted by a staff and flag will be moored as necessary. These beacons or buoys will not be lighted at night.

DUMFRIESSHIRE (GRETNA AND DORNOCK) ELECTRICITY SPECIAL ORDER, 1929.

(This Order is part of the Dumfriesshire Electricity Special Order which was originally applied for and was divided into two parts by the Electricity Commissioners.)

Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act
1899.

DUNDEE CORPORATION (GENERAL POWERS).

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made to the Secretary of State on or before the 17th day of April next under and in pursuance of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899 by the Lord Provost Magistrates and Councillors of the City and Royal Burgh of Dundee (hereinafter called "the Corporation" and "the City" respectively) for a Provisional Order (hereinafter called "the Order") to be confirmed by Parliament under the provisions of the said Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899.

The principal subject matters of the Order are as follows:—

To empower the Corporation to transfer to themselves in their capacity as Police Commissioners the lands property and estate known as Belmont Castle and the mansion house and offices thereof and farms and others thereon and to take such steps as may be necessary to enable the buildings to be used as a Home of Rest for the Workers of Dundee either by themselves providing a staff or arranging for any suitable Society or Institution to do the same.

To extend the time for compulsory purchase of lands under (a) Section 30 (Limitation of time for compulsory purchase of land) of the Dundee Corporation (Improvements and Tramways) Act 1913, (b) Section 18 (Limitation of time for compulsory purchase of lands) of the Dundee Corporation and Water and Gas Order 1925 and (c) Section 31 (Limitation of time for compulsory purchase of lands) of the Dundee Corporation Order 1927.

To provide for the increase of:—

- (1) the rates for the supply of water for domestic purposes to any person within the limits of compulsory supply in the County of Fife;

- (2) the public water rate to be levied in respect of the supply of water within the limits of compulsory supply in the County of Fife;
- (3) rates for supplies of water for domestic purposes to any person beyond or outwith the limits of compulsory supply in the County of Fife; and
- (4) rates and charges for supplies of water for other than domestic purposes within the limits of supply in the County of Fife;

and to authorise the increase of all the said rates and charges respectively beyond the rates and sums respectively charged for like purposes within the limits of supply in the County of Forfar or Angus to an extent not exceeding by more than 75 per cent. the respective rates and sums from time to time authorised to be levied and charged for like purposes respectively within the limits of compulsory supply or beyond or outwith the limits of compulsory supply as the case may be in the County of Forfar or Angus.

To vary Sections 35 and 36 of the Waterworks Clauses Act 1847 in their application to the Corporation and also Section 36 of the Dundee Water Act 1869.

To empower the Corporation to require all water used for refrigerating purposes or apparatus to be received through a meter and paid for at meter rates.

To empower the Corporation to lay electric lines and apparatus in private streets and to construct electrical substations, transforming stations and other works and means of access thereto under any streets.

To prohibit the use for lighting purposes of electricity supplied for any other purpose and to prohibit electricity supplied for lighting purposes being used for power or any other purpose than lighting.

To regulate the uses to which electricity supplied under agreement may be put and to give power to discontinue supplies unless satisfied that electricity is being used in accordance with agreements and to exempt the Corporation in certain cases from liability for failure to supply.

To make regulations as to maximum power of electricity to which any consumer is entitled and to provide for a minimum annual payment when supply used as a standby only.

To provide penalties for hindering or obstructing officers entering premises to ascertain as to consumption of electricity or removal of fittings and to enable the Corporation to enter unoccupied premises.

To provide as to notice of discontinuance of supply of electricity and service of same.

To provide for protection of seals and other locking devices and receptacles in connection with gas and electricity supplied.

To empower the Corporation to require the proprietor of any building to remove ashpits and provide in lieu thereof or otherwise portable ashbins.

To authorise the Corporation to provide buildings, machinery, plant and material for the treatment of refuse and the utilisation and selling or other disposal thereof.

To authorise the Corporation to borrow money for the purposes defined in the Order.

To amend Section 321 (Repayment of money

borrowed other than that now due by instalments or sinking fund in 60 years) of the Dundee Police Improvement and Consolidation Act 1882.

To authorise the Corporation to pay a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds towards the expenses of the Highland Agricultural Show during any year when such Show is held within the City.

Temporary dealing with private streets.

Provision of seats in promenades, streets, &c. of the City.

Regulation and restriction of public shows, swings, shooting galleries, singing and dancing saloons, &c.

Regulations in reference to banners, streamers, signs or letterings suspended across or hung over streets.

Authority to put up direction signs.

Regulation of temporary stands or structures within the City and submission of plans.

To authorise regulations within the City in reference to omnibuses in general or of any particular class, used on any particular route or running according to a time table, the stands occupied by them and places where they may stop and for how long and for what purposes, and to impose penalties for breaches.

To provide that no person shall be licensed to drive a motor vehicle licensed as a hackney carriage including an omnibus until he satisfies the Corporation of his ability to drive, and to empower magistrates to refuse to grant such a license until satisfied that an insurance is kept on foot to provide adequate financial provision for meeting liability in respect of any injury or damage occasioned by such carriage or omnibus to any person or property.

To empower the Magistrates when granting licenses to ply for hire with a hackney carriage or omnibus to impose upon licensees and insert in licenses conditions—

(a) That licensees other than the Corporation shall not pick up within the City passengers to be conveyed to another point within the City; and

(b) That where the licensees' route is wholly or partly over the tramway route a licensee shall charge not less than 50 per cent. above the tramway fare to the tramway terminus and shall not evade this condition by the issue of weekly or other special tickets

and to impose penalties on breach thereof.

To empower orders to be made for the removal of aged, infirm, diseased or neglected persons or those suffering from any grave chronic disease to suitable hospital or other place and to empower the Corporation to contribute towards the support of any person dependent upon such.

To provide for information being given by the occupier of any building in which any person suffering from any infectious disease is or has been, to enable the Medical Officer to take measures to prevent spread of disease.

To make factors agents and other persons acting for others liable to penalties under Lands Valuation Acts for false statements of yearly value or value of lands and heritages on assessment.

To confer, repeal, vary or extinguish all rights, powers, authorities, jurisdictions, exemptions and privileges.

To repeal amend incorporate and make applicable various Acts and Orders.

Notice is hereby further given that the Petition for the Order and the draft Order and printed copies thereof respectively will be lodged on or before the 17th day of April next with the Secretary of State, Scottish Office, Whitehall, London, S.W.1, and on or before the same day printed copies of the draft Order will be deposited in the Office of the Clerk of the Parliaments, House of Lords, and in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons.

On and after the 20th day of April next a copy of the draft Order may be inspected and copies obtained at the price of three shillings and sixpence a copy at the Offices of the undersigned Town Clerk and Parliamentary Agents respectively.

The procedure subsequent to the deposit of the Petition for and the draft Order in the Scottish Office will be by way of Provisional Order unless it is otherwise decided in terms of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act 1899, in which case the procedure may be by way of Private Bill, and if the subsequent procedure shall be by way of Private Bill this Notice and the Deposits and the other Notices in reference to the said intended application will, subject to the Standing Orders of Parliament, apply to such Bill.
