THE COMPANIES (FORMS) No. 2 ORDER, 1929, DATED NOVEMBER 30, 1929, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER THE COMPANIES ACT, 1929 (19 & 20 GEO. 5, c. 23).

**PORT ADMINISTRATION,**

**DERATISATION OF SHIPS.**

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (DERATISATION OF SHIPS) REGULATIONS (SCOTLAND), 1929, DATED NOVEMBER 12, 1929, MADE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH FOR SCOTLAND UNDER SECTION 78 OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1897 (60 & 61 VICT. c. 38).

The Department of Health for Scotland (to whom the powers and duties of the Local Government Board of Scotland have been transferred) do hereby, in pursuance of the powers competent to them under Section 78 of the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, make the following regulations:—

*Short Title and Commencement.*

These Regulations may be cited as the Public Health (Deratisation of Ships) Regulations (Scotland), 1929, and shall come into operation on the first day of January nineteen hundred and thirty.

*Interpretation.*

2.—(1) The Interpretation Act, 1889 (a) applies to the interpretation of these regulations as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

(2) In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires:—

“ The Department ” means the Department of Health for Scotland;

“ Local Authority ” means a port local authority and the local authority of a burgh or district in Scotland which includes or abuts on any part of a Customs port not within the jurisdiction of a port local authority where the medical officer of health appointed by the authority or council has been authorised by the Department to give deratisation certificates or deratisation exemption certificates;

“ Approved port ” means the district of a local authority the medical officer of health of which has been authorised by the Department to grant deratisation certificates or deratisation exemption certificates and in the case of a local authority other than a port local authority includes the waters of the Customs port abutting on any part of their district so far as such waters are not within the area of a port local authority;

“ Approved foreign port ” means a foreign port which has been notified to the Office International d'Hygiène Publique as possessing the equipment and personnel necessary for the deratisation of ships;

“ Medical officer of health ” means the medical officer of health of a local authority or a registered medical practitioner temporarily acting in that capacity and except in relation to the signing and issuing of Certificates includes any regis-

tered medical practitioner duly authorised by a local authority to act on behalf of the medical officer of health in the execution of these Regulations;

"Foreign port" means a port or place situate elsewhere than in Great Britain and Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man;

"Ship" includes a vessel or boat;

"Master" used in relation to a ship includes the officer or other person for the time being in charge of or in command of the ship;

"Deratisation certificate" and "deratisation exemption certificate" mean respectively a deratisation certificate and a deratisation exemption certificate issued under these Regulations and in conformity with Article 28 of the International Sanitary Convention of Paris, 1926, or issued in conformity with the said article by an approved foreign port;

"Valid certificate" means a certificate issued under these regulations or at an approved foreign port which has not been current for more than six months or in the case of a ship proceeding to her home port more than seven months from the date of the last inspection, and includes a deratisation certificate or a deratisation exemption certificate issued at an approved port or an approved foreign port in conformity with Article 28 of the International Sanitary Convention of Paris, 1926, prior to the issue of these regulations.

*Inspection, &c., of ships arriving from foreign ports and issue of certificates.*

3.—(1) On the arrival of a ship from a foreign port at an approved port, whether such approved port is the first port of call in Scotland or not, the medical officer of health or a duly authorised officer of the local authority acting on his behalf, shall require the master to produce a valid deratisation certificate or a valid deratisation exemption certificate.

(2) If no valid deratisation certificate or valid deratisation exemption certificate is produced in respect of any such ship the medical officer of health shall thereupon take such steps as he may consider necessary to satisfy himself that the ship is maintained in such a condition that the number of rats on board is kept down to the minimum.

If, after the ship has been inspected the medical officer of health is satisfied that the ship is free from rats or is maintained in such condition that the number of rats on board is kept down to the minimum, he shall sign and issue a deratisation exemption certificate.

If, in the opinion of the medical officer of health, the ship is not maintained in such condition that the number of rats on board is kept down to the minimum, he shall require the ship to be deratised in such manner as may be specified, or approved, by him, and the master shall forthwith make arrangements for the deratisation of the ship to be carried out to the satisfaction of the medical officer of health.

After the deratisation has been completed to the satisfaction of the medical officer of health he shall sign and issue a deratisation certificate.

*Issue of certificates on application by owner of ship.*

4. On application in writing received from the owner of any ship in an approved port, or from the master of the ship acting for and on behalf of the owner, for a deratisation exemption certificate or a deratisation certificate in respect of the ship, the medical officer of health shall take such steps as he may consider necessary to satisfy himself that the ship is maintained in such a condition that the rat population is kept down to the minimum, or give directions for the deratisation of the ship, as the case may require, and, on being satisfied as to the condition of the ship or that the deratisation of the ship has been properly carried out, he shall issue the appropriate certificate.

*General.*

5. For the purposes of these regulations the medical officer of health or a duly authorised officer of the local authority acting on his behalf shall have power to board and inspect any ship which is in an approved port.

6.—(1) All certificates issued under these regulations shall be in such form as the Department may from time to time approve.

(2) A copy of every certificate issued in pursuance of these regulations shall be retained in the office of the Local Authority, and a copy shall be forwarded to the Department.

*Expenses.*

7. The owner or the master of the ship shall pay to the Local Authority such fee for the inspection of the ship and for the issue of the certificate as the Local Authority may with the approval of the Department require.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF  
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 29TH NOVEMBER 1929.)

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1927, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

*Holding of Special Markets of Fat Stock at Glasgow Market.*

1. Notwithstanding anything contained in Article 5 of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected Areas Restrictions) Order of 1925 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") a special market or sale of animals intended for immediate slaughter may be held in that portion of Glasgow City Corporation Market described in the Schedule hereto, on each

Wednesday, subject to the following conditions:—

- (a) A Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority shall attend and examine the animals exposed at every such market or sale;
- (b) All the animals exposed at such market or sale on any Wednesday shall be slaughtered in the Glasgow City Abattoir adjoining the market before midnight on Friday of the same week.
- (c) No persons, except persons actually engaged in tending the animals, shall enter the market unless authorised to do so by written permit of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority.

*Regulation of Movement of Animals into Special Markets of Fat Stock in Glasgow Market.*

2. Notwithstanding anything contained in Articles 3 and 4 of the principal Order, animals intended for immediate slaughter may be moved into a special market or sale in Glasgow Market authorised by Article 1 of this Order, only from premises which are not situate in any Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Area; and the animals shall be accompanied by a licence authorising the movement, in the form set forth in the Schedule to this Order granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the City of Glasgow.

*Provision for Movement of Animals into Glasgow City Abattoir.*

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in Articles 3 and 4 of the principal Order an Inspector of the Local Authority of the City of Glasgow may, by licence in the form set forth in the Schedule to the principal Order with the necessary adjustment, authorise the movement into the Glasgow City Abattoir of animals intended for immediate slaughter provided that:—

(i.) animals moved into the Abattoir from premises in the Foot-and-Mouth Disease In-

fecting Area declared by the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Infected) Areas Order of 1929 (No. 36) shall be kept separate from all other animals in the Abattoir until they are slaughtered;

(ii.) imported animals moved into the Abattoir from any Approved Landing Place shall be slaughtered in the Abattoir within 48 hours from the time of their arrival in the Abattoir.

SCHEDULE.

1. *Portion of Glasgow Market referred to in Article 1.*

That portion of the Glasgow City Corporation Market adjoining the City Abattoir which extends for 200 feet or thereabouts from the boundary fence of the Abattoir to the central passage in the market, and from Duke Street to the Pig Pens near the passage leading from the market to the Abattoir.

2. *Form of Licence referred to in Article 2 (1).*

I, the undersigned, being an Inspector of the Local Authority of the City of Glasgow authorise by this licence given under the Order of the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries dated the 29th day of November 1929 (No. 4787) the movement of the undermentioned animals from the place or premises specified in Column III to the place or premises specified in Column IV, subject to the conditions set out below:—

I. Name and address of the person to whom this licence is granted.	II. Number and description of the animals to be moved.	III. Name or description of the place or premises from which the animals are to be moved.	IV. Name or description of the place or premises to which the animals are to be moved.

This licence shall be countersigned before the movement commences by an Inspector of the Local Authority specified in Column III.

NOTE.—Where the number of animals actually to be moved to the special market is less than the number specified the countersigning Officer must endorse and initial in

Column II on the licence the actual number to be moved.

This licence if authorising movement of animals to a special market is available for four days, including the day of the date hereof or such less period as may be specified on the licence by the Inspector granting or countersigning it, and no longer.

This licence may be cancelled at any time by a notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority on the person to whom the licence was granted.

**CONDITIONS.**

These should be carefully read and observed. Failure to comply with these conditions renders a person liable to prosecution and heavy penalties.

1. This licence does not authorise movement out of any infected area, whether for the purpose of reaching a destination in an infected area or otherwise.

2. The animals shall be moved in the manner and by the route, if any, specified in the licence. If the route is not so specified the animals shall be moved as far as practicable by railway, and by the nearest available route, and without avoidable delay to the place of destination specified in the licence and not elsewhere, and shall while being moved be kept separate so far as practicable from all other animals not being moved with a similar licence. The animals while being moved by railway shall not be untrucked until they reach the railway station nearest to the place of destination.\*

3. The licence shall accompany the animals throughout the movement, shall be produced on demand to an Inspector of the Ministry or Local Authority or to the Police, and shall, on arrival of the animals at the place or premises specified in Column IV, be delivered up forthwith to an Inspector of the Local Authority of the City of Glasgow.

4. Where the number of animals to be moved to a special market is less than the number in respect of which the licence was granted, the Inspector countersigning the licence must endorse thereon the number of animals proposed to be moved. The licence shall then be available only for the movement of the number of animals so endorsed.

5. Before movement all animals shall be marked as follows:—

*Cattle.*—A broad arrow, six inches long, clipped on left hindquarter, and hair clipped off end of tail.

*Sheep.*—A letter "M" six inches long, painted or stamped with red or blue adhesive composition on both sides of each sheep.

*Pigs.*—Letter "M" painted or stamped with red or blue adhesive composition on both sides of each pig.

6. The animals shall be slaughtered in the Glasgow City Abattoir before midnight on the Friday following the date of their exposure in Glasgow market.

\* If the Inspector granting or countersigning the licence considers it desirable that the animals should be moved by float or other vehicle or by a particular route when not being moved by railway, he should so specify on this licence.
