TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 7th November 1930, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919, to the amount of £40,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 10th November 1930 to Saturday the 15th November 1930, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

His Majesty The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Evan Rosser, Alwyn Lewis and Wyndham Evans in recognition of their gallantry in the following circumstances:—

On Sunday the 1st June 1930, about 12 noon Herbert Clarke, surveyor, and Thomas William Rees, fireman, went down the Ciley Colliery, Tonyrefail, Glamorganshire, for the purpose of making a survey. As they had not returned by 5 p.m. the banksman descended the pit to look for them and after searching for some time found that the men had been entombed by a fall in the workings about 16 feet in length and about 12 feet in height. The alarm was given by the banksman and at about 6.30 p.m. rescue operations were begun by Henry Davies, overman, Thomas Harding and William R. Evans, firemen, and Alwyn Lewis, collier. They tried to remove the debris, but were unable to continue as the timbers supporting the lip of the cavity began to collapse. Temporary supports were erected and a second attempt at clearing the fall was made under the supervision of the Under-manager. This resulted in a second fall in which Henry Davies and William Evans narrowly escaped injury, and the attempt had to be abandoned.

It was then decided to drive a small tunnel, by means of piles, through the fall and at 9.45 p.m. the rescuers were joined by Wyndham Evans, overman, and Evan Rosser, fireman. At midnight Henry Davies and William Evans, who were exhausted, were persuaded to retire. Harding, who was a night official, also had to leave to perform his normal duties of inspection and the work was carried on by Lewis, Wyndham Evans and Rosser under the supervision of the Under-manager. Water was conveyed to the entombed men by means of a 1-inch pipe and at 2.30 a.m. Rosser was able to pass some warm stimulants through the tunnel. From this time the place became very uneasy and the pressure on the supports in the tunnel was so terrific that a collapse appeared imminent. At 3.30 a.m. the tunnel was completed and Rosser got through to the entombed men. Wyndham Evans got hold of Clarke from Rosser and a human chain was formed and Clarke was

drawn out through the tunnel Rees was then rescued in the same way, Rosser being the last to come through the tunnel. He had scarcely got clear when the tunnel closed in and became completely impassible.

The time occupied by the rescue was about 9 hours. Of the rescue party, Lewis was there throughout and Rosser and Wyndham Evans for the last few hours. All the men who took part in the rescue behaved with conspicuous bravery and incurred considerable risks; but the men exposed to the greatest danger were those who worked in the hastily-constructed lightly-timbered tunnel through loose material and under constantly increasing pressure. This risk increased progressively as the tunnel reached completion and Rosser, Lewis and Wyndham Evans (who worked in relays) were in constant danger of being buried by the total collapse of the passage.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

THE COAL MINES (COMMITTEES OF INVESTIGATION) DIRECTIONS, 1930, DATED 30TH OCTOBER 1930, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER SECTION 5 (3) OF THE COAL MINES ACT, 1930.

The Board of Trade, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by sub-section (3) of Section 5 of the Coal Mines Act, 1930, hereby direct as follows:—

SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT.

1. These Directions may be cited as the Coal Mines (Committees of Investigation) Directions, 1930, and, in respect of each Committee of Investigation severally to which these Directions apply, shall come into operation on the date when the appointment of such Committee by the Board of Trade is first completed.

INTERPRETATION.

2. (i) In these Directions, unless the context otherwise requires—

“ The Act ” means the Coal Mines Act, 1930;

“ The Board ” means the Board of Trade;

“ The Committee ” means the National Committee of Investigation or the Committee of Investigation for any district within the meaning of Part I. of the Act, constituted under the provisions of Section 5 of the Act.

“ The Chairman ” and “ the Secretary ” mean respectively the persons appointed by the Board to be Chairman (including

any persons appointed by the Board to act as Chairman in the absence of the Chairman) and Secretary of the Committee;

“ The Scheme ” means the Central Scheme or the District Scheme (as the case may require) for the time being in force under Part I. of the Act, in relation to which the Committee is constituted.

(ii) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of these Directions as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

MEETINGS.

3. The Committee shall hold such ordinary or special meetings as may be necessary for the transaction of business, and shall hold their ordinary meetings on such days and at such hours as they may determine:

Provided that the time of holding the first meeting shall be fixed by the Chairman.

CHAIRMAN TO PRESIDE.

4. Save as otherwise provided by these Directions, the Chairman shall preside at every meeting of the Committee.

ABSENCE OF CHAIRMAN.

5. (i) If the Chairman is absent from any meeting the members of the Committee present shall elect from among themselves some person to act as Deputy for the Chairman at that meeting:

Provided that a final decision on a complaint under investigation by the Committee shall not be taken at any meeting from which the Chairman is absent.

(ii) Should the Chairman be absent from three consecutive meetings of the Committee, the Secretary shall immediately after the third of such meetings report the matter to the Board, stating the reason for the Chairman's absence, and the Board may thereupon, if they think fit, appoint some other person to act as Chairman, either temporarily until the absent Chairman is able to resume his functions or permanently in the place of such absent Chairman, who shall, in the latter case, cease to be Chairman.

SPECIAL MEETINGS.

6. A special meeting of the Committee shall be held whenever any member of the Committee shall by notice in writing to the Secretary so require. The time appointed for the special meeting shall be not less than three clear days later than the date of such notice and such notice shall include particulars of the business for which the special meeting is required.

NOTICE OF MEETINGS.

7. Not less than three clear days before any ordinary meeting of the Committee, and as early as possible before any special meeting thereof, the Secretary shall send to each member of the Committee a notice in writing specifying the time and place of the meeting and the items of business to be considered.

QUORUM.

8 (i) Six members in the case of the National Committee of Investigation and three

members in the case of the Committee of Investigation for any district shall respectively form a quorum.

(ii) If within half an hour from the time appointed for a meeting a quorum is not present, the meeting shall be adjourned until such time as the Chairman or Deputy for the Chairman may appoint, not being less than three nor more than seven days after the time originally appointed for such meeting, and if at the adjourned meeting a quorum is not present within half an hour from the time appointed for the meeting the members present shall be a quorum.

VOTING.

9. Every question at any meeting of the Committee shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the members present and voting on the question, and in the case of an equal division of votes the Chairman or, in the absence of the Chairman, the Deputy for the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote. Voting shall be by a show of hands.

MINUTES.

10. (i) The Committee shall cause minutes of their proceedings to be kept in a Minute Book, and such minutes shall be signed by the Chairman or, in the absence of the Chairman, by the Deputy for the Chairman at the Meeting at which they are approved as correct. The Committee shall also cause a record to be kept showing the names of the members present at each meeting. The Minute Book and record of attendances shall be open to inspection when required by any officer of the Board.

(ii) Unless and until the contrary is proved, every meeting of the Committee in respect of the proceedings whereof a minute has been made in accordance with the provisions of these Directions shall be deemed to have been duly convened and held, and all the members present at the meeting shall be deemed to have been duly qualified.

MEETINGS TO BE PRIVATE.

11. Unless the Committee shall otherwise determine, the Committee shall sit in private.

INVESTIGATION OF COMPLAINTS.

12 (i) The Committee shall require every complaint made to them with regard to the operation of the Scheme to be stated by the complainant in writing.

(ii) Upon receipt of any complaint (not being a complaint which the Committee is precluded under the Act from investigating) the Committee shall investigate the same at the earliest possible moment and shall hold such meeting or meetings and do all such other things as may be necessary for the purpose of investigating the complaint, and shall make without delay any report or representations in relation thereto which it may be the duty of the Committee to make under the provisions of the Act.

(iii) If, in the opinion of the Committee, information beyond that given in the complaint is necessary in order to enable them properly to investigate the complaint, they shall call for such information as they consider necessary for the purposes of their investigation, either from the complainant or

from the body which under the Act administers the Scheme, or from both.

(iv) The Committee may invite persons to appear before them to give oral information with regard to a complaint.

(v) After investigating any complaint, the Committee shall without delay send notice in writing to the complainant, and to such other persons concerned as the Committee may think it necessary to notify, of the action taken by the Committee, or of their decision that no action shall be taken (as the case may be) as the result of their investigation.

REPRESENTATION OF COMMITTEE IN ARBITRATIONS AND APPEALS.

13 (i) Where any matter is referred by the Committee to arbitration under the provisions of the Act, the Secretary shall be qualified, if so instructed by the Committee, to represent them in such reference before the arbitrator.

(ii) In the event of any proceedings in the High Court on any such arbitration, or of any appeal against the Committee to the Railway and Canal Commission under the provisions of sub-section (10) of Section 5 of the Act, the Committee shall consult with the Board as to the representation of the Committee in the proceedings.

EXPENSES OF COMMITTEE.

14. No expenses shall be incurred by the Committee without the prior sanction of the Board, and the Secretary shall keep accounts of any expenses properly incurred by or on behalf of the Committee in such form as the Board may from time to time direct.

FORMS AND NOTICES.

15. The forms and notices used by or on behalf of the Committee in respect of their functions shall be such as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board.

RETURNS AND INFORMATION TO THE BOARD.

16. The Committee shall furnish to the Board such returns and information relating to the exercise and performance of the functions of the Committee, and to the complaints made to them with respect to the operation of the Scheme, as the Board may from time to time require.

DECLARATION OF SECRECY.

17. Every member of the Committee and every officer of the Committee shall immediately on his appointment make and send to the Board a declaration of secrecy in such form as may be prescribed by the Board, and no person shall exercise or perform any functions as a member or officer of the Committee unless and until he shall have made such a declaration and sent the same to the Board.

THE COMMITTEES OF INVESTIGATION (ARBITRATION) REGULATIONS, 1930, DATED 30TH OCTOBER 1930, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER SECTION 5 (11) OF THE COAL MINES ACT, 1930.

The Board of Trade, in pursuance of sub-section (11) of Section 5 of the Coal Mines Act, 1930, hereby make the following regulations:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Committees of Investigation (Arbitration) Regulations, 1930, and shall apply to all arbitrations under sub-section (8) of Section 5 of the Coal Mines Act, 1930.

2. (i) In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

“ The Act ” means the Coal Mines Act, 1930;

“ The Board ” means the Board of Trade;

“ The Committee ” means any Committee of Investigation constituted under Section 5 of the Act.

“ Matter of complaint ” means any matter which is not dealt with to the satisfaction of the Committee upon representations being made with respect thereto by the Committee under the provisions of sub-section (8) of Section 5 of the Act;

“ The Scheme ” means the Scheme for the time being in force under Part I. of the Act in relation to which the Committee is constituted, and “ the Administrative Body ” means the body charged with the duty of administering the Scheme.

(ii) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of these Regulations as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

3. (i) When any matter of complaint is to be referred to arbitration by the Committee under the provisions of sub-section (8) of Section 5 of the Act, the Committee shall forthwith take steps to agree with the Administrative Body upon an independent person to be appointed to act as arbitrator.

(ii) In default of such agreement the Committee shall notify the Board accordingly and the matter of complaint shall then be referred to such independent person as the Board may appoint to act as arbitrator.

4. The Committee shall, as soon as the arbitrator has been appointed under the provisions of the last preceding Regulation, send to the arbitrator a Statement of Complaint in writing, setting out in numbered paragraphs the following particulars with regard to the matter of complaint:—

(i) The names, descriptions and addresses of any persons whose act or omission in respect of their functions under the Scheme the Committee considers is having or is likely to have an effect contrary to the public interest or ought not to be permitted on the ground that it is unfair or inequitable;

(ii) The act or omission of which complaint is made;

(iii) The grounds of the Committee's objection thereto;

- (iv) The representations with respect to the matter of complaint made by the Committee in pursuance of sub-section (8) of Section 5 of the Act and of the persons to whom such representations were made;
- (v) The way in which the matter has been dealt with by such persons and the grounds of the Committee's dissatisfaction therewith; and
- (vi) The remedy which the Committee intend to claim in the arbitration for the rectification of the matter of complaint.

5. The Committee shall at the same time as their Statement of Complaint is sent by them to the arbitrator furnish a copy thereof to the Administrative Body and such other persons (if any) as are alleged by the Committee to be the persons having power under the Scheme to rectify the matter.

6. The arbitrator shall upon receipt of the Statement of Complaint give such directions for the conduct of the arbitration as he may think fit and shall fix a day and time for the hearing of the matter of complaint referred to him, and shall give notice in writing of the day and time so fixed to the Committee and to the Administrative Body and any other persons alleged by the Committee to be the persons having power as aforesaid.

7. The costs of every arbitration including the costs of the award shall be in the discretion of the arbitrator.
