

copy of an Interlocutor pronounced by the Sheriff-Substitute of Aberdeen, Kincardine and Banff, dated 17th October 1930, finding that the Burial Ground at Saint Combs in the Parish of Lonmay and County of Aberdeen is so overcrowded with bodies as to be in a condition which is offensive and dangerous to health:

And whereas in the said Representation it is recommended that Burials be forthwith discontinued in the said Burial Ground in terms of Section 5 of the aforesaid Act, with the exception hereinafter specified:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 11th day of October 1931, Notice of such Representation was given and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 11th day of November 1931, and that the said Order, or Notice thereof, should be published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and that copies of the said Order or Notice thereof should be fixed on the doors of the Church of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parish or parishes affected one month before the said 11th day of November 1931:

And whereas Notice of the said Representation, and of the time when it pleased His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, has been duly published in the Edinburgh Gazette, and fixed in manner required by the said Order in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows, viz.:—

That burials be forthwith discontinued in the Burial Ground at Saint Combs in the Parish of Lonmay and County of Aberdeen in terms of the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, except for the burial therein of relicts having spouses interred in said Burial Ground prior to the date of this Order. Provided always as regards future interments that the exercise of the right of burial be not injurious to public health or offensive or contrary to decency; that notice be given to the District Sanitary Inspector of the County of Aberdeen at Strichen not later than the day preceding that on which a grave is to be opened and that no interment shall be made unless the upper side of the coffin can be laid at a depth of three feet from the surface of the ground and that without exposure of another coffin.

WHEREAS by Section 48 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928 (7 E. 7, c. 29; 4-5 G. 5, c. 18; 9-10 G. 5, c. 80, and 18-9 G. 5, c. 3), it is provided that the said Section shall apply only to vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of a foreign state with respect to

which His Majesty, by Order in Council, declares that the laws thereof confer corresponding rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into the foreign state or the territorial waters thereof:

And whereas by Section 91 of the said Acts it is provided that the provisions of that Section shall apply only in the case of those foreign states with respect to which His Majesty by Order in Council declares them to be applicable:

And whereas at The Hague on the 6th November 1925 His Majesty and the heads of certain foreign states having deemed it expedient to make certain modifications in and additions to the International Convention of the 20th March 1883, for the creation of an International Union for the Protection of Industrial Property, as revised at Brussels on the 14th December 1900, and at Washington on the 2nd June 1911, agreed upon a Convention comprising the said International Convention as revised at Brussels and at Washington with the said modifications and additions, the ratification of which Convention was duly effected by Great Britain and certain other foreign states:

And whereas Poland has acceded to the said Convention:

And whereas by reason of the accession to the said Convention of Poland the laws thereof confer rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into Poland or the territorial waters thereof, corresponding to those mentioned in the said Section 48:

And whereas the said Convention is an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Section 91:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 25th day of November 1919 (S.R. & O. 1919 (No. 1900), p. 106), His Majesty was pleased to declare that the provisions of the said Section 91 should apply to Poland, and it is expedient, on the making of this Order, that the said Order should be revoked:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him in manner hereinbefore recited and of all other powers in that behalf, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. The laws of Poland confer rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into Poland or the territorial waters thereof, corresponding to those mentioned in Section 48 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928.

2. The provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928, shall be applicable to Poland.

3. The Order in Council dated the 25th day of November 1919 relating to Poland is hereby revoked.

4. This Order may be cited as The Industrial Property Convention (Poland) Order, 1931.
