SUSPENSION OF WITHDRAWAL OF AUTHORISATIONS.

(FRANK ARTHUR EVISON.)

The Home Secretary gives notice that he has suspended until further Order the operation of the Notice, dated 8th February 1933, and published in the London Gazette and Edinburgh Gazette on 10th February 1933, withdrawing from Frank Arthur Evison, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., the authority granted by the Regulations made under the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920, to duly qualified medical practitioners to be in possession of and to supply raw opium, coca leaves, and Indian hemp, and the drugs and preparations to which Part III. of the Act
