The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

DANGEROUS DRUGS ACTS, 1920-1932. WITHDRAWAL OF AUTHORITY.

## (John Thomas Evans.)

Whereas John Thomas Evans, M.P.S., trading as Pasmore & Company at 93 Mortimer Street, London, W.1, being a person duly registered under the Pharmacy Act, 1868, as amended by the Poisons and Pharmacy Act, 1908, has been convicted of offences against the Dangerous Drugs Acts:

And whereas the said John Thomas Evans cannot, in my opinion, properly be allowed to be in possession of or to supply raw opium, coca leaves, and Indian hemp, nor to carry on the business of manufacturing, selling, or distributing any of the drugs to which Part III. of the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920, applies:

Now, therefore, after consultation with the Council of the Pharmaceutical Society of Great

Britain, and in pursuance of the powers conferred on me by No. 6 of the Raw Opium Regulations, 1921, as extended by the Coca Leaves and Indian Hemp Regulations, 1928, and by No. 7 of the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928, I hereby give notice that I withdraw, as from to-day's date, from the said John Thomas Evans the authority granted by the said Regulations to persons who lawfully keep open shop for the retailing of poisons to be in possession of and to supply raw opium, coca leaves, and Indian hemp, or to manufacture any extract or tincture of Indian hemp, or any preparation to which Part III. of the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920, applies, or to carry on the business of retailing, dispensing, or compounding the drugs or preparations to which Part III. of the Act applies.
