The following addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Unto the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

May it please your Majesty, we, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Magistrates, Town-Council, Clergy, Attorneys at Law, Merchants, Manufacturers, and others, Inhabitants of your Majesty's Royal Burgh and Parish of Forfar, assembled for the purpose of addressing your Majesty on the present trying situation of public affairs, beg leave to approach the throne, with the most unfeigned expressions of inviolable attachment to your Majesty's person, family, and government, and with the most unanimous and cordial tender of our most faithful and zealous services in support of the dignity of your Majesty's crown, the defence of your empire, and the glory and prosperity of your reign.

Though we cannot contemplate without anxiety the awful events of the times in which we live, or regard with indifference the desolations of the continent; the formidable combination; the gigantic power, and the insolent threats of the enemies of our beloved country; yet relying on the wisdom and vigour of your Majesty's government, and cherishing becoming regards to that all directing Providence, which hath so often delivered us from peril, and in which we know your Majesty most devoutly confides, we desire to contemplate these evils without dismay; and we most fervently deprecate every idea which might tend to embarrass the operations of an enlightened policy, to cramp the in-

fluence of a wise administration, to depress the spirit of your Majesty's subjects, or to enfeeble and paralyze their characteristic energies, in resisting the efforts of an enemy who has dared to promise the wealth and innumerable comforts of this happy land as spoil to his followers.

We believe that it is the nearest wish of your Majesty's paternal breast, that such energies, successfully exerted, may, by the blessing of God, soon enable your Majesty, by a safe, an honourable, and lasting peace, to alleviate the burdens, and secure the repose of your dominions; and that the moment when such an opportunity shall present itself, it will be eagerly embraced. But until that happy day shall come, we beg leave most humbly to assure your Majesty, that it is our earnest desire, and shall be our never-ceasing endeavour, to animate ourselves, and all around us, to a manly and patriotic perseverance in a conflict at once so arduous, so honourable, and important; to cherish that spirit of unanimity and cordial co-operation which is so essential to successful exertion, and patiently and cheerfully to endure those deprivations which the expence of maintaining such a contest must indispensably require.

That it may please him, by whom alone kings reign, long to preserve your Majesty's important life, to bless your Majesty's councils, and speedily and surely to guide the efforts of your Majesty's government to a successful issue, is the ardent prayer of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful, most faithful, and most obedient subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council, Clergy, Attorneys at Law, Merchants, Manufacturers, and others, Inhabitants of the Burgh and Parish of Forfar.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty:

The humble address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Royal Burgh of Dingwall, in Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, your Majesty's most loyal and faithful subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Royal Burgh of Dingwall, impelled by sense of the duty we owe to our King and country, beg leave, at a period unexampled in the annals of history, to approach your Majesty's throne with sentiments of the most profound respect and grateful attachment: We cannot but be sensible of the arduous struggle in which we are engaged with a powerful and inveterate foe, who has been but too successful in humbling and subjugating almost every other power that might have been deemed capable of interposing between him and universal empire. Exasperated as he is against this country, which alone has opposed an effectual barrier to his unbounded ambition, he will, no doubt, bend his utmost efforts to sacrifice us to his vengeance, and to effect our ruin. We trust, however, that his unavailing threats and impotent malice will serve only to rouse still further the spirit of the nation, to call forth its energies, and to promote that unanimity and strenuous exertion which, under the direction of your Majesty's wise and vigorous councils, cannot fail, with the blessing of Heaven, to counteract and disconcert his plans, to repel the intended mischief, to retort his devices on his own head, and, finally, to baffle every hostile combination. The new species of warfare in which our adversary's mad policy has now involved us, may, and no doubt will, impede our commerce, and affect our manufactures; but for the alleviation of these evils we look up with confidence to the liberality of government, the patriotism of the people, and the steady firmness of the British character. We know not who could be so mean and dastardly as not to encounter some temporary hardships, and submit without murmuring to privations of unusual magnitude, rather than expose to the most imminent hazard all that they hold valuable on earth. When our religion, our laws, and our liberties are threatened; when the independence, and perhaps the very existence, of the empire is at stake, who would not sacrifice ease and affluence, and even some share of common necessities, to avert the impending blow? Impressed with these sentiments, while we are fully persuaded that your Majesty's ministers will be far from rejecting any serious offer on the part of the enemy to conclude a peace on fair and honourable terms, we trust, at the same time, they will never suffer themselves to be drawn into any premature negotiation, which might compromise the dignity of the crown, or the honour and interest of the nation.
