CENTRAL CHANCERY OF THE ORDERS OF KNIGHTHOOD.

*St. James's Palace, S.W.1,
12th November 1937.*

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the Award of the Medal of the Military Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, to the undermentioned for gallant and distinguished services rendered when H.M.S. "Hunter" was mined off Almeria on the coast of Spain on the 13th May 1937:—

An explosion caused by the mining occurred underneath the Stoker Petty Officers' and Torpedomen's Mess Decks. To reach the ratings on these mess decks, this party had to jump down 8 feet, the ladder being blown away, into 3 feet of oil fuel and on to a deck which might not have been intact. During this period they remained in imminent risk of

falling through the shattered deck into the water and oil fuel. Moreover, they were under the impression that the ship was about to founder. Their exertions to save life consisted in dragging living and dead men from under wreckage and out of the oil fuel and passing them up on deck. This operation lasted from 5 to 10 minutes. The rescued were in very severe danger from having swallowed oil fuel and had they been left would undoubtedly have died. Others were severely burnt and immersion of their wounds in oil fuel, if prolonged, would undoubtedly have caused death.

This man closed the fore magazine and shell room hatches, breaking in with a hacksaw the wire covers which were locked on as the keys could not be found at once. The display of initiative which he showed in assisting the wounded and doing various duties without orders was most noticeable.

Sidney Bevington, Acting Leading Seaman, O.N. D/J. 103378.

When the explosion occurred there was a general exodus from the Seamen's Mess deck up the ammunition hatch and into the galley flat. Keeping two ratings with him, Bevington closed all the scuttles and deadlights before leaving the mess deck. His conduct afterwards was also most worthy of notice.

6. The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE APPOINTMENT BY COMPETITIVE SELECTION OF INSPECTORS (MALE) UNDER THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS, 1894-1935.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration at any time.

1. Application for appointment shall be made in the first instance to the Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Ministry. When a vacancy occurs, the Ministry will cause notice to be given by an advertisement in the Press, which will include a statement of the last day fixed for the receipt of applications.

2. A candidate must have attained the age of 23 and must not have attained the age of 32

on the last day fixed for the receipt of applications.

3. Every candidate must be a natural-born British subject, the child of a person who is or was at the time of death a British subject; provided that exception may be made in the case of natural-born British subjects who have satisfactorily completed a period of not less than five years' service on full pay in His Majesty's Regular Forces.

Provided also that if the Civil Service Commissioners are satisfied, in the case of any candidate who is a British subject but does not fulfil all the requirements of the rule as to nationality and descent, that the candidate is so closely connected by ancestry and upbringing with His Majesty's dominions that an exception may properly be made to that rule, they may accept such candidate as eligible provided that this discretion shall not be exercisable unless (a) the father or the paternal grandfather of the candidate was a natural-born British subject, and (b) neither the father nor the paternal grandfather had acquired any other nationality by naturalisation or by any other voluntary and formal act.

4. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to apply for appointment.

No person actually serving in the Army, Navy, or Air Force will be eligible for consideration unless he produces, when called upon to do so, the permission of his Commanding Officer to apply for appointment, dated before his appearance before the Selection Board, and given in accordance with such orders as may from time to time be issued.

A person upon whose professional training public money has been spent with a view to his entering the Colonial Veterinary Service will not be eligible for consideration whilst under Agreement with the Colonial Office unless he obtains the permission of the authorities of that Department to apply for appointment.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. A candidate must have graduated as a Member of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons and have had at least one year's practical experience in some recognised branch of the veterinary profession after such graduation.

6. The completed application forms will be scrutinised by the Ministry and selected candidates will be interviewed by a Board consisting of representatives of the Ministry and of the Civil Service Commissioners. The Board will recommend to the Ministry for appointment to the vacancies existing those candidates who appear to them to possess the highest qualifications, provided they find so many suitable.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's previous work.

7. The necessary number of candidates will be appointed, subject to their satisfying the Civil Service Commissioners that they are eligible for appointment in respect of age, nationality, health, and character, and their appointments will not be confirmed unless and until they have passed a period of two years' probation to the satisfaction of the Ministry.

8. Candidates selected for appointment will be required to pay a fee of £8.

which Institution and bodies are organisations representative of employers in a section of the road transport industry concerned with the conveyance of goods which the Minister of Labour has certified to be proper bodies, in respect of the branches of the industry which they represent, to make application for a variation of the periods of time laid down in Section 19 of the Road Traffic Act, 1930, as amended by Section 31 of the Road and Rail Traffic Act, 1933, for the employment of drivers of road vehicles of certain types.

The variation applied for is to the effect that the period of 11 hours laid down in Section 19 (1) (ii.) of the Act of 1930 may be increased to 12 hours on not more than two days in each of the three weeks ending on the 18th and 25th December 1937 and 1st January 1938; the variation to apply only to the drivers of vehicles whose use is authorised under a "C" carrier's licence granted under Part I. of the Road and Rail Traffic Act, 1933. The applications suggest that any Order made should be of a permanent nature applicable to successive Christmas seasons.

As provided by the Act the Minister has referred the matter to the Industrial Court for advice. The Court has fixed Friday, 26th November, at 11 a.m., at No. 5 Old Palace

Yard, London, S.W.1, as the time and place for hearing parties to the applications.

Copies of the proposals contained in the applications for the variation of the periods of time laid down in Section 19 of the Act can be obtained from the Secretary of the Industrial Court at the address given above.
