WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 28th day of December 1939 (N. 11781/39), in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

“And whereas by Order in Council bearing date the 5th May 1939 sanction was given, *inter alia*, to the payment of non-substantive pay and allowances to naval ratings employed on, or under training for, the non-substantive duties of Air Gunner, Rating Observer or Rating Pilot:

“And whereas ratings hitherto undergoing

training for the duties of Rating Observer have been qualified Air Gunners and have received pay as such:

“And whereas it is now necessary that certain ratings serving in Your Majesty's Navy during hostilities should undergo training for the duties of Rating Observer without having first qualified as Air Gunner, and we are of opinion that such ratings should receive an appropriate allowance during the period of their training:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty by Your Order in Council may be graciously pleased to sanction, with retrospective effect, payment of an allowance of 2s. 9d. a day to naval ratings while undergoing training for Rating Observer, provided that no other non-substantive pay or allowance is issued concurrently.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in the above proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.
