“And whereas there is no longer any reason why extra pay should be paid to Stokers, 2nd

class, Non-continuous Service at lower rates than those received by Stokers, 2nd class, Continuous Service:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to approve payment of extra pay for General Work at the rate of 1s. a day to all Stokers, 2nd class.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893.

ROADS ACT, 1920.
