The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section I. of the Diplomatic Privileges (Extension) Act, 1944 (7 & 8 Geo. VI., Ch. 44) (hereinafter referred to as the Act) it is enacted that the provisions of that Section shall apply to any organisation declared by Order in Council to be an organisation of which His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and the Government or Governments of one or more foreign sovereign powers are members and that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, provide that any such organisation shall, to the extent specified in the Order, have the immunities and privileges set out in Part I. of the Schedule to the Act and confer upon representatives of member Governments on the Governing Body or any Committee of the Organisation, and upon officers and servants of the Organisation, the immunities and privileges set out in Parts II. or III. of the said Schedule to the extent specified in the Order:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the aforesaid Act or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased by and with the advice of His Privy Council to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

Article 1. The European Central Inland Transport Organisation (hereinafter referred to as the Transport Organisation) is an organisation of which His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom and the Governments of foreign sovereign powers are members.

Article 2. The Transport Organisation shall have the immunities and privileges set forth in Part I. of the Schedule to the Act and the legal capacities of a body corporate.

Article 3. One representative of each member Government on the Council of the Transport Organisation, and also the members of the Executive Board of the Transport Organisation being persons nominated by member Governments and not exceeding seven in number, shall, provided that they are not in any case British subjects and save to the extent to which in any case the Government of any such representative or member may see fit to waive any immunity or privilege and without prejudice to any immunities and privileges which any such person may be entitled to claim by virtue of any other office which he may from time to time hold, have all the immunities and privileges specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the Act for the period for which his name appears as a person so entitled on the list compiled by the Secretary of State in accordance with sub-section (3) of Section I. of the Act.

Article 4. Officers of the Transport Organisation holding the offices of Director-General or Deputy Director-General, or holding offices which carry a rank not lower than that of Deputy Director-General, not being British subjects and not exceeding at any one time five in number, shall, for the period for which their names appear as persons so entitled on the list compiled by the Secretary of State in accordance with sub-section (3) of Section I. of the Act, have all the immunities and privileges specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the Act save to the extent that the Transport Organisation may in any case waive any of the said immunities or privileges.

Article 5.—(1) The persons to whom this Article applies

shall have the immunities and privileges specified in paragraph 1 and, if they are nationals or citizens of, or belong to, any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom, those specified in paragraph (2) (a) of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act:

Provided that—

(i.) in the case of persons referred to in sub-paragraph (a) of paragraph (2) of this Article, the government appointing such representatives may waive any immunity or privilege;

(ii.) in the case of persons referred to in sub-paragraph (b) of paragraph (2) of this Article, the Transport Organisation may waive any immunity or privilege; and

(iii.) the exemption or relief from taxes and rates, specified in the said paragraph 2 (a) of Part III. of the Schedule, shall not extend to any person whose usual place of abode is in the United Kingdom.

(2) This Article applies to

(a) British subjects who are the representatives of member Governments on the council or are members of the Executive Board of the Transport Organisation; and

(b) British subjects who hold any of the offices in the Transport Organisation referred to in Article 4 hereof.

Article 6.—(1) The persons to whom this Article applies shall have the immunities and privileges specified in paragraph 1 and paragraph 2 (b) of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act:

Provided that—

(i.) The Transport Organisation may waive any immunity or privilege; and

(ii.) the exemption from income tax specified in the said paragraph 2 (b) of Part III. of the Schedule shall not extend to any British subject whose usual place of abode is in the United Kingdom.

(2) This Article applies to the following officers of the Transport Organisation; namely all Directors, all Chiefs of Sections, and all Members of Sections; and to all the officers of the Commission holding a rank superior to that of Chief Clerk.

Article 7. All officers of the Transport Organisation other than those referred to in Articles 4, 5, and 6 above, shall have the exemption from income tax specified in paragraph 2 (b) of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act:

Provided that—

(i.) The Transport Organisation may waive any privilege; and

(ii.) this privilege shall not extend to any British subject whose usual place of abode is in the United Kingdom.

Article 8. This Order may be cited as "The Diplomatic Privileges (the Transport Organisation Amendment) Order in Council, 1945." It shall enter into force as from this day's date.

Article 9. The Diplomatic Privileges (the Transport Organisation and War Crimes Commission) Order in Council, 1945, is repealed in so far as it applies to the Provisional Organisation for European Inland Transport.

And the Right Honourable Ernest Bevin, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, is to give the necessary directions herein.

Article 2. The Preparatory Commission shall have the immunities and privileges set forth in Part I. of the Schedule to the Act.

Article 3.—(1) The persons to whom this Article applies, not being British subjects and not exceeding at any one time four in number, shall, for the period for which their names appear as persons so entitled on the list compiled by the Secretary of State in accordance with sub-section (3) of Section I. of the Act, have all the immunities and privileges specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the Act save to the extent that the Preparatory Commission waives any of the said immunities and privileges in any given case.

(2) The persons to whom this Article applies are the Executive Secretary and Deputy Executive Secretary of the Preparatory Commission and any other officer of the Preparatory Commission holding a rank equivalent to Deputy Executive Secretary.

Article 4.—(1) The persons to whom this Article applies shall have the immunities and privileges specified in paragraph 1 of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act and, if they are nationals or citizens of, or belong to, any part of His Majesty's dominions outside the United Kingdom, those specified in paragraph 2 (a) thereof:

Provided that—

(i.) in the case of persons referred to in paragraph (2) of this Article, the Preparatory Commission may waive any immunity or privilege; and

(ii.) the exemption or relief from taxes and rates, specified in the said paragraph 2 (a) of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act, shall not extend to any person whose usual place of abode is in the United Kingdom.

(2) This Article applies to British subjects who hold in the Preparatory Commission any of the offices referred to in Article 3 hereof.

Article 5.—(1) The persons to whom this Article applies shall have the immunities and privileges specified in paragraph 1 and paragraph 2 (b) of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act:

Provided that—

(i.) the Preparatory Commission may waive any immunity or privilege; and

(ii.) the exemption from income tax specified in the said paragraph 2 (b) of Part III. of the Schedule shall not extend to any British subject whose usual place of abode is in the United Kingdom.

(2) This Article applies to all officers of the Preparatory Commission holding the rank of, or a rank equivalent to, Head, or Deputy or Assistant Head, of Department, Section, or Division, or Principal or Assistant Principal Officer.

Article 6. All Officers of the Preparatory Commission, other than those referred to in Articles 3, 4, and 5 above, shall have the exemption from income tax specified in paragraph 2 (b) of Part III. of the Schedule to the Act:

Provided that—

(i.) the Preparatory Commission may waive any immunity or privilege; and

(ii.) this privilege shall not extend to any British subject whose usual place of abode is in the United Kingdom.

Article 7. This Order may be cited as "The Diplomatic Privileges (Preparatory Commission of the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization) Order in Council, 1945." It shall enter into force as from this day's date.

Honourable Ernest Bevin, His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, is to give effect to the provisions herein.
