The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

TEMPORARY (RECONSTRUCTION) REGULATIONS FOR VACANCIES FOR LEGAL ASSISTANTS IN GOVERNMENT DEPART-

1. Both men and women may compete under these  ${\bf Regulations.}$ 

2. Every candidate must have been born on or after 2nd August 1910 and have attained the age of 26 by the 1st January of the year in which he or she competes:

Provided that the Commissioners may at their discretion extend the upper age limit in favour of older candidates who

possess exceptional qualifications or experience.

3. Every candidate must be either

(a) a natural-born British subject

(i.) having at least one parent who is or was at the

(i.) having at least one parent who is or was at the time of death a British subject; or
(ii.) of any other parentage, provided that he or she has resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his or her appointment; or

(b) a naturalized British subject who has resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his or her appointment; or

(c) a British subject who although

(c) a British subject who, although not fulfilling the requirements of sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b), satisfies the Commissioners that he or she is so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his or her favour. favour.

4. Every candidate must be a barrister or admitted solicitor (or, for Scotland, an advocate or admitted solicitor in Scotland).

5.—(1) Every candidate must satisfy the Commissioners as to his or her health and character.

(2) The Commissioners reserve the right to give such preference to disabled persons or to particular classes of disabled persons as may be necessary in order to give effect to any general policy regarding the employment of such persons which may be adopted by His Majesty's Government, provided that the disability is not of a nature to interfere with the discharge of the duties required.

6.—(1) Every woman candidate must be unmarried or a widow.

widow.

(2) Women will normally be required to resign their appointments on marriage, but exception to this rule may be made where employment of a particular married woman is considered desirable in the light of her special qualifications or special experience in relation to the duties required of her or of the special requirements of the Department in which she is serving.

7. No person who is undergoing a course of study with the aid of a grant from public funds shall be eligible to compete before the completion of the course, unless he or she has previously obtained permission to do so fr m the authority which administers the grant.

which administers the grant.

8. Every candidate must apply on the appropriate form within the time and in the manner of which notice is given by the Commissioners.

9. The Commissioners may summon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be prima facie eligible, or may, if they see fit, summon only those whose qualifications and experience are considered to be appeared and experience are considered to be appeared. tions and experience are considered to be specially suitable.

The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of experience and education, with due regard to loss of opportunity and to the loss of professional knowledge of those who have served in the Forces, any recommendation from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above facts they will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

10. Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (that is, the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, or the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland, as the case may be) has been notified to the Commissioners.

11. It will rest with the Commissioners to determine the Department to which each successful candidate shall be assigned. In making the assignments the Commissioners will be guided by the requirements of the public service. Subject to this condition, the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be respected.

12. Any attempt or the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment. The Interviewing Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work, whether at school, at the University, in the Forces, or otherwise.

13. Every candidate shall pay an application fee of £1. A successful candidate shall be required to pay a further fee of £3 before appointment.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that candidates now serving in His Majesty's Forces or the Women's Services, must send in their Application Forms in time to reach the Civil Service Commission not later than six months after the completion of their service. All other candidates must send them in by June 1st, 1946, but the Commissioners may, at their discretion, accept an application at a later date if they are satisfied that the delay was due to circumstances outside the candidate's control. A further announcement will be made if the final date is extended for particular lasses of candidates.

# ROAD TRAFFIC ACT, 1930-SECTION 46 (3).
