The number of outbreaks of Parasitic Mange confirmed, and the number of animals attacked during the period 1st January to 29th February 1948, should read 1 in each case.

NOTE.—The following diseases were eradicated from Great Britain in the years indicated:—Cattle plague, or rinder-pest (*pestis bovina*) 1877; pleuro-pneumonia (*peripneumonia contagiosa bovum*) 1898; sheep pox (*variola ovium*) 1850; rabies 1922; epizootic lymphangitis (*lymphangitis epizootica*) 1906; and glanders (including farcy) (*malleus*) 1928. Dourine (*exanthema coitale paralyticum*) has never existed in Great Britain.

CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF GLASGOW.

ROAD TRAFFIC ACT, 1930.

WHEREAS by Sub-Section (1) of Section 101 of the Road Traffic Act, 1930, it is provided that a Local Authority who, under any Local Act or Order, are operating a tramway, light railway, trolley vehicle, or omnibus undertaking may as part of that undertaking run public service vehicles on any road within their district and also with the consent of the Licensing Authority for Public Service Vehicles for the traffic area in which any other road is situate, on that road:

Notice is hereby given that, in pursuance of said Sub-Section, the Corporation of the City of Glasgow have made application to the Licensing Authority for Public Service Vehicles for the Scottish Traffic Area for their consent to the running by them of omnibuses along the following route, that is to say:—

ROUTE.—In the County of Lanark, the City of Glasgow, and in the Parish of New Kilpatrick, commencing in Great Western Road at Yoker Burn, and proceeding in a north-

westerly direction in Great Western Road, to the City Boundary. Thereafter in the County of Dunbarton, and the Burgh of Clydebank, continuing in a north-westerly direction in Great Western Road, turning West into Drumry Road, proceeding in a westerly direction in Drumry Road to Clarence Street, turning at the triangle at the junction of Drumry Road and Clarence Street, and returning via the same route.

And notice is hereby further given that objections to the giving of such consent on the part of any other Local Authority, Council of any County, or any persons who are already providing transport facilities on or in the neighbourhood of any part of the said route, may be sent in writing to the Licensing Authority for Public Service Vehicles, Scottish Traffic Area, 44 Palmerston Place, Edinburgh, on or before the 24th day of April 1948.

A copy of any objections should at the same time be sent by the objector to the Town Clerk, Glasgow.
