The Interview, Subject 7, will be held at a later date than the examination in the remaining subjects. Of the candidates who obtain the highest aggregate marks in Subjects 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, a certain number to be determined by the Civil Service Commissioners will be summoned to the Interview. The final list of candidates eligible for appointment will be made up by uniting the results of the two parts of the examination.
