RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS TO BASIC GRADE POSTS OF ARCHITECT, MAINTENANCE SURVEYOR, QUANTITY SURVEYOR, ESTATE SURVEYOR, CIVIL ENGINEER, SANITARY ENGINEER, AND LANDS OFFICER.

1. *Age*.—Candidates must be at least 25 and under 35 years of age on 1st January 1950 (i.e., they must have been born on or after 2nd January 1915 and on or before 1st January 1925). But

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short service) engagement in H.M. Forces may for this purpose deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served or is serving voluntarily in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular or short service engagement or who has performed or is performing compulsory national service under the National Service Acts, may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years.

2. *Sex and Marriage*.—(i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations, except that women will not be eligible for appointments under the Admiralty, Air Ministry, and War Office.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. *Nationality*.—Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) if natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) if naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and or been employed else

where in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) if not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

Provided that a candidate will not be eligible for an appointment under the Admiralty, War Office, Air Ministry, or Ministry of Supply unless he or she is a natural-born British subject and born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions of parents also born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions, except when the circumstances are such as to justify a departure from the general rule, in which case, provided the candidate satisfies the conditions prescribed by the preceding paragraphs, he or she may be admitted to appointment or competition by special permission of the First Lord of the Admiralty, Secretary of State for War, Secretary of State for Air, or Minister of Supply, as the case may be.

4. *Qualification.*—Each candidate must have the appropriate professional qualification and the experience specified in Appendix I to these Regulations. The professional qualifications prescribed must have been attained by the closing date for the receipt of applications. Candidates appointed subject to their obtaining Corporate Membership of the appropriate professional Institute will not be confirmed in their appointments unless they satisfy that requirement within the specified time.

5. *Health and Character.*—Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. *Competition.*—The Commissioners may summon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be *prima facie* eligible, or may, if they see fit, summon only those whose qualifications and experience as shown on their application forms are considered to be specially suitable for the posts available. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidate's record of experience and education, any recommendation from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above facts they will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

7. *Candidates Trained as Teachers.*—Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. *Assignment.* The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. Assignment will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be respected.

APPENDIX I.

Qualifications required for entry to the Works Group of Professional Classes.

The minimum qualifications required of recruits to the basic grades are indicated below. All candidates will be expected to possess wide professional experience in private or outside practice or in the service of a Local Authority or Government Department. The requirements of some Departments will call for a minimum of seven years spent in the study and practice of the profession.

Class and Qualification.

Architects. Registered Architect by examination, or Registered Architect who, since registration, has passed any professional examination in Architecture recognised by the Architects' Registration Council of the United Kingdom as qualifying for registration under the Architect's (Registration) Acts.

(For appointments in Ministry of Works there may be an oral examination in architectural design.)

Maintenance Surveyors.—(a) Registered Architect by examination, or Registered Architect who, since registration, has passed any professional examination in Architecture recognised by the Architects' Registration Council of the United Kingdom as qualifying for registration under the Architects' (Registration) Acts, or

(b) Have obtained Corporate Membership of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (Building Section) or have passed a degree or other examinations necessary for obtaining Corporate Membership. Candidates admitted under

the latter qualification will be required to obtain Corporate Membership of the Institution within two years of appointment.

Civil Engineers.—(a) Have obtained Corporate Membership of the Institution of Civil Engineers, or

(b) Have passed either:—

(1) Sections A and B of the examination for Associate Membership of the Institution of Civil Engineers, or

(2) examinations recognised by that Institution as granting exemption from Sections A and B,

provided in both cases that Corporate Membership is obtained within two years of appointment.

In the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, Civil Engineers must have qualified in the subjects "Hydraulics."

Sanitary Engineers.—(a) Have obtained Corporate Membership of the Institution of Civil Engineers having qualified in the subject "Hydraulics," or

(b) Have obtained Corporate Membership of the Institution of Municipal Engineers having qualified in the subject "Water Supply" or "Sewage Disposal," or

(c) Have passed either:—

(1) Sections A and B of the examination for Associate Membership of the Institution of Civil Engineers, including the subject "Hydraulics," or

(2) an examination recognised by that Institution as granting exemption from Sections A and B including the subject "Hydraulics,"

provided in both cases that Corporate Membership is obtained within two years of appointment, or

(d) have passed the whole of the examination for the Testamur of the Institution of Municipal Engineers, including the subject "Water Supply" or "Sewage Disposal," or such other examination as is required by the Institution for Corporate Membership, including the subject "Water Supply" or "Sewage Disposal,"

provided in both cases that Corporate Membership is obtained within two years of appointment.

Quantity Surveyors.—Have obtained Corporate Membership of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (Quantities Section) or have passed a degree or other examinations necessary for obtaining Corporate Membership. Candidates admitted under the latter qualification will be required to obtain Corporate Membership of the Institution within two years of appointment. As an alternative to the above, for posts in Admiralty only, a wide experience of not less than seven years in quantity surveying, covering the preparation of estimates, analysis of prices, measuring work, variations and ordering of materials, and a course of study in a recognised school, provided that Corporate Membership of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors is obtained within two years of appointment.

Estate Surveyors and Lands Officers.—(a) Have obtained Corporate Membership of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors or of the Chartered Auctioneers' and Estate Agents' Institute or of the Land Agents' Society, or

(b) have passed a degree or other examinations necessary for obtaining Corporate Membership of one of the above Institutions, provided that Corporate Membership of the appropriate Institution is obtained within two years of appointment, or

(c) Degree in Estate Management (B.A. Camb. or B.Sc. London).

Special Requirements of Certain Departments:—

(d) as an alternative to (a), (b), and (c) above, for posts in the *Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries*, a British degree in Agriculture. Preference will be given to candidates who have also had practical experience in agricultural land agency.

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF ASSISTANTS (SCIENTIFIC) IN VARIOUS GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

1. *Age.*—Candidates must be at least 17½ and under 26 years of age on 1st January 1950. But

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) for a limited number of vacancies, candidates born on or before 1st January 1924 who have specialised experi-

ence may be admitted. No upper age limit is specified for such candidates; in general, however, Government Departments require a reasonable period of service from persons newly appointed to the Civil Service, and accordingly the Commissioners reserve the right to give weight to this factor in considering candidates who are over 50 years of age.

2. Sex and Marriage.

(i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who are widowed or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. *Nationality*.—Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

In place of a School Certificate a candidate may produce evidence of having passed the Matriculation Examination of London University or any other examination which in the opinion of the Civil Service Commissioners is of equivalent or higher standard.

or (ii) The Senior Leaving Certificate of the Scottish Education Department which includes a pass on at least the lower grade in the special subject of mathematics or science.

or (iii) A statement from the Scottish Education Department or the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland showing that the candidate has attained a standard equivalent to that represented by the award of the School Certificate of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board, including the special qualification in mathematics or a science subject.

or (iv) The Ordinary National Certificate. The Commissioners may admit as eligible under this paragraph candidates who have satisfactorily completed the second year (s.2) of the Senior course.

or (v) An Intermediate Grouped Course Certificate of

the City and Guilds of London Institute in a relevant subject, awarded after a three-year course.

or (vi) A pass in either

the Forces Preliminary Examination with a pass in either mathematics or natural science,

or the Royal Air Force Higher Education Test, Part I, with a pass in mathematics, or mechanics, or the properties of matter.

or the Admiralty Higher Educational Test, Second Class, with a pass in mathematics, or mechanics, or magnetism and electricity.

but (vii) The Commissioners may also accept as eligible, candidates who, owing to circumstances beyond their control, are unable to comply with any of the requirements above, but who produce a certificate from a responsible person under whom they have studied or worked, that they have reached School Certificate credit standard in mathematics or a science subject.

(b) Particular additional requirements are attached to vacancies in certain establishments. For example, in some Departments there are posts for which older ex service men with long experience in technical branches of the Forces are required. For vacancies on sea fisheries work, candidates must be fit to undertake duties at sea; and in the Meteorological Office fitness to undertake regular terms of night duty is required. The great variety of work undertaken by Assistants does not, however, allow detailed specifications of these particular requirements in Regulations. Candidates may, therefore, be questioned further on their training, experience, and interests in the interviews to which reference is made in paragraph 7 below.

(iv) General (including geology, meteorology, general work ranging over two or more groups (i) to (iii) and highly skilled work in laboratory crafts such as glass-blowing).

6. *Further Study*.—Every candidate will be required to state on his application form the courses of further study in individual science subjects (including engineering) or of technical training he is undertaking or has completed; also the certificates or examination passes he has been awarded by recognized public bodies such as the Universities and Technical Colleges, the Royal Institute of Chemistry, the City and Guilds Institute, and the Institute of Medical Laboratory Technology.

7. *Competition*.—The Commissioners may summon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be *prima facie* eligible, or may, if they see fit, summon only those whose qualifications and experience are considered to be most suitable. The Selection Board will recommend for appointment those candidates who appear to them to possess the best qualifications, having regard to the nature of the vacancies available. The Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of education and experience, any recommendations that they may receive from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the candidates' scientific knowledge and personal qualities as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above evidence the Board will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

8. *Health and Character*.—Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

9. *Candidates Trained as Teachers*.—Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland), has been notified to the Commissioners.

10. *Assignment*.—It will rest with the Commissioners to determine the Department to which each successful candidate shall be assigned. In making the assignments the Commissioners will be guided by the requirements of the public service but wishes of candidates will be met as far as possible.
