WHEREAS the Secretary of State for Scotland has, WHEREAS the Secretary of State for Scotland has, in pursuance of the powers competent to him under the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, made a representation that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor dated 13th July 1950 pronounced by the Sheriff-Substitute of Inverness, Moray, Nairn, and Ross and Cromarty, at Inverness, finding that the former Burial Ground in the Parish of Portree and County of Inverness known as the Portree Old Churchyard is dangerous to health and contrary to decency : And whereas in the said representation it is recommended that, in terms of Section 5 of the aforesaid Act, burials be forthwith discontinued in the said Burial Ground except for the burial therein of (1) persons whom the County Council of Inverness may specially authorize to be buried in the said Burial Ground; and (2) cremated human remains : Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased to give notice of such representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration on the 27th day of November next: And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this in

Order, or Notice thereof, be published in the Eduburgh Gazette, and that copies of this Order, or Notice thereof, be fixed as required by the aforesaid Act on the doors of the Church of or on some other conspicuous places within the Parish of Portree one month before such representation is considered.
