The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz. :—

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF MALE POSTAL AND TELEGRAPH OFFICERS IN THE POST OFFICE.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 16 and under 18 years of age on 1st March 1951.

2. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either
(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

3. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Com-

missioners as to their health and character. They must be at least 5 feet in height.

4. Examination.

The subjects of examination and the marks they will carry are as follows :—

(1) Arithmetic	...	...	...	...	100

Candidates will be arranged in order of merit on their aggregate of marks in the examination as a whole. Even if there are unfilled vacancies, no candidate will be appointed who does not obtain an aggregate which satisfies the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

6. Fee.

A fee of 7s. 6d. is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the application form, and is not returnable in any circumstances.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that concurrent open competitive examinations will be held on the 13th March 1951, under the above Regulations to fill vacancies in the London Area and in certain Provincial Towns.

No person will be admitted to examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received on or before the 25th January 1951, an application on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

NOTES.

1. An asterisk is added in those instances where the whole three words are used as the "ordinary name" and in the signature, as they legally may be, but it is legally open to the heads of any of the houses concerned to add the designation as part of the name and by doing so regularly make those three words their "ordinary surname."

2. These names and designations are in Scots law and practice used by :—

(a) The head of the family and his wife.

(b) The eldest son and his wife, with the adjection "younger," and their eldest son.

(c) The unmarried daughters, and unmarried daughters of the eldest son.

The designations are not used by younger sons.
