The Import Duties (Drawback) (No. 6) Order, 1951, which approves two Schemes, one for the allowance of drawback on nitro-cellulose photographic film base and the other on photographic film base other than nitro-cellulose, used in the manufacture respectively of unexposed sensitised photographic film and of such film and unsensitised film base prepared for colour photography.

These Schemes, which replace previous Schemes, widen the scope of the material eligible for drawback and increase the rates of drawback.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF GEOLOGISTS
IN THE GEOLOGICAL SURVEY OF GREAT BRITAIN UNDER THE
DEPARTMENT OF SCIENTIFIC AND INDUSTRIAL RESEARCH.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 21 and under 30 years of age on 1st August 1951, i.e., they must have been born on or after the 2nd August 1921, and on or before the 1st August 1930. But

(1) The maximum age limit of 30 is extended to 31 for candidates who hold a permanent appointment in the Experimental Officer Class, i.e., they must have been born on or after 2nd August 1920, and on or before 1st August 1930.

(2) A candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may for this purpose deduct his period of such service from his actual age.

2. Sex and Marriage.

(i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established Civil Servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October 1946, or who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is, or was at death, a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

4. Qualifications.

(i) Every candidate must have obtained a university degree with first or second class honours in Geology or an equivalent qualification.

Provided that the Commissioners may at their discretion admit a candidate with high professional attainments.

(ii) A candidate holding a permanent appointment in the Experimental Officer Class who was born on or before 1st August 1923, and on or after 2nd August 1920, and who does not fulfil the above requirements may be admitted on the recommendation of the Government Department in which he or she is serving.

(iii) But candidates sitting for their final degree examinations in the summer of 1951 will be admitted to the competition; a candidate will not, however, be declared successful unless on the result of the examination he or she satisfies Regulation 4 (i) above.

5. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. Competition.

(i) The Commissioners may at their discretion summon candidates to a preliminary formal interview.

(ii) A certain number of the candidates will be chosen, on the basis of the information available, to appear before a Selection Board appointed by the Commissioners. The Selection Board in making their recommendations to the Commissioners, and the Commissioners in making their final decision, will give weight to the candidates' capacity or potentiality for original research or development work; and they will as a rule expect this quality to be demonstrated in a candidate's record.

The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

9. Fee.

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF YOUNG MEN WHO
HAVE COMPLETED A PERIOD OF COMPULSORY SERVICE IN
H.M. FORCES FOR THE CLERICAL CLASSES (GENERAL AND
DEPARTMENTAL) OF THE HOME CIVIL SERVICE.

1. Age.

Candidates must have been born on or after 2nd September 1928.

2. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

3. Education.

No precise educational qualifications are prescribed, but candidates will be expected to have attained the standard of education of persons who have had whole-time systematic education up to the age of at least 16 years.

4. Service.

(i) Candidates must have completed before the first day of the examination a period of compulsory service in His Majesty's Forces under the National Service Acts; they may not make more than two attempts in all and these must be made not later than the third examination held under these Regulations after the completion of National Service. The date officially recorded as the last day of National Service is normally the last day of demobilisation or release leave; candidates are not, however, precluded from competing at an examination held during the demobilisation or release leave.

(ii) The Commissioners may at their discretion accept a candidate as eligible under this Regulation if, having completed a period of compulsory service in H.M. Forces under the National Service Acts, he has voluntarily undertaken further whole-time service in H.M. Forces, continuous with his compulsory service, for a limited period, normally not exceeding 18 months. In such a case the date of completion of this further period of whole-time service will be regarded as the date of completion of compulsory service for the purpose of the preceding paragraph of this Regulation.

5. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. Examination.

The subjects of examination and the marks they will carry are as follows:—

(1) English (including Handwriting)	250
(2) Arithmetic	100

Candidates will be arranged in the order of merit of their aggregate marks in the whole examination. No candidate will be declared successful who does not obtain an aggregate which satisfies the Civil Service Commissioners.

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF ASSISTANTS (SCIENTIFIC) IN VARIOUS GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 17½ and under 26 years of age on 1st January 1951. But

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) for a certain number of vacancies, candidates born on or before 1st January 1925, who have specialized experience may be admitted. No upper age limit is specified for such candidates; in general, however, Government Departments require a reasonable period of service from persons newly appointed to the Civil Service, and accord-

ingly the Commissioners reserve the right to give weight to this factor in considering candidates who are over 50 years of age.

2. Sex and Marriage.

(i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established Civil Servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October 1946, or who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

In place of a School Certificate a candidate may produce evidence of having passed the Matriculation Examination of London University or any other examination which in the opinion of the Civil Service Commissioners is of equivalent or higher standard, or

(b) A General Certificate of Education in four subjects at Ordinary level to include (a) English and (b) a scientific or a mathematical subject, or

(c) The Senior Leaving Certificate of the Scottish Education Department which includes a pass on at least the lower grade in the special subject of mathematics or science, or

(d) A statement from the Scottish Education Department or the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland showing that the candidate has attained a standard equivalent to that represented by the award of the School Certificate of the Oxford and Cambridge Schools Examination Board, including the special qualification in mathematics or a science subject, or

(e) The Ordinary National Certificate. (The Commissioners may admit as eligible under this paragraph

candidates who have satisfactorily completed the second year (s.2) of the Senior course), or

(f) The Intermediate Examination of the Institute of Medical Laboratory Technology, or

(g) An Intermediate Grouped Course Certificate of the City and Guilds of London Institute in relevant subjects, or

(h) a pass in either the Forces Preliminary Examination with a pass in either mathematics or natural science, or the Royal Air Force Higher Education Test, Part I, with a pass in mathematics, mechanics, or the properties of matter, or

the Admiralty Higher Educational Test, Second Class, with a pass in mathematics or mechanics or magnetism and electricity, but

(j) The Commissioners may also accept as eligible candidates who are unable to comply with the requirements above but who

(i) produce evidence satisfactory to the Commissioners that they have reached School Certificate Credit standard in Mathematics or a Science subject, or

(ii) have served for at least 10 years, on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement, in the technical branch of H.M. Forces. Such candidates must have served an artificer apprenticeship (where appropriate) or have reached the rank of Petty Officer or Sergeant, or

(iii) are employed full-time as glass-blowers in Government Departments, provided they are nominated by their Department and satisfy the Commissioners of their skill in their craft. Such candidates must be wholly employed in the construction of glassware for use in scientific laboratories.

5. Experience

Every candidate must have had thorough experience in the duties of the class gained by service in a Government Department or other civilian scientific establishment or in technical branches of the Forces. The experience must cover a minimum period of two years to be completed before the date on which he sends in his application, on duties appropriate to the type of vacancy for which application is made and the two-year period must be recent, subject to allowance for gaps in cases where the experience has been broken by service in H.M. (iv) The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF YOUNG MEN WHO HAVE COMPLETED A PERIOD OF COMPULSORY SERVICE IN H.M. FORCES FOR GRADE 6 POSTS IN BRANCH B OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE.

1. Age.

Candidates must have been born on or after 2nd September 1928.

2. Nationality.

(1) Every candidate must

(a) be a natural-born British subject; and

(b) have been born within the United Kingdom or within one of the self-governing Dominions of parents both of whom were also born within the United Kingdom or within one of the self-governing Dominions.

(2) No departure from this rule will be made without the special permission of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and then only in exceptional cases and in favour of candidates who are British subjects and who also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or,

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.
