RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF NAUTICAL SURVEYORS (MALE) IN THE MARINE SURVEY SERVICE OF THE MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 28 years of age on the 1st January 1951. The Commissioners have not specified an upper age limit for this competition. In general, however, Government Departments require a reasonable period of Service from persons newly appointed to the Civil Service; and accordingly the Commissioners reserve the right to give weight to this factor in considering candidates for these posts who are over 50 years of age.

2. Sex.

Men only may compete under these Regulations.

3. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject, or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(iii) Personal qualities—Importance is attached to personal qualities and will play a considerable part in determining the success of a candidate.

NORTH OF SCOTLAND HYDRO-ELECTRIC BOARD. CONSTRUCTIONAL SCHEME No. 25. BREADALBANE PROJECT.

THE North of Scotland Hydro-Electric Board have prepared a Constructional Scheme in accordance with Section 5 of the Hydro-Electric Development (Scotland) Act, 1943, as amended by the Electricity Act, 1947, providing for the construction of Works, the situation of which is shown in Part I of the Schedule hereto, and for the acquisition of the lands specified in Part II of the said Schedule.

The Scheme has been approved by the British Electricity Authority and submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation.

Copies of the Scheme are available for inspection and sale (price 2s. 6d. per copy, post free) at offices of the Board (Head Office, 16 Rothesay Terrace, Edinburgh, 3) and at the office of Messrs. Sherwood & Company, St. Stephen's House, Victoria Embankment, Westminster, London, S.W.1.

In the County of Perth.

Work No. 1.—A reservoir (being an enlargement of Loch Lyon) in the Parish of Fortingall to be formed by a dam across the River Lyon at a point 330 yards or thereby measured in a north-westerly direction from the cottage of Lubreoch.

Work No. 2.—A generating station in the Parish of Fortingall situated adjacent to the dam forming Reservoir (Work No. 1), and including a tail-race to the River Lyon.
