AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE

The 30th day of January 1952.

PRESENT,

THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty dated the 28th day of January 1952 (N. 10884/50) in the words following, viz. :—

“ Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

“ And Whereas by Your Order in Council dated the 26th day of June 1946, rates of pay and of Marriage Allowance were approved with effect from 1st July 1946 for Petty Officers and Seamen of the Royal Navy and for non-commissioned Officers and men of the Royal Marines :

“ And Whereas by Your Order in Council dated the 29th day of September 1949, the aforesaid rates of pay and Marriage Allowance were increased as from 24th November 1948, subject to certain restrictions applicable to men called up for National Service and joining for duty on and after 1st January 1947 :

“ And Whereas it has been found desirable with effect from 1st September 1950 still further to increase the rates of pay, but not the rates of Marriage Allowance and to adopt a revised pay code whereby a higher scale of pay may be earned by the attainment of qualifications superior to those required for the rating held, subject to the proviso that National Service ratings shall continue to receive the rates of Marriage Allowance laid down in Schedule V of Your Order in Council dated the 26th day of June 1946, and shall not be given the benefit of the revised rates of pay and conditions until they have completed 18 months' full-time service :

“ And Whereas it is in the interests of Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces that men who are serving on regular engagements should re-engage to complete time for pension, and that a bounty of £100 should be offered to them to do so :

“ We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the provisions set out in the accompanying Schedules :

“ The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have concurred in these proposals.

“ SCHEDULE I—GENERAL.

“ The rates of pay and allowances in the following Schedules to apply to ratings and other ranks of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines, other than National Service men during their initial 18 months' paid full-time service and men entered locally abroad ; and, subject to the regulations for their services, to apply also to members of the several Reserve Forces and pensioners while serving or training in H.M. Ships and Establishments, or while called out for actual service in war or emergency. The pay and allowances of men entered abroad to continue to be determined within the following scales in relation to local economic conditions.

“ 2. Higher scales of pay for higher qualifications to be instituted as follows, subject to withdrawal in the event of loss of or reduction in qualification :

“ (a) For Able and Leading ratings of all branches and equivalent ranks, Royal Marines on passing for advancement to higher rating or higher rank.

“ (b) For Seamen Branch ratings and other ranks, Royal Marines on attaining a specialist qualification (hereinafter referred to as S.Q.).

“ (c) For Chief Petty Officers and Petty Officers of non-Seaman Branches (other than Artificers, Mechanics, Artisans, Motor Mechanics, Ordnance Mechanics and Aircrew) and for Sergeant Buglers and Bugle Majors, Royal Marines on acquiring experience and professional or technical skill above that required for advancement to their rating or rank.

“ (d) For Royal Marine Tradesmen according to class.

The award of a higher scale of pay on the attainment of a higher qualification as at (a) or (c) above to be subject to Commanding Officer's approval.

“ 3. Ratings who are advanced on a local acting basis without the qualifications required for normal advancement to receive 6d. a day less than the rate appropriate to the fully qualified rating.

“ 4. Incremental pay based on total man's service to be replaced by progressive pay for length of service in each rating above Ordinary rating, irrespective of the branch or branches in which the service has been rendered. Reservists to count only mobilized and/or former active service for this purpose.

" SECTION XV.

" RE-ENGAGEMENT BOUNTIES.

" A bounty of £100 to be paid at our discretion to male ratings and other ranks, Royal Marines, who, whilst serving on regular engagements of 12 years or less on or after 1st September 1950, sign for re-engagement to complete 22 years' Service for pension. The bounty to become payable on the first day of a man's thirteenth year of reckonable service, or on the date of re-engagement, if later. The scheme for payment of these bounties to be terminated on 31st December 1952."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The Secretary of State for Scotland, the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, and the Secretary of State for the Home Department, in pursuance of Section 2 of the Herring Industry Act, 1938, have appointed Mr. D. F. Cartwright, M.B.E., M.C., to be a Member of the Herring Industry Advisory Council until the 31st March 1952, in place of Mr. A. E. Ballett, who has resigned.

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have made an Order, entitled the Savings Banks (Limits of Deposits) (Amendment) Order, 1952, the effect of which is to increase from £2000 to £3000 the maximum amount that any person may hold on deposit in the Post Office Savings Bank or in the Trustee Savings Banks. This Order was made on the 13th February 1952, and comes into operation on the 1st March 1952.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday the 29th February 1952, at 1 p.m., for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £200,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000, or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 3rd March 1952 to Saturday the 8th March 1952, inclusive, and will be due 91 days after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House, or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent by post, on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part, and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday 11.30 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF MALE POSTAL AND TELEGRAPH OFFICERS IN THE POST OFFICE.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 16 and under 18 years of age on 1st March 1952.

2. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.
