WAGES COUNCILS ACTS, 1945 to 1948.  
BRUSH AND BROOM WAGES COUNCIL.  
(GREAT BRITAIN).

The Brush and Broom Wages Council (Great Britain) hereby gives notice of its intention to submit to the Minister of Labour and National Service proposals for the revocation of the Brush and Broom Wages Council (Great Britain) Wages Regulation (Holidays) Order, 1947 (Order M.(65)), and for the making of a Wages Regulation Order substituting revised provisions for holidays and holiday remuneration for those at present in operation.

The Wages Council will consider any written representation with respect to the above-mentioned proposals which may be sent to it within fourteen days from 14th November 1952. The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz. :—

RECRUITMENT OF DRIVING AND TRAFFIC EXAMINERS IN THE  
MINISTRY OF TRANSPORT.

1. *Age.*

Candidates must have been born on or before 1st January 1923. The Commissioners have not specified an upper age limit for this Competition. In general, however, Government Departments require a reasonable period of service from persons newly appointed to the Civil Service; and accordingly the Commissioners reserve the right to give weight to this factor in considering candidates for these posts who are over 50 years of age.

2. *Sex and Marriage.*

(i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October 1946, or who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. *Nationality.*

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject, or

(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's Dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

4. *Qualifications.*

Candidates must have had a wide experience of driving, including driving motor cycles and including some recent experience; certain motoring offences will lead to disqualification. Candidates must know the Highway Code in detail and have a general knowledge of Road Transport law as it affects the operation of passenger and goods vehicles. Experience in driving tuition, driving testing, conducting interviews or writing concise and accurate reports, will be an additional advantage.

5. *Health and Character.*

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. *Competitions.*

Candidates who appear from their application forms to have the best qualifications and experience will be given a driving test. Those who pass the test will be called before a Selection Board which will recommend to the Commissioners for appointment the candidates who appear most suitable. The decision of the Commissioners will be final. The Selection Board will frame their recommendation on the candidate's record of education and experience, any recommendations that they may receive from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidate as shown at the interview.

7. *Candidates Trained as Teachers.*

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. *Fee.*

Candidates selected for appointment will be required to pay a fee of £1 10s. before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

9. *Canvassing.*

Any attempt on the part of the candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz. :—

RECRUITMENT TO THE STATISTICIAN CLASS OF THE  
HOME CIVIL SERVICE.

1. No candidate may compete more than twice.

2. *Age.*

Candidates must be at least 20½ years and under 24 years of age on the 1st August of the year in which the examination is held. But a candidate who has served or is serving in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age.

3. *Sex.*

Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

4. *Nationality.*

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's Dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

5. *Health and Character.*

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. *Subjects of Examination.*

(i) The examination consists of the following :—

(A) A written examination in

(a) five compulsory subjects for which a maximum of 700 marks is allotted;

(b) a selection from the optional subjects set out in the Appendix. Subject to the provisions in the Appendix, candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 300 marks.

(B) Interview, comprising

(a) a preliminary interview by a single interviewer, who will supply a report for the information of the Final Interview Board;

(b) an interview before the Final Interview Board,

which will award a mark out of a maximum of 300 for the candidate's record, intelligence, and personal qualities.

(ii) The final order of merit will be determined by the total marks gained in the whole examination. In the event of a tie between two or more candidates the Commissioners will decide which to declare successful.

#### 7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

#### 8. Assignment.

The Commissioners will decide to which Government Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignment will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account.

#### 9. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

#### 10. Fee.

The total fee payable by all candidates is £4. Of this £2 must be paid on application.

3. Candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 300 marks. A candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 300 marks must name a subject to be marked on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 300. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 300 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

4. The following restrictions apply to particular optional subjects:

(a) Industry and Trade (30), Money, Banking, and Exchange (31), Public Finance (32), Social Economics (33), may be taken only by candidates who offer General Economics (29) or any two of the following:—History of Political Thought (24), Political Theory (25), Political Organisation (26), Modern British Government (27).

(b) International Relations (28) may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (8) or International Law (15).

(c) Candidates may not offer more than two of the three periods of English Literature (59-61).

(d) Greek Literature (68) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (65), and Latin Literature (72) only by those who offer Latin Translation (69).

5. A candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (23) or any of the subjects 41 to 52 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training of university standard. For Astronomy (40), and Engineering (53) equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competition will be held under the above Regulations, the written examination being held in July 1953.

No person will be admitted to the Competition from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received on or before the 28th February 1953, an application on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

NOTE.—The following diseases were eradicated from Great Britain in the years indicated:—Cattle plague or rinder-pest (*pestis bovina*), 1877; pleuro-pneumonia (*peripneumonia contagiosa bovum*), 1898; sheep pox (*variola ovium*), 1850; rabies, 1922; epizootic lymphangitis (*lymphangitis epizootica*), 1906; and glanders (including farcy) (*malleus*), 1928. Dourine (*exanthema coitale paralyticum*) has never existed in Great Britain.
