## TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS

1. 5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House, or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent by post, on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part, and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday, 11.30 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

**LIMITED COMPETITION FOR APPOINTMENTS AS ASSISTANT EXPERIMENTAL OFFICER IN VARIOUS GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.**

**1. Age.**

Candidates must be at least 28 and under 31 years of age on 31st December 1953, *i.e.*, they must have been born on or after 1st January 1923, and on or before 31st December 1925.

**2. Sex.**

Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

**3. Service.**

Candidates must at the date of their application hold a permanent appointment in the Assistant (Scientific) Class.

**4. Nationality.**

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalised British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's Dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

Provided that a candidate will not be eligible for an appointment under the Admiralty, War Office, Air Ministry, or Ministry of Supply, unless he or she is a natural-born British subject and born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions of parents also born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions, except when the circumstances are such as to justify a departure from the general rule, in which case, provided the candidate satisfies the conditions prescribed by the preceding paragraphs, he or she may be admitted by special permission of the First Lord of the Admiralty, Secretary of State for War, Secretary of State for Air, or Minister of Supply, as the case may be.

**5. Qualification.**

Normally every candidate must be in possession of one of the under-mentioned qualifications:—

(a) The Higher School Certificate with Mathematics or a science subject as a principal subject, or an equivalent qualification, or

(b) a General Certificate of Education in five subjects at the levels shown in brackets:—

(i) English language (Ordinary).

(ii) Two mathematical or scientific subjects (Advanced).

(iii) Mathematics (Ordinary), if no mathematical

subject is offered in (ii)—except in the case of candidates who offer two biological subjects (Advanced) in (ii).

(iv) A scientific subject (Ordinary) if no scientific subject is offered in (ii).

(v) Balance of one or two subjects (Ordinary) at candidates' choice.

To assist candidates *during the change-over period* they will be admitted to this competition if they already possess a School Certificate and in addition obtain passes at the General Certificate of Education examination in two mathematical or scientific subjects at Advanced level; or

(c) The Senior Certificate of the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland showing passes in English Language and in two Science subjects at Advanced level, in Mathematics at Ordinary level and in one other subject; or one Science and two Mathematical subjects at Advanced level and in two other subjects; or three Mathematical subjects at Advanced level, in one Science subject and one other subject; or

(d) A statement from the Scottish Education Department or the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland showing that they have attained a standard equivalent to that required by (a) or (b) above; or

(e) A university degree in a scientific or engineering subject or in Mathematics; or

(f) Associateship of the Royal Institute of Chemistry, or graduate membership of any other professional institution accepted by the Commissioners as appropriate (e.g., Institution of Civil Engineers, Institution of Mechanical Engineers, Institution of Electrical Engineers); or

(g) The Higher National Certificate; or

(h) The final certificate of a grouped course in a relevant subject at the City and Guilds of London Institute. BUT

(j) Candidates who are not in possession of such certificate or equivalent qualification may be admitted exceptionally by the Commissioners, at their discretion, if evidence of suitable experience on scientific research and development work can be produced; and if the candidates are certified by their Departments as being worthy of consideration.

**6. Application.**

A candidate sitting for an examination during 1953 with a view to obtaining any of the qualifications set out above may be admitted to the Competition before the result of the examination is known. He will not, however, be declared successful unless on the result of the examination he satisfies Regulation 5.

A candidate admitted under the concession will be expected to furnish documentary evidence of the result of the examination to the Commissioners as soon as possible.

A candidate may make one and one one application under these Regulations.

**7. Health and Character.**

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

**8. Competition.**

(i) The Commissioners may at their discretion summon candidates to a preliminary informal interview.

(ii) A certain number of the candidates will be chosen on the basis of the information available, to appear before a Selection Board appointed by the Commissioners.

(iii) The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

**9. Assignment.**

It will rest with the Commissioners to determine the Department to which each successful candidate shall be assigned. In making the assignments the Commissioners will be guided by the requirements of the public service but the wishes of candidates will be met as far as possible.

**10. Fee.**

A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £2 before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

**REGULATIONS FOR RECRUITMENT TO THE SITUATION OF OFFICER OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE (MEN)**

1. No candidate may compete more than twice in all under Normal Regulations and and under Reconstruction Regulations for the situation of Officer of Customs and Excise.

**2. Age.**

Candidates must be at least 19 and under 21 years of age on 1st March 1953. BUT

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served or is serving in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular engagement may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years;

(c) candidates who have served in any established post to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they have spent in such service before 1st March 1953.

**3. Sex and Marriage.**

Men only are eligible.

**4. Nationality.**

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in Her Majesty's Dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

The Interview will be held after the written examination. Of the candidates who obtain the highest aggregate marks in the written examination a certain number, to be determined by the Civil Service Commissioners, will be summoned to interview. The final order of merit will be determined by adding together the marks obtained in the written examination and the interview. Candidates must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the examination as a whole as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

**7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.**

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

**8. Fee.**

REGULATIONS ENTITLED NATIONAL INSURANCE  
(ADDITIONAL DAYS OF UNEMPLOYMENT  
BENEFIT) REGULATIONS, 1953**

In accordance with Section 77 of the National Insurance Act, 1946, the National Insurance Advisory Committee give notice that they have received from the Joint Authority (comprising the Minister of National Insurance and the Minister of Labour and National Insurance for Northern Ireland) for consideration and report thereon the preliminary draft of Regulations entitled National Insurance (Additional Days of Unemployment Benefit) Regulations 1953.

A short Explanatory Note on these Regulations is appended to this Notice.

The Committee will take into consideration any objection, made by or on behalf of persons affected, sent to them before 10th March 1953, having regard to the terms of the Act, which provides that objections must be made within a period of 28 days at most, the Committee are unable to allow a longer period within which objections may be submitted. If an objection is submitted within the prescribed time, however, the Committee will be prepared, if they are satisfied that sufficient grounds exist, to allow the later submission of evidence or explanation in support of the objection. **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

These Regulations provide an exception to the general rule, resulting from the provisions of the National Insurance Act, 1946, that a person who has been entitled to unemployment benefit for 180 days in a particular period cannot again be entitled to that benefit until he has re-qualified therefor by the payment of certain contributions. The Regulations enable a person to qualify, in certain circumstances, for unemployment benefit for more than 180 days without re-qualifying. The circumstances in which, and the number of additional days for which, a person will so qualify will be determined mainly by reference to the contributions paid, and the unemployment benefit received by him under that Act in past years; but additional factors will be taken into account in the cases of certain persons who were insured under the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1935, immediately before 5th July 1948. The Regulations also revoke certain transitional provisions relating to unemployment benefit for persons so insured.
