The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council

WHEREAS the Secretary of State for Scotland has, in pursuance of the powers competent to him under the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, 18 and 19 Vict., c. 68, made a Representation that he has received a copy of an Interlocutor dated 21st January 1953, pronounced by the Sheriff-Substitute of Aberdeen, Kincardine, and Banff, at Stonehaven, finding that the Burial Ground known as Glenbervie Churchyard in the Parish of Glenbervie and County of Kincardine, is in a condition which is dangerous to health and contrary to decency:

And whereas in the said Representation it is recommended that in terms of Section 5 of the said Act burials be forthwith discontinued in the said Burial Ground subject to the exceptions hereinafter mentioned:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 1st day of April 1953, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 19th day of May 1953, and that the said Order or Notice thereof should be published in the *Edinburgh Gazette*, and that copies of the said Order or Notice should be fixed on the doors of the churches of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parish of Glenbervie one month before the said 19th day of May 1953:

And whereas notice of the said Representation and of the time when it pleased Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council has been duly published in the *Edinburgh Gazette* and fixed in manner required by the said Order in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. That in terms of Section 5 of the Burial Grounds (Scotland) Act, 1855, burials be forthwith discontinued in the Burial Ground at Glenbervie in the Parish of Glenbervie and County of Kincardine known as Glenbervie Churchyard except for the burial of:—

(1) any person whose husband or wife is buried in the said Burial Ground;

(2) persons whose children are buried in the said Burial Ground;

(3) unmarried persons who at the date of closing of the said Burial Ground are over 40 years of age and one or both of whose parents are at that date buried in the said Burial Ground;

(4) any person whom the Council of Kincardine may specially authorise to be buried in the said Burial Ground;

(5) cremated human remains;

Provided that the exercise of the right of burial be not injurious to health or offensive or contrary to decency; that intimation of a burial be given to the District Sanitary Inspector of the County of Kincardine not later than the day preceding that on which a grave is to be opened; and that no burial except the burial of cremated human remains shall be made unless the coffin can be laid at a depth of

four feet from the surface of the ground to the upper surface of the coffin, and that without interference with the remains of a previous burial.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Scotland) (Glenbervie Churchyard) Order, 1953.
