The following addresses have been transmitted to his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and have been presented by him to the King; his Majesty was pleased to receive them in the most gracious manner.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

We, your Majesty's most dutiful subjects, the President and Fellows of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, beg leave to approach the throne of the united kingdoms of England, Scotland, and Ireland, and to join our sincere congratulations with those of all your Majesty's loyal subjects on your attaining the fiftieth year of your reign.

Revering your private virtues, and participating with all our fellow-subjects in the blessings of your mild and just government, we esteem the gracious protection afforded to your Majesty by divine providence during your long and arduous reign, as demanding the sincere gratitude of all your loyal subjects. But when we look around on the revolutions and the subversion of so many mighty empires, and contrast with their distresses our own safety and prosperity; when we contemplate the extent of our commerce, our improvements in agriculture and manufactures, our advancement in the arts and sciences, the growing opulence of the country, and the enlargement of our national resources, we cannot but feel peculiar exultation, and must acknowledge that peculiar thankfulness should animate the breast of every inhabitant of these favoured kingdoms.

Convinced that all our prosperity depends, under God, upon the stability of the constitution, and the preservation of those civil and religious rights and liberties, which your august house were called to defend, we feel ourselves attached, by the strongest ties, to your Majesty, their uniform and faithful guardian.

Nor can we forget the blessings conferred, during your Majesty's beneficent reign, on your distant dominions, nor the justice and humanity exercised towards other quarters of the globe. These will form an æra not to be forgotten in history amidst the awful and portentous events of the present period.

That your Majesty's valuable life may be prolonged for many years, and that your reign may be attended with peace, happiness, and glory to your Majesty, to the royal family, to the nation whom you govern, and to the human race, is the sincere prayer, may it please your Majesty, of your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the President and Fellows of the Royal College of Physicians in Edinburgh.
