A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

Whereas our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the fifth day of December next: We, with the advice of our privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be farther prorogued on the said 5th day of December next, to Tuesday the 23d day of January next: And we have given order to our Chancellor of that part of our united kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And we do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare our royal will and pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said 23d day of January next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners of Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said twenty-third day of January next.

Given at our Court at [the Queen's Palace, the twenty-second day of November one thousand eight hundred and nine, in the fiftieth year of our reign.
