The King has been pleased to appoint Sir Gore Ouseley, Baronet, to hold the situation of Mehmander to the Envoy Extraordinary from his Majesty the King of Persia, at this Court.

The following address has been transmitted to his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, and has been presented by him to the King; his Majesty was pleased to receive it in the most gracious manner.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty, The humble address of the Lieutenantcy, Justices of the Peace, Freeholders, and Commissioners of Supply of the Shire of Ross, in general meeting assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Lieutenant, Sheriff-Depute, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Freeholders, and Commissioners of Supply of the Shire of Ross, assembled in a general meeting, beg leave to approach your sacred person, with our sincere congratulations on the recent anniversary of your accession to the throne of these realms; and to join, with our fellow subjects, in expressing the sincere joy we feel in the event of your Majesty's now entering into the fiftieth year of a reign, wherein we have seen, while nearly the whole kingdoms and states of Europe have had their constitution, laws, and liberties subverted, and have been obliged to submit to the iron grasp of a military despotism, these happy realms, through the firmness of your Majesty's character, and the energy of your government, have amidst these the most portentous events that history records, preserv-

ed entire that happy and glorious constitution in church and state, which was handed down to us by our ancestors. Impressed with a deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God, for the numberless blessings he has vouchsafed to pour on us, so eminently favoured nation, and particularly, for having continued to us, the happiness of your Majesty's government, for so long a period: we implore that he will be pleased, very long, to protect your Majesty's most valuable life, for our benefit and joy; and may, long hereafter, the bright example your Majesty hath set, secure to our posterity the same blessings.
