The Queen's most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS by section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865 (28 & 29 Vict. c. 73), it is enacted that all pay, wages, pensions, bounty money, grants or other allow-ances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Her Majesty's naval or marine force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman or marine, or to the widow or any relative of a deceased officer, seaman or marine, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

And whereas Her Majesty deems it expedient to amend

And whereas Her Majesty deems it expedient to amend certain Orders in Council concerning retired pay, pensions and other grants for officers, nurses and ratings disab ed, and for the widows and children of officers and ratings deceased, in consequence of service during the 1914 World War : Now, therefore. Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Her as aforesaid and of all other powers whatsoever Her thereunto enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows : ordered, as follows :

1. In this Order the following expressions have the meanings hereby respectively assigned to them :

(1) "the 1920 Order" means the Order in Council of the 11th June 1920 (S.R. & O. 1920 1021 (II, p. 295)), relating to seamen and marines, as amended by any subsequent Order in Council :

(4) "the 1949 Order" means the Order in Council of the 29th September 1949, as amended by any subsequent Order in Council :

in Council : 2. In Article 6a of the 1920 Order, as amended (Orders of 29th September 1949, and 18th July 1952), (which provides for the award of allowances for constant attendance on dis-abled ratings) for the figures 25s, and 50s. there shall be substituted the figures 30s, and 60s. respectively, and in Article 7 of the 1921 (Officers) Order and of the 1921 (War-rant Officers) Order, as amended in both cases (Orders of 29th September 1949, and 18th July 1952), (which make similar provisions for disabled officers) and in Article 27 of the 1921 (Officers) Order, as amended (Orders of 29th Sep-tember 1949, and 18th July 1952), which makes similar pro-visions for disabled nurses) for the figures 50s. there shall be substituted the figures 60s. substituted the figures 60s.

4. In Article 12 of the 1920 Order, as amended (Order of 29th September 1949), (which provides for the award of allowances for the children of ratings' widows) for the figures 11s., wherever the same appear, there shall be substituted the figures 16s. 6d.

5. In Article 18 (1) of the 1920 Order, as amended (Order of 29th September 1949), (which provides for the award of pensions for motherless children of ratings) for the figures 26s. there shall be substituted the figures 40s.

25. In Article 14 of the 1949 Order (which provides for awards to widows and children on the death of officers or ratings on or after the 3rd September 1939)-

(a) Proviso (b) to paragraph (2) shall be deleted and there shall be substituted the following proviso :—

"(b) a widow who is not over 40 years of age and is without children eligible for an allowance under this Article, but-

(i) is incapable of self-support by reason of infirmity; or

(ii) was in receipt of an allowance in respect of a child of the officer or rating awarded under this Article, of whom she is the mother, until the date upon which the child attained the age of 16 years, or is a widen when in the opinion of the Minister in any other case, should be treated as if she had been in receipt of such an allowance until that date;

may be awarded a pension under this Article at the rate may be awarded a pension under this Article at the rate which would be appropriate to her case if she were over 40 years of age and otherwise eligible under the pro-visions of this Order and of the 1921 (Officers) Order, the 1921 (Warrant Officers) Order or the 1920 Order, as the case may be, for an award at that rate ;"

27.—(1) This Order shall be construed as one with the 1920 Order, the 1921 (Officers) Order, the 1921 (Warrant Officers) Order and the 1949 Order and subject to the follow-ing provisions of this Article, shall come into operation in relation to an officer or nurse on the 1st February 1955, and in relation to a rating on the 31st January 1955, so, however, that, in relation to any award payable weekly, the said reference to the 31st January 1955, where this is not the normal weekly pay day for that award, shall be construed as a reference to the first normal weekly pay day for that award following the 31st January 1955.

(2) Articles 17, 19 and 21 of this Order shall come into operation in relation to an officer or nurse on the 1st June 1955, and in relation to a rating on the 18th May 1955.

(3) The provisions of this Order specified in the first column of the following Table, in so far as they relate to the column of the following Table, in so far as they relate to the figures specified in relation to them respectively in the second column, shall be deemed to have come into operation on the dates so specified in the third column, so, however, that until the dates from which the said provisions are brought into full operation by paragraphs (1) of this Article there shall be substituted for the said figures, the figures specified in the fourth column in the fourth column.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTE.

# (This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

1. This Order amends the Order of the 11th June 1920, the Orders of the 9th March 1921, and the Order of the 29th September 1949, as amended by subsequent Orders.

2. The normal maximum rate of the allowances for constant attendance is increased from 25s. a week to 30s. a week in the case of ratings and the maximum, for exceptional cases of very severe disablement, from 50s. a week to 60s. a week in the case of officers, nurses and ratings. (Article 2).

3. The pension rates for certain widows of officers and ratings are increased by  $\pounds 28$  a year and by 10s. 6d. a week respectively. (Articles 3, 10 and 15).

4. The allowances payable to widows in respect of children are increased from £36 a year or £30 a year in the case of children of officers and 11s. a week in the case of children of ratings to £50 10s. a year, £44 10s. a year and 16s. 6d. a week respectively. (Articles 4, 7, 12 and 26).

5.—(1) The rates of pensions or allowances payable to or in respect of children of deceased members of the naval forces (such children having become motherless or having ceased to be under the control of their mother) are increased to \$86 10s., \$62 and \$78 10s. in the case of children of officers and to 20s. a week or 30s. a week (according to the ages of the children) in the case of children of ratings. (Articles 25 (b) and 26).

(2) The pensions payable to such children who, having attained the age of 18 years, are incapable of self-support by reason of an infirmity which arose before they attained the normal age limit for pension purposes are increased to £104 a year in the case of children of officers and to 40s. a week in the case of children of ratings. (Articles 5, 8, 13, 25 (b) and 26).

6.-(1) The rates of pensions for 100 per cent. disablement are increased by £34 a year in the case of officers and nurses and by 12s. 6d:-a week in the case of ratings with proportionate increases for lower degrees of disablement. (Articles 6, 9, 11, 14 and 24). (2) The maximum rates of the "Addition to Service Retired Pay' payable to certain disabled officers and nurses are increased from  $\pm 176$  a year in the case of officers and  $\pm 151$  a year in the case of nurses to  $\pm 210$  a year and  $\pm 185$  a year respectively. (Articles 9, 11 and 14).

7. The allowance for unemployable pensioners is increased from  $\pm 91$  a year in the case of officers and 35s, a week in the case of ratings to  $\pm 117$  a year and 45s, a week respectively. (Article 16).

8. (1) The additional allowance payable in respect of the wife or adult dependant of an unemployable pensioner and of a pensioner receiving approved treatment is increased trom a total of  $\pm 56$  a year in the case of officers and a total of 21s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings to totals of  $\pm 65$  a year and 25s. a week respectively. (Articles 17, 19 and 21).

(2) The allowance for the first or only child of a rating who has been awarded a special allowance either on the grounds of unemployability or because, during a course of approved treatment, he is not entitled to sickness benefit under National Insurance provisions, is increased from 10s. 6d. a week to 11s. 6d. a week. (Articles 17 and 21).

9. The maximum allowance for lowered standard of occupation is increased from 20s. a week to 27s. 6d. a week. (Article 18).

10. The maximum of the additional personal treatment allowance payable to the pensioner who is not entitled to sickness benefit under National Insurance provisions is increased from 32s. 6d. a week to 40s, a week. (Articles 19 and 21).

11. The allowances for wear and tear of clothing are increased from  $\pounds 5$  and  $\pounds 8$  a year to  $\pounds 6$  and  $\pounds 10$  a year respectively. (Article 23).

12. Provision is made to enable officers' and ratings widows who are under 40 years of age and not incapacitated —and who, hitherto, have ceased to be entitled to higher scale pensions because their only or youngest child has attained the age limit for the payment of allowances—to retain their higher scale pensions. 2. In Article 16 (which provides for the award of allow-ances for wear and tear of clothing) for the figure  $\pounds 5$  there shall be substituted the figure  $\pounds 6$  and for the figure  $\pounds 8$ , whereever the same appears, the figures £10.

3. In Article 17 (2), as amended (Order of 31st May, 1951), (which provides for the supplementation of retired pay or pension for unemployable pensioners) for the figures  $\pm$ 91 and 35s, there shall be substituted the figures  $\pm$ 117 and 45s. respectively.

4. In Article 17 (3) (c), as amended (Order of 18th July, 1952), (which provides for the award of an additional allow-ance for a wife, husband or unmarried dependent living as a wife of an unemployable pensioner) for the figures  $\pounds 20$  and 11s. 6d. there shall be substituted the figures  $\pounds 29$  and 15s. respectively.

In Article 20 (5), as amended (Order of 18th July, 1952), (which provides for the award of an additional allowance for an adult dependant of a member of the naval forces receiving approved treatment) for the figures  $\pounds 56$ , 21s. 6d. and  $\pounds 86$  there shall be substituted the figures  $\pounds 65$ , 25s. and  $\pounds 95$ £95 respectively.

11. Paragraph (2) (a) of Article 26 (which provides for the award of a pension to a widow of an officer or rating) shall be deleted and there shall be substituted the following paragraph:-

"(a) at whichever of the rates specified in column (2) in Table 1 or column (2) in Table 2 in the Fourth Schedule is appropriate in her case

(i) where she has attained the age of 40 years; or

(ii) where she is in receipt of an allowance awarded in respect of a child of the officer or rating under Article

132, 34 or 36; or (iii) where she was in receipt of an allowance awar-ded in respect of a child of the officer or rating under Article 32 of whom she is the mother—or was being treated under Article 2 (5) (b) as if she were in receipt of such an allowance for such a child—until the date, in either case, upon which the child attained the age of 16 years, or where in the opinion of the Minister in any other case she should be so treated; or other case, she should be so treated; or

(iv) where the child in respect of whom she was awar-ded an allowance under Article 32 or 36 dies before at-taining the age of 16 years, for a period of thirteen weeks beginning with the date of the child's death; or

) where she is incapable of self-support:

12. In Article 29 (3), as amended (Order of 29th April, 1952), (which provides for the award of pensions for unmarried dependants living as wives) for the figures £113 and 34s. 6d. there shall be substituted the figures £141 and 45s. respectively.

(b) in paragraph (5), as amended (Order of 18th July, 1952), for the figures £64, £49, £56, 15s. and 21s. 6d. there shall be substituted the figures £86 10s., £62, £78 10s., 20s. and 30s. respectively.

15. In Article 33, as amended (Order of 18th July, 1952) (which provides for the award of pensions to motherless of fatherless children under the age limit) for the figures £64, £49, £56, 15s. and 21s. 6d. there shall be substituted the figures £86 10s., £62, £78 10s., 20s. and 30s. respectively.

16. In Article 34 (3), as amended (Order of 18th July, 1952) (which provides for awards to or in respect of certain children who have attained the age of 18 years and are incapable of self-support) for the figures £84 10s. and 32s. 6d, there shall be substituted the figures £104 and 40s. respectively.

17. In subparagraph (a) of Article 40 (3), as amended (Order of 29th April, 1952) (which prescribes the amounts of "disablement addition on a pension basis") for the figures  $\pounds 126$  and  $\pounds 151$  there shall be substituted the figures  $\pounds 210$  and £185 respectively.

18. For the Tables in the Second Schedule, as amended (Order of 29th April, 1952) (which set out the amounts of the yearly rates of retired pay for disabled officers and the weekly rates of pensions for disabled ratings) there shall be substituted the Tables set out in the First Schedule to this Order Order.

21.—(1) Subject to the following provisions of this Article, this Order shall come into operation in relation to an officer on the 1st February, 1955, and in relation to a rating on the 31st January, 1955, so, however, that in relation to any award payable weekly, the said reference to the 31st January, 1955, where this not the normal weekly pay day for that award, shall be construed as a reference to the first normal weekly pay day for that award following the 31st January, 1955.

(2) Articles 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 and 10 of this Order shall come into operation in relation to an officer on the 1st June, 1955, and in relation to a rating on the 18th May, 1955.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTE**

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

1. This Order amends the Order of the 29th September, 1949, as amended by subsequent Orders.

2. The normal maximum rate of the allowances payable for constant attendance is increased from 25s. a week to 30s. a week in the case of ratings and the maxima, for exceptional cases of very severe disablement, from  $\pm 130$  a year to  $\pm 156$  a year in the case of officers and from 50s. a week to 60s. a week in the case of ratings. (Article 1.)

3. The allowances for wear and tear of clothing are increased from  $\pounds 5$  and  $\pounds 8$  a year to  $\pounds 6$  and  $\pounds 10$  a year respectively. (Article 2.)

4. The allowance for unemployable pensioners is increased from  $\pounds$  a year in the case of officers and 35s. a week in the case of ratings to  $\pounds$  117 a year and 45s. a week respectively. (Article 3.)

5.--(1) The additional allowance payable in respect of the wife or adult dependant of an unemployable pensioner and of a pensioner receiving approved treatment is increased from totals of  $\pm 56$  a year in the case of officers and  $\pm 215$ . A week in the case of ratings to totals of  $\pm 65$  a year and  $\pm 55$ , a week respectively. (Articles 4, 5, 9 and 10.)

(2) The allowance for the first or only child of a rating pensioner who has been awarded a special allowance either on the grounds of unemployability or because, during a course of approved treatment, he is not entitled to sickness benefit under National Insurance provisions is increased from 10s. 6d. a week to 11s. 6d. a week. (Articles 6 and 9.)

6. The maximum allowance for lowered standard of occupation is increased from 20s. a week to 27s. 6d. a week. (Article 7.)

7. The maximum of the additional personal treatment allowance payable to a pensioner who is not entitled to full sickness benefit under National Insurance provisions is increased from 32s. 6d. a week to 40s. a week. (Article 8.)

8. Provision is made to enable officers' and ratings' widows who are under 40 years of age and not incapacitated—and who, hitherto, have ceased to be entitled to higher scale pen-sions because their only or youngest child has attained the age limit for the payment of allowances—to retain their higher scale pensions. (Article 11.)

9. The pensions payable to unmarried dependants who have lived as wives of deceased members of the naval forces are increased from £113 a year in officer cases and 34s. 6d. a week in rating cases to £141 a year and 45s. a week respectively. Article 12.)

10. The allowances payable to widows in respect of child-ren are increased from £36 a year to £50 10s. a year in the case of officers (other than Commisioned Officers (Branch List)), and from 11s. a week to 16s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings. (Article 14 (a).)

11. The rates of pensions or allowances payable to or in respect of the children of deceased members of the naval respect of the children of deceased members of the naval forces (such children having become motherless or having ceased to be under the control of their mother) are increased from £64 a year to £86 10s. a year in the case of children of officers (other than Commissioned Officers (Branch List)), from £49 or £56 a year to £62 or £78 10s. a year (according to the age of the child) in the case of children of Commis-sioned Officers (Branch List) and from 15s, or 21s. 6d. a week to 20s. or 30s. a week (according to the age of the child) in the case of children of ratings. (Articles 14 (b) and 15) 15.)

12. The rates of pensions payable to motherless children who, having attained the age of 18 years, are incapable of self-support by reason of an infimity which arose before they attained the normal age limit for pension purposes, are increased from  $\pm 84$  10s. a year to  $\pm 104$  a year in the case of children of officers and from 32s. 6d. a week to 40s. a week in the case of children of ratings. (Article 16.)

13. The maximum rates of "disablement addition on a pension basis" payable to certain officers in receipt of service retired pay are increased from  $\pm 176$  a year in the case of male officers and  $\pm 151$  a year in the case of women officers to  $\pm 210$  a year and  $\pm 185$  a year respectively. (Article 17.)

14. Articles 18, 19 and 20 substitute new Tables for those contained in the Second, Third and Fourth Schedules to the Order and have the general effect of providing-

(a) for increasing the rates of pensions in respect of 100 per cent. disablement by £34 a year in the case of officers and by 12s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings and for the rates of pensions for lower degrees of disablement to be increased proportionately;

(b) for increasing awards for cases of minor injuries and other cases of less than 20 per cent. disablement;

(c) for increasing the rates of pensions for certain widows by  $\pounds 28$  a year in the case of officers and by 10s. 6d. a week in the case of ratings.

## OUTBREAKS OF NOTIFIABLE DISEASES WHICH WERE CONFIRMED BY THE MINISTRY OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES DURING THE PERIOD 16th to 31st DECEMBER 1954
