IENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

- 1. Notification will be sent by post on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose Tenders are accepted in whole or in part, and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday, 11.30 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.
- 7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING RECRUITMENT TO THE CLERICAL CLASSES (GENERAL AND DEPARTMENTAL) OF THE HOME CIVIL SERVICE THROUGH THE GENERAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION.

1. Age.

Candidates must be at least 16 years of age on the date on which their application form is posted to the Commission, and under 18 years of age on 1st March 1955.

2. Sex.

Both boys and girls are eligible.

3. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

- (a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either
- (i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a
- British subject; or
 (ii) have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.
- (b) If naturalised British subjects, they must have resided in Her Majesty's dominions and or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appoint-
- (c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an execution may properly be made in their favour.

4. Education.

(i) Candidates must, by the date on which they submit their application forms, have passed in one and the same examination for the General Certificate of Education, at the Ordinary level in English Language and at Ordinary (or Advanced) level in four of the following optional subjects:

(1) English Literature;

- (2) one or two of: Mathematics; Pure Mathematics; Applied Mathematics; Pure and Applied Mathematics: Elementary, Additional, Higher, Further, or General Mathematics;

- (5) one of: History, Modern History, British History, British Empire History, British and European History Foreign History, Medieval and Modern History;

- (it) Candidates educated in Scotland should normall have passed the examination for the Scottish Leaving Certifihave passed the examination for the Scottish Leaving Certificate on either the lower or the higher grade in English and at least four other subjects; at least four subjects must be in the following groups but not more than two in any group (a) Mathematics, (b) Science, (c) Modern and Classica Languages, (d) History, (e) Geography. A pass on the higher grade in English or Science will be accepted as the equivalent of a pass in two subjects if the Scottish Education Department certifies that the appropriate standard was reached in both subjects. Passes must have been obtained in all the five subjects required at the same examination Scottish candidates who do not hold the Scottish Leaving Certificate with the requisite number of passes may, in appropriate circumstances, offer instead a Certificate of equivalent qualification based on their results in the Scotappropriate circumstances, oner instead a Certificate of equivalent qualification based on their results in the Scottish Leaving Certificate examination. - 1. (i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations but the number of vacancies available for women is restricted.
- (ii) Married women who have formerly been established evil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than this evalus and have drawn marriage gratury (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose esignation took effect before 15th October 1946, or who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid. Provided that this undertaking will not be required if the break between the first period of service finduling any period of unestablished service immediately following the period in respect of which the gratuity was paid) and the date of re-establishment is more than seven vears.

- (d) have obtained passes in the Seni r Ce tificate Examination of the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland in 1952 or after in the subjects prescribed under (b) above; or produce a statement from the Ministry that they have attained an equivalent standa d;

(e) have passed

- (i) the Forces Prelimin ry Fx min tion, or (ii) the Royal Air Force Higher Education Fest. Part L or
- (iii) the Admiralty Highe Educational Test, Second Cliss, with a pass in all cases in an Arts sub ect for the Victoria and Albert Museum; in mithematics or a science subject for the Sience M seum, in a modern to eign language for the Science I ibrary

(f) have passed an examination accepted by the Commissioners as of an academic standard at least as high as those named above.

I xceptionally, the above requirements may be waived for candidates with experience of special value to the Museum.

For the Victoria and Albert Museum some knowledge of art is desirable and a knowledge of a foreign language would be an advantage.

5. Lyperience.

Candidates for appointment direct to the established grade must have had at least two years' comparable experience before the 1st June 1955.

6. Competition.

Those candidates who appear from their application forms to have the best qualifications will be summoned to appear before a Selection Board in London which will recommend to the Commissioners for appointment, in an established or an unestablished capacity, the candidates who appear to be most suitable. The Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of education and experience, any recom mendation that they may receive from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the pe sonal qualities of the candidates as shown at the inte view; and on their estimation of the above evidence they will 1 ame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

7. Health and Character

8. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

9. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of the candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

In accordance with Paragraph 5 of the First Schedule to the Act. any person who duly makes an objection may at the time of making it, or thereafter, send to the Secretary of State a request in writing to be served with notice of the making of the Order specifying an address for service.

If any objection is duly made to the proposed Order and is not withdrawn, the Secretary of State must, before making the Order, cause a public local inquiry to be held with respect thereto, and must consider the report of the person by whom the inquiry was held.

PESTS ACT, 1954

THE RABBIT CLEARANCE (SCOTLAND) (No. 8) ORDER, 1955

THE Secretary of State for Scotland in exercise of the powers conferred on him by subsections (1) and (14) of Section 1 of the Pests Act. 1954 (a), and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, and, as required by subsection (11) of the said Section of the said Act, after consultation with such persons as appear to be representative of the interests in the area to which this Order relates of farmers, owners of agricultural land and workers employed in agriculture and of the forestry interests in the said area, and after giving notice of the proposal to make this Order, hereby makes the following Order:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Rabbit Clearance (Scotland) (No. 8) Order, 1955, and shall come into operation on the twenty-fifth day of July 1955.
- 2. The area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby designated as a rabbit clearance area.
- 3. Occupiers of land in the said area shall take such steps as may from time to time be necessary for the killing or taking of wild rabbits living on or resorting to the land and where it is not reasonably practicable to destroy the wild

buts living on any part of the land, for the prevention fdamage by those rabbits.

4 In construing the said Schedule no account shall be taken of any alteration in the boundaries of the county or pansh therein referred to taking effect on or after the date 15 Order comes into operation.
