At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 8th day of October, 1957.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 30th day of September, 1957 (N.P. 4097/57) in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of service in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, or to the widow or any relative of a deceased Officer, Seaman or Marine, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Orders in Council dated 2nd February, 1937, 9th May, 1940, 17th September, 1942, 22nd July, 1943, and 29th November, 1946, certain improvements were made in the rates of disability retired pay, pensions and allowances payable to or in respect of Officers, Petty Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and Men of Your Majesty's Naval, Marine and Reserve Forces:

"And whereas, with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury, payments have been made to pensioners in receipt of disability pensions from the Admiralty, or to the dependants of Naval Officers or ratings, at the same rates, and subject to the same conditions as have been authorised for similar pensioners receiving pensions from the Ministry of Pensions and National Insurance:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the said improvements in the conditions and rates of disability retired pay, pensions and allowances as set out in the annexed Schedules A. B. C and D with effect from the various dates stated therein.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

"SCHEDULE A.

"RATINGS' DISABLEMENT PENSIONS AND ALLOWANCES.

. Increased rate of disability additions for R.N. ratings and R.M. other ranks.

For the rate of 32s. 6d. (100% disablement addition) a week appearing in Order in Council of 6th February, 1922,

Schedule I, Disablement Clause (a), as amended by Orders in Council of 17th September 1942; 22nd July, 1943, and 29th November, 1946, the following rates to be substi-

(A) from 7th May, 1952, for pensioners paid weekly, and from 1st May, 1952, in other cases:—

55s. 0d. a week.

(B) from 2nd February, 1955, for pensioners paid weekly, and from 1st February, 1955, in other cases:

67s. 6d. a week.

"2. Family Allowances.

As from 1st January, 1947, the following sub-clauses (a) and (b) to be substituted for sub-clauses (a) (b) (c) (d) and (e) of Clause 2 of Schedule A of Order in Council of 9th May, 1940, as amended by Orders in Council of 17th September, 1942; 22nd July, 1943; and 29th November, 1946:—
'(a) For a wife, if she is living apart from her husband, family element shall not be allowable in respect of her, unless—

unless

- (i) she was being regularly maintained in whole or in part by the seaman or marine up to the date of any award or renewal of his disablement pension, and/or
- (ii) she is entitled to support under a separation or maintenance order, or
- (iii) the separation was caused by the husband's mental instability due to the disability in respect of which he is granted his disablement pension.
- (b) For a step-child or legally adopted child the child shall have been regularly maintained in whole or in part by the seaman or marine up to the date of any award or renewal of his disablement pension.'

Sub-clause (f) of Clause 2 to be amended to be subclause (c).

Allowances for Unemployable Pensioners.

(A) As from 18th August, 1948, the following Clause to be substituted for Clause 6 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:

'6. Allowances for Unemployable Pensioners.

Where a Seaman or Marine is receiving a pension in respect of a disablement so serious as to make him unemployable he may be granted:

- (a) An allowance by way of supplement at the rate of 30s. a week, provided that:—
 - (i) due account is taken of any Sickness or Un-employment Benefit or Retirement Pension for which the pensioner may be eligible under the National Insurance Acts:

- (ii) any earnings of less than £52 a year may be disregarded.
- (b) An increase, where necessary, in the rate of family allowance in respect of wife and children awarded under Clause 4 (ii) of this Schedule which would be appropriate under that Clause if the degree of disablement were 100.
- (c) The rate of wife's allowance may be increased up to a maximum of 16s. a week when the wife is wholly or mainly dependent on her husband.
- (d) Where no allowance is payable for a wife an allowance may be awarded in respect of an adult dependant at the rate of 16s. a week if the Admiralty thinks fit, having regard to the financial circumstances of the person in respect of whom the allowance is claimed. Provided that one allowance only may be awarded under this sub-clause.
- (e) An allowance may be awarded in respect of any child, not being an eligible member of the family, who should, in the opinion of the Admiralty be treated as such having regard to the child's relationship to, or connection with, the pensioner and other circumstances of the case. Provided that any such allowance shall be at the rate and subject to the conditions which would be appropriate under Clause 4 (ii) of this Schedule if the child were an eligible member of the family and the degree of disablement of the pensioner were 100%.
- (B) As from 6th June, 1951, for pensioners paid weekly and from 1st June, 1951, in other cases:—
 - (a) the rate of the allowance shown in sub-clause (a) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 35s. a week;
 - (b) the following additional sub-clause to be added to Clause 6 above:—
 - '(f) when the allowance granted for the first child is 7s. 6d. a week a further allowance of 2s. 6d. a week may be awarded in respect of that child.'

(C) As from 23rd July, 1952:-

- (a) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (c) of Clause 6 above to be increased to $21s.\ 6d.\ a$ week;
- (b) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (d) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 21s. 6d. a week;
- (c) the rate of allowance of 2s. 6d. a week shown in sub-clause (f) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 3s. a week.
- (D) As from 2nd February, 1955, for pensioners paid weekly, and from 1st February, 1955, in other cases, the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (a) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 45s. a week.

(E) As from the 18th May, 1955:—

- (a) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (c) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 25s. a week;
- (b) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (d) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 25s, a week;
- (c) the rate of allowance of 3s. a week shown in subclause (f) of Clause 6 above to be increased to 4s. a week.

"4. Constant Attendance Allowance.

- (A) As from 23rd July, 1952, the rates of allowance shown in Clauses 7 (i) and 7 (ii) of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946, to be increased to 25s. and 50s. a week respectively.
- (B) As from 2nd February, 1955, for pensioners paid weekly and from 1st February, 1955, in other cases, the rates of allowance shown in Clauses 7 (i) and 7 (ii) of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946, to be increased to 30s. and 60s. a week respectively.

"5. Education Allowance.

As from 1st April, 1948, the following sub-clause to be substituted for sub-clause (i) (c) of Clause 8 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

'(c) the Admiralty is satisfied that the type of education which the child is receiving, or is to receive, is suitable for the child.'

"6. Treatment Allowances.

(A) As from 1st September, 1949, the following Clause is to be substituted for Clause 9 of Schedule A of Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

9. Treatment Allowance

- A Seaman or Marine who is receiving a pension in respect of attributable disablement may, in lieu of any awards under Clauses 1, 4, 6, and 7 of this Schedule be granted in respect of any period during which he receives authorised or approved in-patient treatment, a treatment allowance consisting of a personal allowance in respect of himself and an additional allowance in respect of his wife and children: subject to the following provisions:—
 - (a) a personal allowance will be at the rate of pension which would be appropriate if the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.
 - (b) an additional allowance in respect of a wife and or children, subject to the conditions which would be appropriate if the wife and/or children were eligible for family additions and the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.;
 - (c) the allowance under sub-clause (b) in respect of a wite may be increased to the rate of 16s. a week where she is wholly or mainly dependent on her husband;
 - (d) where no allowance is payable for a wife an allowance not exceeding 16s. a week may be paid for an adult dependent if the Admiralty thinks fit, having regard to the financial circumstances of that person. Provided that one allowance only may be awarded under this sub-clause;
 - (e) the allowance under sub-clause (a) may be increased by whichever of the following amounts is appropriate:—
 - (i) if the pensioner is not eligible for injury benefit, sickness benefit, retirement pension or contributory old age pension under the National Insurance Acts, or under any legislation, in Northern Ireland corresponding to that legislation, or under the law of any place outside the United Kingdom which in the opinion of the Admiralty is analogous to that legislation; 26s. a week;
 - (ii) if he is eligible for such benefit at a lower rate than 26s. a week the amount of the difference between that lower rate and 26s. a week.

Provided that this sub-clause shall not apply to a pensioner who is receiving an Unemployable Allowance under Clause 6 or who is receiving approved institutional treatment and who is not entitled to an allowance under sub-clauses (b) (c) and (d) of this Clause.'

- (B) As from 6th June, 1951, the following additional subclause to be added to Clause 9 above:—
 - '(f) where the allowance granted for the first child is 7s. 6d. a week a further allowance of 2s. 6d. may be awarded in respect of that child.'

(C) As from 23rd July, 1952:-

- (a) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (c) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 21s. 6d. a week;
- (b) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (d) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 21s. 6d. a week;
- (c) the rates of 26s. a week as shown in sub-clauses (e) (i) and (ii) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 32s. 6d. a week in each case.
- (d) the further allowance of 2s. 6d. in sub-clause (f) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 3s. a week.

(D) As from 18th May, 1955:--

- (a) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (c) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 25s. a week;
- (b) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (d) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 25s. a week;
- (c) the rates of 32s. 6d. a week as shown in sub-clause (e) (i) and (ii) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 40s. a week in each case;
- (d) the further allowance of 3s. a week in sub-clause (f) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 4s. a week.
- (E) As from 6th February, 1957, for pensioners paid weekly and from the 1st February, 1957, in other cases the following additional sub-clause to be added to Clause 9 above:—
 - '(g) where the pensioner has attained the age of 65 years he may be awarded an increase of the allowance under sub-clause (a) above at a rate equal to the allowance which he would be receiving under Clause 12 or at such higher rate as the Admiralty may determine having regard to the circumstances of the case. Provided that the rate of any increase under this sub-clause shall not exceed 15a a week.'

*7. Allowances for Wear and Tear of Clothing

(A) As from 1st February, 1947, the following Clause to be substituted for Clause 10 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946.

'10. Allowances for Wear and Tear of Clothing.

Where a Seaman or Marine who is receiving a disablement element of pension in respect of an amputation regularly wears an artificial limb, he may be granted an allowance in respect of wear and tear of clothing at whichever of the following rates is applicable:

- (a) where he wears a single artificial limb (other than a tilting table limb), £3 a year;
- (b) where he wears a tilting table limb or more than one artificial limb, £5 a year;
- (c) in any other case when the Admiralty may consider that as a result of the pensioned disablement, there is exceptional wear and tear of the pensioner's clothing, an allowance not exceeding £5 a year.'
- (B) As from 1st February, 1948, the rates of allowances shown in Clause 10 above to be increased to the following amounts:—

Sub-Clause (a)	 	 £5 a year
Sub-Clause (b)	 	 £8 a year
Sub-Clause (c)	 	 £8 a vear

(C) As from 1st February, 1955, the rates of allowances shown in Clause 10 above to be increased to the following amounts:—

Sub-Clause (a)	 	 £6 a year
Sub-Clause (b)	 	 £10 a year
Sub-Clause (c)		f10 a vear

- "8. Allowance for Lowered Standard of Occupation.
- (A) As from 1st May, 1948, the following additional Clause to be inserted

After Clause 10 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946, the following additional Clause to be inserted:—

'11. Allowance for Lowered Standard of Occupation

- (a) Where a seaman or marine receiving a disablement element of pension in respect of disablement of less than 100 per cent, has been, by reason of his disability, compelled after 1st July, 1945, to adopt an occupation not equivalent to that regularly followed by him for a reasonable period before that date, he may be granted a special allowance at a rate not exceeding 20s. a week, provided the pension together with the allowance does not exceed the rate of pension which would have been appropriate if the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.
- (b) No award of Lowered Standard of Occupation Allowance shall be made where the pensioner is receiving an Unemployable Allowance under Clause 6.
- (B) As from 2nd February, 1955, for pensioners paid weekly, and from 1st February, 1955, in other cases, the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (a) of Clause 11 above to be increased to 27s. 6d. a week.
- "9. Allowances where prolonged abstention from work is necessary following approved institutional treatment

As from 1st September, 1949, the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause II of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

12. Allowances where prolonged abstention from work is necessary following approved institutional treatment

- (a) Where a Naval rating or Royal Marine is receiving disablement element of pension and it is certified that he should on completion of a course of approved institutional treatment abstain from work for a prolonged period in consequence of the condition which necessitated that treatment, he may be treated as if he were eligible throughout that period for a Treatment Allowance under Clause 9 of this Schedule.
- (b) This Clause shall not apply to a pensioner who is receiving an Unemployable Allowance.'

"10. Allowances for part-time treatment

(A) As from the 1st November, 1949, the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause 12 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

"13. Allowances for part-time treatment

Where a Naval rating or Royal Marine receives treatment which would be approved treatment but for the fact that it involves only occasional interruptions of his normal employment, a treatment allowance may be awarded to him at such rate, not exceeding 25s. in respect of any one day (subject to a maximum payment of 35s. in respect of any one week) as the Admiralty may consider appropriate, having regard to any loss of remunerative time by the pensioner as the result of those interruptions. Provided that the rate of any allowance awarded to a pensioner under this Clause in respect of any period of a week or less shall not exceed the amount by which the weekly value of the pensioner's existing award falls short of the weekly value of any award which would have been appropriate in the case of that pensioner under Clause 9 if he had been eligible for an award under that Clause.'

(B) As from 1st May, 1953, the rates of 25s, and 35s, shown in Clause 13 above to be amended to read 30s, and 40s, respectively.

"11. Allowances for comforts

(A) As from 6th June, 1951, for pensioners paid weekly, and from 1st June, 1951, in other cases, the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause 13 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:

'14. Allowances for Comforts

Where a Naval rating or Royal Marine is in receipt of a disablement element of pension the degree of which is 100 per cent., and is in receipt of an Unemployable Allowance under Clause 6 above and also is in receipt, or would be in receipt if he were not in a hospital or institution, of a Constant Attendance Allowance under Clause 7 above, he may be awarded an allowance for the provision of comtorts at the rate of 10s. a week.'

(B) As from 6th February, 1957, for pensioners paid weekly and from 1st February, 1957, in other cases, substitute for Clause 14 above the following Clause:

'14. Allowances for Comforts

- (a) Where a Naval rating or Royal Marine is in receipt of a disablement element of pension he may be awarded an allowance for the provision of comforts:
 - (i) at the rate of 20s. a week where the member, the degree of whose pensioned disablement is 100 per cent., is in receipt of an Unemployable Allowance under Clause 6 above and is also in receipt of a Constant Attendance Allowance under Clause 7 above;
 - (ii) at the rate of 10s. a week if he does not qualify for an award under sub-clause (a) of this Clause but is in receipt of an allowance under Clause 6 or under Clause 7.
- (b) For the purposes of this Clause, a pensioner who would be in receipt of an allowance under Clause 7 if he were not in a hospital or other institution shall be deemed to be in receipt of an allowance under that Clause.'

"12. Age Allowances.

As from the 6th February, 1957, for pensioners paid weekly and from 1st February, 1957, in other cases the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause 14 of Schedule A to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

'15. Age Allowances.

Where a Naval rating or Royal Marine, who is in receipt of disablement element of pension the degree of which is 40 per cent. or over, has attained the age of 65 years he may be awarded an allowance in accordance with the following Table:—

"4. Rent Allowance.

- (A) As from 7th June, 1951, the amount of 8s. 0d. shown in Clause 5 (i) of Schedule B to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946, to be 6s. 0d.
- (B) As from 9th August, 1956, the maximum rate of rent allowance shown in Clause 5 (v) of Schedule B to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946, to be increased from 15s. 0d. a week to 20s. 0d. a week.

As from 1st February, 1948, the conditions governing a grant of family allowance in respect of a legally adopted child or step-child laid down in Clause 2 of Schedule A to this Order, shall also be applicable to the legally adopted children or step-children of a disabled officer.

[&]quot;7. Allowances for Unemployable Officers.

(A) As from 18th August, 1948, the following Clause to be substituted for Clause 3 of Schedule C to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

Allowances for Unemployable Officers.

Where an officer is receiving disability retired pay in respect of a disablement so serious as to make him unemployable he may be granted

an allowance by way of supplement at the rate

of £78 a year provided that:-

- (i) due account is taken of any Sickness or Unemployment Benefit or Retirement Pension for which the officer may be eligible under the National Insurance Acts;
- (ii) any earnings of less than £52 a year may be disregarded;
- (b) an increase, where necessary, in the rate of family allowance in respect of wife and children awarded under Clause 2 of this Schedule which would be appropriate under that Clause if the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.;
- (c) the rate of wife's allowance may be increased up to a maximum of £42 a year when the wife is wholly or mainly dependent on her husband;
- (d) where no allowance is payable for a wife an allowance may be awarded in respect of an adult dependent at a rate of £42 a year if the Admiralty thinks fit, having regard to the financial circumstances of the person in respect of whom the allowance is claimed. Provided that one allowance only may be awarded under this sub-clause;
- awarded under this sub-clause;

 (e) an allowance may be awarded in respect of any child, not being an eligible member of the family, who should, in the opinion of the Admiralty be treated as such having regard to the child's relationship to, or connection with, the officer and other circumstances of the case. Provided that any such allowance shall be at the rate and subject to the conditions which would be appropriate under Clause 2 of this Schedule if the child were an eligible member of the family and the degree of disablement of the pensioner were 100 per cent.' 100 per cent.'

(A) As from 1st September, 1949, the following Clause is to be inserted after Clause 6 of Schedule C of Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

'7. Treatment Allowances,

An officer who is receiving a pension in respect of attributable disablement may, in lieu of any awards under Clauses 1, 2, 3 and 4 of this Schedule be granted in respect of any period during which he receives authorised or approved in-patient treatment, a treatment allowance consisting of a personal allowance in respect of himself and an additional allowance in respect of his wife nd children; subject to the following provisions:—

- (a) a personal allowance will be at a rate of pension which would be appropriate if the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.
- (b) an additional allowance in respect of a wife and/or children subject to the conditions which would be appropriate if the wife and/or children were eligible for family additions and the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.;
- (c) the allowance under sub-clause (b) in respect of a wife may be increased to the rate of £42 a year where she is wholly or mainly dependent on her husband;
- (d) where no allowance is payable for a wife an allowance not exceeding £42 a year may be paid for an adult dependant if the Admiralty thinks fit having regard to the financial circumstances of that person. Provided that one allowance only may be awarded under this sub-clause;
- (e) the allowance under sub-clause (a) may be increased by whichever of the following amounts is appropriate:
 - (i) if the officer is not eligible for injury benefit, sickness benefit, retirement pension or contributory old age pension under the National Insurance Acts, or under any legislation in Northern Ireland corresponding to that legislation, or under the law of any place outside the United Kingdom which in the application of the Admiratty is engaging to that opinion of the Admiralty is analogous to that legislation; 26s. a week,
 - (ii) if he is eligible for such benefit at a lower rate than 26s, a week the amount of the difference between that lower rate and 26s, a week.

Provided that this sub-clause shall not apply to an officer who is receiving an Unemployable Allowance under Clause 3 or who is receiving approved institutional treatment and who is not entitled to an allowance under sub-clauses (b) (c) and (d) of this Clause.

- (B) As from 1st August, 1952:-
- (a) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (c) of Clause 7 above to be increased to £56 a year
- (b) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (d) of Clause 7 above to be increased to £56 a year
- (c) the rates of 26s. a week as shown in sub-clause (e) (i) and (ii) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 32s, 6d, a week in each case.
- (C) As f om 1st June, 1955
- (a) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (c) of Clause 7 above to be increased to £65 a year;
- (b) the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (d) of Clause 7 above to be increased to £65 a year;
- (c) the rates of 32s, 6d, a week as shown in sub-clause (e) (i) and (ii) of Clause 9 above to be increased to 40s. a week in each case.

- (D) As from the 1st February, 1957, the following additional sub-clause to be added to Clause 7 above.
 - '(f) where the officer has attained the age of 65 years he may be awarded an increase of the allowance under sub-clause (a) above at a rate equal to the allowance which he would be receiving under Clause 12 or at such higher rate as the Admiralty may determine having regard to the circumstances of the case. Provided that the rate of any increase under this sub-clause shall not exceed £39 a year.'
- "11. Allowance for Lowered Standard of Occupation.
- (A) As from 1st May, 1948, the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause 7 of Schedule C to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—
 - '8. Allowance for Lowered Standard of Occupation
 - (a) Where an officer receiving a disablement element of retired pay in respect of disablement of less than 100 per cent., has been, by reason of his disability, compelled after 1st July, 1945, to adopt an occupation not equivalent to that regularly followed by him for a reasonable period before that date, he may be granted a special allowance at a rate not exceeding 20s. a week, provided that disability retired pay together with the allowance does not exceed the rate of disability retired pay which would have been appropriate if the degree of disablement were 100 per cent.
 - (b) No award of Lowered Standard of Occupation Allowance shall be made where the officer is receiving an Unemployable Allowance under Clause 3.
- (B) As from 1st February, 1955, the rate of allowance shown in sub-clause (a) of Clause 8 above to be increased to 27s. 6d. a week.'
- "12. Allowances where prolonged abstention from work is necessary following approved institutional treatment

As from 1st September, 1949, the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause 8 of Schedule C to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—

- Allowances where prolonged abstention from work is necessary following approved institutional treatment
- (a) Where an officer is receiving disablement element of retired pay and it is certified that he should on completion of a course of approved institutional treatment abstain from work for a prolonged period in consequence of the condition which necessitated that treatment, he may be treated as if he were eligible throughout that period for a Treatment Allowance under Clause 7 of this Schedule.
- (b) This Clause shall not apply to an officer who is receiving an Unemployable Allowance.'
- "13. Allowances for part-time treatment.
- (A) As from the 1st November, 1949, the following additional Clause to be inserted after Clause 9 of Schedule C to Order in Council of 29th November, 1946:—
