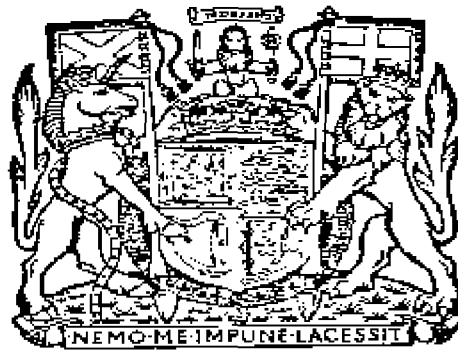

TRUNK ROADS ACT, 1946 SPECIAL ROADS ACT, 1949

THE Secretary of State gives notice that he proposes to make two Orders under section 1 of the Trunk Roads Act, 1946 as extended by section 14 of the Special Roads Act, 1949, and as read with the Transfer of Functions (Roads, Bridges and Ferries) Order, 1955, the effect of which will be:

(i) that a road which he proposes to construct bypassing Prestwick will become a trunk road when the first Order comes into operation and the lengths of the trunk roads to be superseded thereby will cease to be trunk roads on the sixteenth day of May next after the date on which notice is given by the Secretary of State to the Ayr County Council (who will thereafter become the highway authority responsible for those lengths) that the Prestwick Bypass is opened for through traffic and

(ii) that a road which he proposes to construct bypassing Ayr will become a trunk road when the second Order comes into operation and a length of the Maybole-Ayr Road (A.77) will become a trunk road on the sixteenth day of May next after the date on which notice is given by the Secretary of State to the Ayr County Council that the Ayr Bypass is opened for through traffic.

Copies of the draft Orders and the relative plans may be inspected free of charge at all reasonable hours from 18th April, 1958, to 21st July, 1958, at the offices of the Scottish Home Department, Bankhead Avenue, Sighthill, Edinburgh, 11, Ayr County Council, County Buildings, Ayr, Ayr Town Council, Town Buildings, Ayr, and Prestwick Town Council, Municipal Chambers, Prestwick.

Any person may within three months from 18th April, 1958, object to the making of the Orders by notice to the Secretary, Scottish Home Department, Bankhead Avenue, Sighthill, Edinburgh, 11, quoting reference 316/64/1 and stating the grounds of objection.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF ASSISTANT COMMISSIONERS IN THE NATIONAL SAVINGS COMMITTEE.

1. Both men and women may compete.
2. *Age.*
Candidates must be at least 21 years of age on 1st March, 1958.
There is no upper age limit, but in appointing persons in a permanent capacity Departments expect regular and effective service for a reasonable period, and the Commissioners will take this requirement into account.

3. *Nationality.*

To be eligible for appointment a candidate must be a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic and in addition satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) if he was a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth:—

(i) at least one of his parents must be, or have been at death, a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic, or

(ii) the candidate must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment;

(b) if he was not a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth, he must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment;

(c) if not qualified under sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph, he must satisfy the Commissioners that he is so closely connected with a country or territory within the Commonwealth either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his favour.

4. *Qualifications.*

Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they have received a systematic education and have had experience that fits them for the post. A University education and a knowledge of economics are desirable. Experience of public speaking, the control of office staff, and the organisation of voluntary workers will be advantages.

5. *Competition.*

Those candidates who appear from their application forms to have the best qualifications will be invited to interview before a Selection Board. The Board will take into account each candidate's record of experience and education, his personal qualities as shown at interview, and any reports from persons named by him as having had direct knowledge of his work, and will recommend to the Commissioners the candidates considered most suitable for appointment.

6. *Health and Character.*

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners on health and character.

7. *Candidates Trained as Teachers.*

Candidates who have been trained as teachers in Northern Ireland or in the Irish Republic, and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. *Refund of Marriage Gratuity.*

Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took effect before 15th October, 1946, or who are widowed or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid. Provided that this undertaking will not be required if the break between the first period of service (including any period of unestablished service immediately following the period in respect of which the gratuity was paid) and the date of re-establishment is more than seven years.

9. *Compassing.*

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons (except as referees to be named by them in their application form) will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work.

10. *Fee.*

A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £4 before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

11. The Commissioners' decision will be final in all matters concerning this competition.

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT TO THE EXECUTIVE CLASS (GENERAL AND DEPARTMENTAL) EXCLUSIVE CLASSES AND GRADE 5 POSIN IN BRANCH B OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE THROUGH THE GENERAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION, 1958.

1. The competition is open to men and women, but

(i) women will not ordinarily be appointed to posts in the Admiralty or War Office or to the Immigration Service of the Home Office;

(ii) married women are not eligible for appointment to Branch B of the Foreign Service, and the approval of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs is required before a married man can take up appointment in this Service.

2. *Age.*

Candidates must be at least 17½ and under 19 years of age on 1st September, 1958.

3. *Nationality.*

(1) To be eligible for appointment (other than to a situation in the Foreign Service) a candidate must be a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic and in addition satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) if he was a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth:—

(i) at least one of his parents must be, or have been at death, a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic, or

(ii) the candidate must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment;

(b) if he was not a British subject, a British protected person or a citizen of the Irish Republic at birth, he must have resided in a country or territory within the Commonwealth or in the Irish Republic or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown or partly have so resided and partly been so employed for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment;

(c) if not qualified under sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b) of this paragraph, he must satisfy the Commissioners that he is so closely connected with a country or territory within the Commonwealth either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his favour.

(2) A candidate will not be eligible for appointment to a situation in the Foreign Service unless at all times since his birth he has been either a British subject or a citizen of the Irish Republic and was born of parents each of whom is or was at death a British subject or a citizen of the Irish Republic and has or had been one or the other at all times since birth;

Provided that, notwithstanding that the aforesaid conditions are not satisfied, he may, by special permission of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, be admitted to appointment if—

(i) he has at all times since his birth been either a British subject or a citizen of the Irish Republic, and

(ii) his father is or was at death a British subject or a citizen of the Irish Republic and has or had been one or the other at all times from birth, and

(iii) he satisfies the Secretary of State that he is so closely connected with a country or territory within the Commonwealth either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his favour.

4. Education.

(i) Candidates (except those taking Scottish or Northern Ireland examinations) must have obtained, in not more than two examinations for the General Certificate of Education, passes in English Language and in four other distinct subjects accepted by the Commissioners, two of these must be at the Advanced level and obtained in the same examination. Candidates who wish to be considered for a Foreign Service post must have a pass at Advanced level in a language (Classical or modern) other than English.

(ii) Candidates taking Scottish examinations must have obtained, in not more than two examinations for the Scottish Leaving Certificate or Scottish Universities Preliminary Examination, passes in English on the higher grade and in four other subjects accepted by the Commissioners, including two on the higher grade. Candidates who wish to be considered for a Foreign Service post must have a pass on the higher grade in a language (classical or modern) other than English.

(iii) Candidates educated in Northern Ireland may offer appropriate passes obtained in not more than two examinations for the Grammar School Senior Certificate of the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland.

(iv) The subjects that will be accepted are those included under the following headings: English, classical and modern languages, history, politics, economics, geography, religious knowledge, mathematics, science, and engineering; the same subject may not be counted at both Ordinary and Advanced level.

(v) Certificates issued by examining bodies other than those mentioned below can in no circumstances be accepted.

5. Selection.

The Commissioners will invite to interview before a Selection Board those candidates who appear, on the basis of their academic records as amplified by confidential reports from their schools, to be best qualified.

In placing candidates in order of merit and deciding which of them are successful in the competition, the Board will be guided by the standard of each candidate's performance in examinations for the General Certificate of Education including Scholarship papers, where these have been taken, and by the Headmaster's or Headmistress's report. The candidate's standard of attainment in subjects other than those by which he qualifies under Regulation 4 will also be taken into account, and regard will be paid, where relevant, to the policy of his school on the taking of subjects in the General Certificate of Education examination. These factors will be considered in conjunction with the candidate's performance before the interview Board.

Of those successful candidates who have expressed a preference for the Foreign Service, the Commissioners will select a number of those highest in order of merit for a further competitive interview for appointment to a Foreign Service post. Candidates who, at this second interview, are not recommended for a Foreign Service post will remain successful for the Home Civil Service.

Even if there are unfilled vacancies, no candidate will be declared successful for either the Home Civil Service or the Foreign Service who does not reach a standard satisfactory to the Commissioners.

6. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners on health and character.

7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers in Northern Ireland or in the Irish Republic, and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

9. Fee.

A successful candidate must pay a fee of 15s. before the issue of a Certificate of Qualification for appointment.

10. Assignment.

The Commissioners will decide to which Service or Department each successful candidate is to be assigned.

The wishes expressed by successful candidates at interview, or on the preference form which they will be asked to fill up, will so far as possible be taken into account; but assignments must be made so as to fill the vacancies notified to the Commissioners in accordance with the needs of the public service. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, and will be regarded as having declined appointment.

11. The Commissioners' decision will be final in all matters concerning this competition.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competition will be held during 1958 under the above Regulations.

Applications on the prescribed form for admission to the Competition should be received by the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission on or before 12th September, 1958. Application forms may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
