**A PROCLAMATION**

*Appointing Monday, the Twentieth Day of November, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Seven, a Bank Holiday throughout the United Kingdom for the purposes of the Bank Holidays Act 1871.*

**ELIZABETH R.**

Whereas We consider it desirable that Monday, the twentieth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven, shall be kept as a close holiday in all banks in the United Kingdom and shall, as regards Bills of Exchange and promissory notes payable in the United Kingdom, be deemed to be a bank holiday for all the purposes of the Bank Holidays Act 1871:

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by section four of the said Act, We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, appoint the said twentieth day of November to be observed as a bank holiday throughout the United Kingdom.

And We do declare that this Proclamation does not have the effect of making the said day a holiday under, or for the purposes of, the Holidays Extension Act 1875.

Given at Our Court at Windsor Castle, this nineteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven and in the sixteenth year of Our Reign.
