WESTMINSTER—JULY 1, 1811.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named; to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act to permit the interchange of the British and Irish militias respectively.

An act to amend an act of the 47th year of his present Majesty, for more effectually preventing the stealing of deer.

And to two English acts.

JULY 2.

An act to suspend the payment of all drawbacks on spirits made or distilled in Great Britain or Ireland, and exported from either country to the other respectively, and to suspend the importation into Great Britain of any spirits made or distilled in Ireland, except such as shall have been warehoused according to law; and for regulating the exportation of home-made spirits from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain, until three months after the commencement of the next session of Parliament.

An act further to extend and render more effectual certain provisions of an act passed in the 12th year of the reign of his late Majesty King George I, entitled, "An act to prevent frivolous and vexatious arrests;" and of an act passed in the 5th year of the reign of his Majesty King George II, to explain, amend, and render more effectual, the said former act; and of two acts passed in the 19th and 43d years of the reign of his present Majesty, extending the provisions of the said former acts.
