Humble Address to his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

WE, the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Berwick, assembled at our annual meeting on the 30th April 1812, humbly approach your Royal Highness with expressions of the sincerest condolence on the unexpected continuance of the indisposition with which it has pleased the Almighty to visit our beloved Sovereign; an event most afflicting to your Royal Highness, and to a loyal and grateful people.

Whilst, in common with our fellow-subjects, we deplore this heavy calamity, we beg to express to your Royal Highness the heartfelt satisfaction we derive from observing that your Royal Highness is disposed to adhere to the same principles of government which actuated our revered Sovereign, by steadily supporting the constitution both in church and state, as established at the revolution. We observe with pleasure, that your Royal Highness is resolved to continue your assistance to our allies, in the arduous and glorious contest in which they and we are engaged, in support of all that is dear to freedom.

We beg to congratulate your Royal Highness on the brilliant success of his Majesty's arms under your auspices. And to assure your Royal Highness of our earnest zeal, in the support of your Royal Highness's government; and of our utmost endeavour to do whatever may be in our power, in aid of the patriotic conduct which your Royal Highness has constantly evinced, since you have administered the government on the behalf of his Majesty.

That your Royal Highness may long enjoy health, happiness, and the satisfaction arising from the thanks of a grateful people, is our most earnest prayer.
