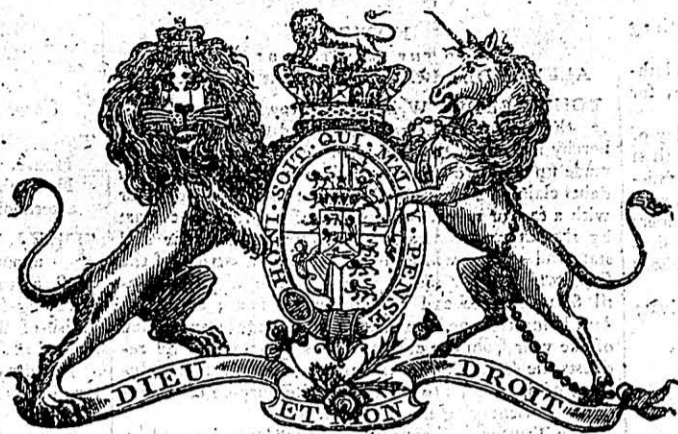

THE following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously.—

To his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, and Justices of the Peace of the County of Kincardine, beg leave humbly to approach your Royal Highness, with the assurances of our unalterable and zealous attachment to the crown and constitution of the British empire and to your Royal Highness's person.

Language is inadequate to express our feelings of detestation and abhorrence of the assassination of the Right Honourable Spencer Perceval, who exhibited an illustrious example of so many virtues, and who fell a victim to his sense of public duty as a Minister.

Amidst the horrors excited by this melancholy and lamented act of atrocity, we have one consolation that it proceeded from the hand of an isolated individual, the baseness of whose conduct rendered him unworthy of living under a free and enlightened government.

While we have the satisfaction with confidence to assure your Royal Highness of the loyalty, orderly conduct, and peaceable demeanour of all ranks of inhabitants in this county, we beg leave to express our earnest hopes that, under Divine Providence, and by the vigour and exertions of your Royal Highness's government, those persons who in some other parts of the kingdom, by unexampled depravity have committed acts of tumult and disorder, may be brought back to a due submission to the laws of the country, as the only means of securing the blessings of a free and happy constitution.

Permit us to convey to your Royal Highness the strongest assurances of our unshaken loyalty, our respect and attachment to your Royal Highness's person and government, and to add, that our duty as magistrates and subjects of the British empire, will at all times command every exertion

and sacrifice in our power, when required for the preservation of our invaluable constitution.

WESTMINSTER—JULY 9, 1812.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act for granting to his Majesty certain new and additional duties of assessed taxes, and for consolidating the same with the former duties of assessed taxes.

An act for granting to his Majesty certain additional rates of postage in Great Britain.

An act for granting to his Majesty additional duties of excise in Great Britain, on glass, hides, tobacco, and snuff.

An act for raising the sum of five millions by Exchequer bills, for the service of Great Britain for the year 1812.

An act for raising the sum of five hundred thousand pounds, by Treasury bills, for the service of Ireland for the year 1812.

An act for raising the sum of one million two hundred and sixteen thousand six hundred and sixty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence, Irish currency, by Treasury bills, for the service of Ireland for the year 1812.

An act to enable the Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury to issue Exchequer bills on the credit of such

aids or supplies as have been or shall be granted by Parliament for the service of Great Britain for the year 1812.

An act for charging an additional duty on copper imported into Great Britain, until the expiration of six calendar months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace.

An act to amend and regulate the assessment and collection of the assessed taxes, and of the rates and duties on profits arising from property, professions, trades, and offices, in that part of Great Britain called Scotland.

An act for applying the amount of the bounties on certain linens, exported from Great Britain, towards defraying the charge of the loan made and stock created in the present session of parliament.

An act for allowing certain articles to be imported into the Bahama islands, and exported therefrom, in foreign vessels, and for encouraging the exportation of salt from the said islands.

An act to permit the exportation of wares, goods, and merchandize from any of his Majesty's islands in the West Indies to any other of the said islands, and to and from any of the British colonies on the continent of America and the said islands and colonies.

An act to permit sugar, coffee, and cocoa to be exported from his Majesty's colonies or plantations to any port in Europe to the southward of Cape Fisterre, and corn to be imported from any such port, and from the coast of Africa, into the said colonies and plantations, under licenses granted by the collectors and controllers of the customs.

An act to provide a summary remedy in cases of abuses of trusts created for charitable purposes.

An act for the registering and securing of charitable donations.

An act for the more easy manning of vessels employed in the southern whale-fishery.

An act to render more effectual an act passed in the 37th year of his present Majesty, for preventing the administering or taking unlawful oaths.

An act to continue, amend, and extend the provisions of an act passed in the 48th year of his present Majesty, for enabling the Secretary at War to enforce returns from clerks of subdivisions and others, in relation to fines, bounties, and sums due under any acts relating to the defence of the realm, or militia, for the purpose of directing the distribution, and securing the due application thereof.

An act for increasing the duty on rum and other spirits imported into Newfoundland from the British colonies and plantations on the continent of America, and charging a duty on spirits imported into Newfoundland from his Majesty's colonies in the West Indies.

An act for extending the allowance of the duty on salt used in making oxigenated muriatic acid, for bleach-

ng linen, to salt used in making such acid for bleaching thread and cotton twist.

An act for defraying the charge of the pay and clothing of the militia and local militia in Great Britain, for the year 1812.

An act for further continuing, until the 1st day of August 1816, and from thence until the end of the then next session of parliament, the powers of the commissioners appointed in pursuance of an act of the 46th year of his present Majesty, for enabling the commissioners acting in pursuance of an agreement between the East India Company and the private creditors of the Nabobs of the Carnatic to carry the same into effect.
