THE following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously.—

To his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, his Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply, of the County of Stirling, with assurance of our unshaken loyalty and attachment to his Majesty's person and government, beg leave again to approach your Royal Highness.

While we sincerely sympathise with your Royal Highness, and deeply deplore the continued indisposition of our much-beloved and revered Sovereign, and most fervently unite with your Royal Highness in offering up our prayers to Almighty God for his Majesty's recovery, we would feel ourselves wanting in our duty, if we did not convey to your Royal Highness those sentiments of unfeigned attachment and gratitude which we feel towards your Royal Highness's person and government, and which are inseparable from the consideration of the manner in which your Royal Highness's has directed the councils and government of these realms ever since the much-lamented indisposition of our gracious Sovereign.

With feelings of the deepest regret, we most sincerely condole with your Royal Highness on the loss which the country lately sustained in the atrocious assassination of an able and upright Minister, and on the embarrassment and distress which that event must have occasioned to your Royal Highness; at the same time we beg leave to express to your Royal Highness, our high approbation of the wisdom of the measures which your Royal Highness adopted upon so arduous and trying an occasion.

We beg leave to offer our sincere congratulations to your Royal Highness on the continuance of those brilliant achievements of

his Majesty's arms, which have of late so often attracted the notice of Parliament, and called forth the approbation of the people; and to express our firm conviction, that by a perseverance in those exertions, and a steady adherence to those wise and vigorous measures, which have so eminently distinguished your Royal Highness's government, we may look forward to an honourable and glorious termination of the present arduous and eventful struggle for the liberties of Europe.

Permit us humbly to express our perfect approbation of the means which have been employed by your Royal Highness and by Parliament, for suppressing the disorders which have lately disgraced a small part of the United Kingdom; and to assure your Royal Highness of our firm support to every constitutional measure which may be adopted for the restoration of tranquillity, and bringing back the misguided part of the people to a true sense of their duty and allegiance.
