(d) Recognition of the Official Certificates is restricted to the extent indicated in the Schedule to the Notice published in the *Edinburgh Gazette* dated 26th February 1980.

The Notices published in the *Edinburgh Gazette* dated 7th January 1977 and 8th April 1980 are hereby revoked.

**SCHEDULE**

For meat and meat products (including horsemeat and horsemeat products) and edible fats: the Official Certificate shall consist of either:—

(a) A stamp or label of the following design:—



The Certificate will be completed by the insertion of the establishment number ;  
or

(b) An oval mark 6.5 cm wide by 4.5 cm high. The following information must appear on the mark in perfectly legible characters:—

—on the upper part, ARGENTINA in capitals, or, if appropriate, the set of initials approved under the International Convention on Motor Vehicle Registration, vi:—

RA.

—in the centre, the veterinary approval number of the slaughterhouse.

The letters must be 0.8 cm high and the figures 1 cm high. The seal may include an indication of the official veterinarian who carried out the health inspection.

For canned meat products, a stamp of the following design:—



The Certificate will be completed by the insertion of the establishment number.
