WESTMINSTER—NOVEMBER 24, 1813.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to an Act agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Act, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to enable his Majesty to accept the services of a proportion of the Militia, out of the United Kingdom, for the vigorous prosecution of the war.

CARLETON-HOUSE—NOVEMBER 25, 1813.

This day his Excellency the Count de Lieven, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from his Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, and General Balascheff, Aid-de-Camp-General, Knight of the Orders of St. Alexander Newsky, of St. Anne, &c. &c. deputed by his Imperial Majesty to invest his Royal Highness the Prince Regent with the ensigns of the Imperial Russian Orders of St. Andrew, St. Alexander Newsky, and St. Anne, had an audience of his Royal Highness, for that purpose, and to deliver their letter of credence; to which they were introduced by Viscount Castlereagh, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

His Royal Highness was invested with the said Imperial Orders by his Excellency the Count de Lieven in the presence of his Serene Highness the Prince of Orange, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of York, Clarence, Kent, and Cambridge, the Foreign Ministers, the Great Officers of State, and several of the nobility.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, after the

investiture, held a levee, on which occasion his Royal Highness appeared in the ensigns of the above Imperial Russian orders.
