To his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

The humble Address of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the Shire of Ayr.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, his Majesty's most faithful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply, of the Shire of Ayr, assembled this day by public advertisement for that purpose, humbly beg leave, in sentiments of the most dutiful attachment to his Majesty's person and government, to approach the throne with expressions of the most heartfelt congratulations on the brilliant achievements and important successes of his Majesty's arms in the Peninsula and within France, under the direction of that illustrious general the Marshal Marquess of Wellington.

Whilst we regard with admiration the long, persevering, and bloody struggle of Spain and Portugal, for the recovery and maintenance of their independence as nations, against the unprincipled and treacherous attempts of their cruel and tyrannical invader, it is with proud satisfactions this country can reflect, that by the aid of its exertions, directed by wise and magnanimous counsels, such independence has at last been established,—that the glorious example has called forth a corresponding sensation throughout Europe, and that the great empires and kingdoms of the continent, indignantly spurning the oppressive slavery they have too long languished under, have, with one feeling and with one voice, asserted the independence and the liberty of mankind.

Sir, these happy results cannot be contemplated without awakening in us a strong sense of gratitude to your Royal Highness, for the benefits derived from the wisdom and vigour of your administration, which, securing the maritime rights and internal prosperity of the British empire, has at the same

time afforded that powerful succour to our allies of Spain and Portugal, which has enabled them to emancipate themselves from the enslaving grasp of a treacherous and insatiable tyrant, and to give to the world the bright example of successful resistance to unprincipled dominion.

Impressed with the sanguine hope, that the virtuous combination of power now put forth, for the suppression of wrong, the protection of right, and the restoration of order amongst the states and nations of Europe, shall, under the blessing of Divine Providence, be crowned with complete success, by the total extinction of that unnatural and monstrous despotism assumed by a single individual,—we look forward, Sir, with joy to that auspicious period, when your Royal Highness may perfect your patriotic labours, by restoring peace to the empire you administer, upon an honourable, safe, and lasting foundation.
