MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: The Proposed Revision of the National Labor Relations Act, 1935.

1. The National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) has proposed a revision of the National Labor Relations Act, 1935, which was enacted by the 74th Congress in 1935. The proposed revision is contained in a bill introduced in the House of Representatives by Mr. Clegg on May 1, 1944.

2. The proposed revision is intended to bring the Act up to date and to provide for the more effective administration of the law. It contains numerous amendments, including the following:

a. The definition of "employee" is expanded to include certain agricultural and stock raising operations.

b. The definition of "employer" is expanded to include certain common carriers and public utilities.

c. The procedure for the selection of a bargaining representative is revised.

d. The procedure for the resolution of disputes is revised.

e. The procedure for the enforcement of the law is revised.

3. The proposed revision is a comprehensive one, and it is believed that it will result in a more effective administration of the law. It is recommended that the President sign the bill into law.
