His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has also been pleased to approve of the 3d regiment of Hussars of the King's German Legion being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, (in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to that regiment), the word *Peninsula*, in consideration of the services of that corps in Portugal and Spain during the years 1808 and 1809.
