His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the regiments named in the margin being permitted to bear on their colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to those regiments, the words specified against their names, in commemoration of their service at Salamanca, on the 21st and 22d July 1812; at Nivelle, in November 1813; and at Toulouse, on the 12th April 1814.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of the 36th regiment being permitted to bear on its colours and sppointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the regiment, the word "Vimiera," in commemoration of the distinguished gallantry displayed by that regiment in the action at Vimiera on the 21st August 1808.

As the late 2d battalion of the 44th foot bore a part in the memorable battle of Waterloo, and on that occasion rethe memorable pattie of waterioo, and on that occasion ceived the Prince Regent's permission to bear on its colours and appointments the word "Waterloo," and as that battalion has been reduced, and the men have been transferred to the 1st battalion, his Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of permission being granted to the 44th regiment to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the regiment, the word "Waterloo," in commemoration of the distinguished gallantry displayed by the 2d battalion of that regiment in the action on the 18th June

As the late 2d battalion of the 81st regiment bore a part in the action near Corunna in Spain, and in consequence received the Prince Regent's permission to bear on its colours and appointments the word "Corunna," and as that battalibeen reduced, and the men have been transferred to the 1st battalion, his Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of permission being granted to the 81st regiment to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have been heretofore granted to the regiment, the word "Corunna," in commemoration of the distinguished services of the late 2d battalion of that regiment in the action fought near Corunna, on the 16th January 1809.
