It is ordered by his Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Saturday the 24th day of this instant August, be further prorogued to Monday the 4th day of November next:

THE following Address has been presented to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent; which Address his Royal Highness was pleased to receive very graciously:

Unto his Royal Highness the Prince REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Perth; in a general meeting assembled, humbly beg leave to offer to your Royal Highness our sincere congratulations on the recent marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Charlotte Augusta with his Serene Highness the Prince Leopold of Saxe Cobourg.

Deeply impressed with a sense of the blessings which this kingdom has enjoyed under the government of the House of Brunswick, we cannot but rejoice at an event which promises a continuance of these blessings; and we contemplate with satisfaction an union so propitious, presenting prospects of happiness to the illustrious personages, and important benefits to the British empire.

CARLTON-HOUSE—AUGUST 13, 1816.

This day Baron de Jacobi Kloest, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from his Majesty the King of Prussia, had audience of his Royal Highness the Prince Regent to deliver his letter of recall; to which he was introduced by Lord Viscount Castlereagh, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conduct-

ed by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

This day his Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to confer the honour of Knighthood upon William Cox, Esq. Lieutenant-Colonel in the Army, Major-General in the Portuguese Service, and Knight of the Royal Portuguese Military Order of the Tower and Sword.

WHITEHALL—AUGUST 14, 1816.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to grant the dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland unto Algernon Percy, Esq. (commonly called Lord Algernon Percy), and the heirs-male of his body lawfully begotten, by the name, style, and title of Baron Prudhoe, of Prudhoe Castle, in the county of Northumberland.

FOREIGN-OFFICE—AUGUST 17, 1816.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to appoint Gilbert Robertson, Esq. to be his Majesty's Consul at Philadelphia.
